A BILL

To provide for 2,500 additional border patrol agents from military personnel displaced by defense cutbacks.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. ADDITIONAL BORDER PATROL AGENTS FROM**
4 **DISPLACED MILITARY PERSONNEL.**

5 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Attorney General of the Unit-
6 ed States shall provide for an increase of 2,500 in the

1 number of border patrol agent positions in the Immigra-
2 tion and Naturalization Service above the number of such
3 positions as of September 30, 1991.

4 (b) INDIVIDUALS ELIGIBLE.—Only an individual
5 who—

6 (1) as of October 1, 1991, was a member of the
7 Armed Forces serving on active duty,

8 (2) was discharged involuntarily under honor-
9 able conditions from the Armed Forces after October
10 1, 1991, and

11 (3) possesses applicable skills and experience to
12 serve as a border patrol agent,

13 may be employed as a border patrol agent in a position
14 provided pursuant to subsection (a).

15 (c) INSERVICE TRAINING.—Individuals who are em-
16 ployed as border patrol agents under this section shall be
17 provided programs of inservice training as will familiarize
18 them with the rights and varied cultural backgrounds of
19 aliens and citizens in order to ensure and safeguard the
20 constitutional and civil rights, personal safety, and human
21 dignity of all individuals, aliens as well as citizens, within
22 the jurisdiction of the United States with whom they may
23 have contact in their work.

24 (d) FUNDING FOR FISCAL YEAR 1994.—From sums
25 appropriated to the Department of Defense for fiscal year

1 1994, the Secretary of Defense shall transfer to the Attor-
2 ney General such sum as may be certified to the Secretary
3 by the Attorney General as necessary to carry out this
4 section. The sum so transferred shall be credited to
5 amounts available to the Border Patrol and shall be avail-
6 able only for the purpose of carrying out this section.

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
