JOINT RESOLUTION

Designating June 7, 1993, through June 14, 1993, as "National Flag Celebration Week".

Whereas it is the obligation of each generation of Americans to instruct the next in the significance of our history and of the meaning of and the ideals embodied in our Nation's patriotic symbols;

- Whereas the flag of the United States is the principal patriotic symbol of our Nation;
- Whereas the citizens of the United States already celebrate the observance of Flag Day on June the fourteenth of each year; and
- Whereas Public Law 89–443 did establish on June 9, 1966, that "the President is authorized and requested to issue annually a proclamation designating the week in which June 14 occurs as National Flag Week, and calling upon all citizens to display the flag of the United States on those days": Now, therefore, be it
 - 1 Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives
 - 2 of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
 - 3 That the President revive this custom by declaring the
 - 4 week beginning June 7, 1993, which culminates with the
 - 5 observance of Flag Day, on June 14, 1993, to be "Na-
 - 6 tional Flag Celebration Week", during which citizens, es-
 - 7 pecially children, be encouraged to both display the flag
 - 8 and study its history and the ideals it represents.

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
