AN ACT

Making supplemental appropriations for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1993, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*
3 That the following sums are appropriated, out of any
4 money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to pro-
5 vide supplemental appropriations for the fiscal year ending
6 September 30, 1993, and for other purposes, namely:

3 CHAPTER I
4 DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE, RURAL DE-
5 VELOPMENT, FOOD AND DRUG ADMINIS-
6 TRATION, AND RELATED AGENCIES
7 DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE
8 FOOD SAFETY AND INSPECTION SERVICE
9 SALARIES AND EXPENSES
10 For an additional amount for “Salaries and ex-
11 penses”, \$4,000,000.
12 RURAL DEVELOPMENT ADMINISTRATION
13 (RESCISSION)
14 Of the funds made available for this heading in Pub-
15 lic Law 102–341, \$8,576,000 are rescinded. Such funds
16 were made available for salaries and expenses.
17 FARMERS HOME ADMINISTRATION
18 RURAL HOUSING INSURANCE FUND PROGRAM ACCOUNT
19 For an additional amount for the “Rural housing in-
20 surance fund program account”, \$4,576,000 for the cost
21 of guaranteed unsubsidized section 502 loans, for total
22 loan principal not to exceed \$250,000,000.

1 FOOD AND NUTRITION SERVICE
2 SPECIAL SUPPLEMENTAL FOOD PROGRAM FOR WOMEN,
3 INFANTS, AND CHILDREN (WIC)

4 For the funds remaining after the fiscal year 1993
5 reallocation process, the Secretary may waive the 15 per-
6 cent cap regulation to ensure additional funds are received
7 by States most in need.

8 DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN
9 SERVICES

10 FOOD AND DRUG ADMINISTRATION
11 SALARIES AND EXPENSES
12 (INCLUDING TRANSFERS OF FUNDS)

13 For an additional amount for “Salaries and ex-
14 penses” from fees collected pursuant to section 736 of the
15 Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act, not to exceed
16 \$36,000,000, to remain available until expended: *Pro-*
17 *vided*, That fees derived from applications received during
18 fiscal year 1993 shall be subject to the fiscal year 1993
19 limitation.

20 For an additional amount for carrying out the Mam-
21 mography Quality Standards Act, \$3,000,000, of which
22 \$1,000,000 shall be transferred from the Centers for Dis-
23 ease Control and Prevention; \$1,000,000 shall be trans-
24 ferred from the National Institutes of Health “National
25 Cancer Institute”; and \$1,000,000 shall be transferred

1 from the Health Care Financing Administration “Pro-
2 gram Management”.

10 NATIONAL SECURITY EDUCATION TRUST FUND

11 There is hereby appropriated out of funds in the Na-
12 tional Security Education Trust Fund, \$10,000,000,
13 which shall remain available until expended, for the pur-
14 poses set out in paragraph (1) of section 804(b) of the
15 National Security Education Act of 1991 (title VIII of
16 Public Law 102–183; 50 U.S.C. 1904(b)), and may be ob-
17 ligated for such purposes notwithstanding any other provi-
18 sion of law.

19 GENERAL PROVISIONS—CHAPTER III

20 SEC. 301. Section 9032 of the Department of De-
21 fense Appropriations Act, 1993 (Public Law 102–396) is
22 amended by inserting “, the California and Hawaii
23 recompetition contract,” after “pursuant to this general
24 provision” in the next to the last proviso (relating to pre-
25 emptio provisions).

1 main available until September 30, 1994; and
2 \$19,200,000 for school operations shall become available
3 for obligation on July 1, 1993, and shall remain available

9 For an additional amount for payment of claims re-
10 solved by the United States Claims Court related to the
11 administration of vaccines before October 1, 1988,
12 \$30,000,000, to remain available until expended.

13 SOCIAL SECURITY ADMINISTRATION

14 PAYMENTS TO SOCIAL SECURITY TRUST FUNDS

15 For an additional amount for “Payments to Social
16 Security Trust Funds” to reimburse the trust funds for
17 administrative expenses to carry out sections 9704 and
18 9706 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, \$10,000,000,
19 to remain available until expended.

20 SUPPLEMENTAL SECURITY INCOME PROGRAM

21 For making, after June 15 of the current fiscal year,
22 benefit payments to individuals under title XVI of the So-
23 cial Security Act, for unanticipated costs incurred for the
24 current fiscal year, such sums as may be necessary.

1 LIMITATION ON ADMINISTRATIVE EXPENSES

2 For an additional amount, \$10,000,000, to remain
3 available until expended, to carry out sections 9704 and
4 9706 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986.

5 DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

6 STUDENT FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

7 For an additional amount for “Student financial as-
8 sistance” for payment of awards made under subpart 1
9 of part A of title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965,
10 as amended, \$160,000,000, which shall be available
11 through September 30, 1994, only for such awards made
12 for award year 1993–1994 and prior award years.

15 CONSTRUCTION

16 MILITARY CONSTRUCTION, NAVY

17 For an additional amount for “Military Construction,
18 Navy” to cover the incremental costs arising from flood
19 damage at Camp Pendleton, California, \$3,000,000.

