Mr. HAMILTON introduced the following joint resolution; which was referred to the Committee on Post Office and Civil Service

## **JOINT RESOLUTION**

## Designating October 6, 1993, and October 6, 1994, each as "German-American Day".

- Whereas since the arrival of the first German immigrants to America on October 6, 1683, in the area of Germantown, Pennsylvania, German-Americans have made significant contributions to the quality of life in the United States;
- Whereas German-Americans are proud of the existing friendship and cooperation between the Federal Republic of Germany and the United States, of which the German-American Friendship Garden in Washington, DC, is evidence;

- Whereas German-Americans pledge their unconditional support for further expansion of the existing friendship between Germany and the United States, and will continue to contribute to the culture of the United States, support its government and democratic principles, and will also work to help assure the freedom of all people; and
- Whereas the Congress unanimously passed joint resolutions designating October 6th of 1987, 1988, 1989, and 1990 each as "German-American Day": Now, therefore, be it
  - 1 Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives
  - 2 of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
  - 3 That October 6, 1993, and October 6, 1994, are each des4 ignated as "German-American Day", and the President
    5 is authorized and requested to issue a proclamation calling
    6 on the people of the United States to observe such days
  - 7 with appropriate ceremonies and activities.

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