20 FAMILY HOUSING, NAVY AND MARINE CORPS

21 For an additional amount for “Family Housing,
22 Navy and Marine Corps” to cover the incremental costs
23 arising from flood damage at Camp Pendleton, California,
24 \$4,345,000.

1 HOMEOWNERS ASSISTANCE FUND, DEFENSE
2 (INCLUDING RESCISSION)

3 Of the funds appropriated for “Homeowners Assist-
4 ance Fund, Defense” under Public Law 102–380,
5 \$133,000,000 is hereby rescinded.

6 For an additional amount for “Homeowners Assist-
7 ance Fund, Defense”, \$133,000,000, to remain available
8 until expended.

12 DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION
13 OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY
14 (TRANSFERS OF FUNDS)
15 OFFICE OF THE ASSISTANT SECRETARY FOR
16 TRANSPORTATION POLICY

17 For necessary expenses of the Office of the Assistant
18 Secretary for Transportation Policy, \$2,358,000 to be de-
19 rived from amounts made available for the “Office of the
20 Assistant Secretary for Policy and International Affairs”
21 in the Department of Transportation and Related Agen-
22 cies Appropriations Act, 1993.

1 OFFICE OF THE ASSISTANT SECRETARY FOR AVIATION
2 AND INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS

3 For necessary expenses of the Office of the Assistant
4 Secretary for Aviation and International Affairs,
5 \$7,920,000 to be derived from amounts made available for
6 the “Office of the Assistant Secretary for Policy and
7 International Affairs” and the “Office of Essential Air
8 Service” in the Department of Transportation and Related
9 Agencies Appropriations Act, 1993.

10 OFFICE OF THE DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC AFFAIRS

11 Amounts made available for the Office of the Assist-
12 ant Secretary for Public Affairs in the Department of
13 Transportation and Related Agencies Appropriations Act,
14 1993, which are unobligated on the date of enactment of
15 this Act shall be transferred to and merged under this
16 head.

17 CHAPTER VIII

20 INDEPENDENT AGENCIES

21 NATIONAL ARCHIVES AND RECORDS ADMINISTRATION

22 OPERATING EXPENSES

23 For an additional amount for “Operating expenses”,
24 \$2,997,000.

1 GENERAL SERVICES ADMINISTRATION
2 ALLOWANCES AND OFFICE STAFF FOR FORMER
3 PRESIDENTS

4 For an additional amount for “Allowances and Office
5 Staff for Former Presidents”, \$194,000.

6 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS

7 SEC. 801. Not to exceed 4 per centum of any appro-
8 priations made available to the Executive Office of the
9 President in fiscal year 1993 may be transferred between
10 such appropriations. Notwithstanding any authority to
11 transfer funds between appropriations contained in this or
12 any other Act, no transfer may increase or decrease any
13 appropriation by more than 4 per centum and any such
14 proposed transfers shall be approved in advance by the
15 Committees on Appropriations of the House and Senate.

16 SEC. 802. Notwithstanding the limitation contained
17 in Public Law 102-393 (Treasury, Postal Service, and
18 General Government Appropriations Act, 1993), within
19 the appropriation, “Official Residence of the Vice Presi-
20 dent”, not to exceed \$130,000 shall be available for official
21 entertainment expenses.

9 pensions”, \$147,422,000, to remain available until
10 expended.

11 VETERANS HEALTH ADMINISTRATION

12 MEDICAL CARE

13 (TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

14 For an additional amount for “Medical care”,
15 \$5,000,000, to be derived by transfer from amounts ap-
16 propriated under the head “Medical administration and
17 miscellaneous operating expenses” in Public Law 102-
18 389.

19 DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING AND URBAN
20 DEVELOPMENT

21 HOUSING PROGRAMS

22 HOME INVESTMENT PARTNERSHIPS PROGRAM

23 (TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

24 For additional amounts for the HOME investment
25 partnerships program, as authorized under title II of the
26 Cranston-Gonzalez National Affordable Housing Act, as

1 amended, subject to the terms provided under this head
2 in the Dire Emergency Supplemental Appropriations Act,
3 1992, Public Law 102–368, to remain available until ex-
4 pended, \$60,000,000, to be derived by transfer from the
5 \$100,000,000 appropriated in the second paragraph under
6 the head “Annual contributions for assisted housing” in
7 such Act.

8 SEVERELY DISTRESSED PUBLIC HOUSING PROJECTS
9 (TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

10 For activities as set forth in the third paragraph
11 under the head “Homeownership and opportunity for peo-
12 ple everywhere grants (HOPE grants)” in the Depart-
13 ments of Veterans Affairs and Housing and Urban Devel-
14 opment, and Independent Agencies Appropriations Act of
15 1993, \$300,000,000, to remain available until expended,
16 to be derived by transfer from amounts appropriated for
17 the purpose under the foregoing head.

18 YOUTHBUILD PROGRAMS
19 (TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

20 For activities authorized by subtitle D of the Housing
21 and Community Development Act of 1992, under the
22 heading “HOPE for Youth: Youthbuild”, \$40,000,000, to
23 remain available until expended, to be derived by transfer
24 from amounts appropriated under the head “Homeowner-
25 ship and opportunity for people everywhere grants (HOPE
26 grants)” in title II of the Departments of Veterans Affairs

1 and Housing and Urban Development, and Independent
2 Agencies Appropriations Act, 1993, Public Law 102-389.

3 COMMUNITY PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT

4 COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT GRANTS

5 (TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

6 For an additional amount for “Community develop-
7 ment grants”, for use only for the repair, renovation, or
8 replacement, or other authorized community development
9 activities affecting structures damaged or destroyed by
10 Hurricane Andrew, Hurricane Iniki, Typhoon Omar, and
11 other Presidentially-declared disasters, to remain available
12 until September 30, 1995, \$40,000,000, to be derived by
13 transfer from the \$100,000,000 appropriated in the sec-
14 ond paragraph under the head “Annual contributions for
15 assisted housing” in the Dire Emergency Supplemental
16 Appropriations Act, 1992, Public Law 102-368: *Provided,*
17 That the Secretary may waive entirely, or in any part, any
18 requirement set forth in title I of the Housing and Com-
19 munity Development Act of 1974, except a requirement
20 relating to fair housing and nondiscrimination, the envi-
21 ronment, and labor standards, if the Secretary finds that
22 such waiver will further the purposes of the use of the
23 amount hereby transferred.

1 MANAGEMENT AND ADMINISTRATION

2 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

3 The third, fourth, and fifth provisos under this head
4 in title II of the Departments of Veterans Affairs and
5 Housing and Urban Development, and Independent Agen-
6 cies Appropriations Act, 1993, Public Law 102-389, are
7 repealed.

8 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS

9 The accounts under the head “Management and ad-
10 ministration”, except the account for the Office of Inspec-
11 tor General, in title II, Departments of Veterans Affairs
12 and Housing and Urban Development, and Independent
13 Agencies Appropriations Act, 1992, Public Law 102-139,
14 and the amounts in such accounts are hereby merged, into
15 “Salaries and expenses”, for the purposes of administer-
16 ing such accounts in accordance with 31 U.S.C., sub-
17 chapter IV, chapter 15.

18 The seventh paragraph under this heading in the De-
19 partments of Veterans Affairs and Housing and Urban
20 Development, and Independent Agencies Appropriations
21 Act, 1993, Public Law 102-389 (the second full para-
22 graph at 106 Stat. 1591) is repealed.

23 Of the \$260,000,000 earmarked in Public Law 102-
24 389 for special purpose grants (106 Stat. 1571, 1584),
25 \$1,750,000 made available to Los Angeles, CA, for a loan

1 fund to be administered by a nonprofit community organi-
2 zation in support of small business revitalization that will
3 create a beneficial impact on employment, income, savings,
4 and the development of a stronger community economic
5 base in South Central Los Angeles shall instead be made
6 available to the Brotherhood Crusade Black United Front
7 of Los Angeles for the same purpose.

8 Of the \$54,250,000 earmarked in Public Law 101-
9 507 for special purpose grants (104 Stat. 1351, 1357),
10 \$1,350,000 made available for the Bickerdike Redevelop-
11 ment Corporation for the rehabilitation of 70 units in
12 three buildings, for rental to low-income tenants in the
13 City of Chicago shall instead be made available for the
14 Bickerdike Redevelopment Corporation, for the creation of
15 rental subsidy for 70 units of affordable housing for rental
16 to low-income tenants in the City of Chicago. The Rental
17 Subsidy program is to be set up through a secure invest-
18 ment portfolio by Bickerdike whereby principal and inter-
19 est earned will be used to subsidize rents for a period of
20 years.

21 INDEPENDENT AGENCIES

22 ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY

23 PROGRAM AND RESEARCH OPERATIONS

24 (TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

25 For an additional amount for “Program and research
26 operations”, up to \$5,000,000, to be derived by transfer

1 from amounts provided under the head “Abatement, con-
2 trol, and compliance” in Public Law 102–389.

3 NATIONAL AERONAUTICS AND SPACE ADMINISTRATION
4 RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT
5 (TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

6 For an additional amount for “Research and develop-
7 ment”, \$5,000,000, to be available until September 30,
8 1994, to be derived by transfer from amounts provided
9 under the head “Construction of facilities” in Public Law
10 102–389.

11 **TITLE II—GENERAL PROVISIONS**

12 SEC. 201. No part of any appropriation contained in
13 this Act shall remain available for obligation beyond the
14 current fiscal year unless expressly so provided herein.

15 SEC. 202. In fiscal year 1994 and thereafter, the pay-
16 ments, revenues, and surcharges referred to in sections
17 3404(c)(3), 3405(f), and 3406(c)(1), respectively, of Pub-
18 lic Law 102–575 shall be assessed and collected to the
19 extent required in appropriations Acts.

20 This Act may be cited as the “Supplemental Appro-
21 priations Act of 1993”.
