A BILL

 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Persian Gulf War En-
- 5 vironmental Hazards Study Act".

1 SEC. 2. STARTUP GRANT.

2 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of Defense shall 3 make a grant in the amount of \$950,000 to a medical research institution selected through established acquisi-4 5 tion procedures for the purpose of constructing and equipping a specialized environmental medical facility at that 6 7 institution with the purpose of studying the possible health effects of exposure to low levels of volatile organic chemi-8 9 cals and the individual susceptibility of humans to such exposure under environmentally controlled conditions. 10

(b) FUNDING SOURCE.—Funds for the grant under
subsection (a) shall be made from amounts appropriated
to the Department of Defense for fiscal year 1994 for research, development, test, and evaluation.

15 (c) SELECTION CRITERIA.—To be eligible to be se-16 lected for a grant under subsection (a), an institution—

(1) must be affiliated with an accredited hospital and be affiliated with, and in close proximity
to, a Department of Defense medical center and a
Department of Veterans Affairs medical center;

(2) must enter into an agreement with the Secretary of Defense to ensure that research personnel
of those affiliated medical facilities and other relevant Federal personnel may have access to the facility to carry out research;

1 (3) must have demonstrated potential or ability 2 to ensure the participation of scientific personnel 3 with expertise in research on possible chemical sen-4 sitivities to low-level exposure to volatile organic 5 chemicals and other substances; and

6 (4) must have immediate access to sophisticated 7 physiological imaging (including functional brain im-8 aging) and other innovative research technology that 9 could better define the possible health effects of low-10 level exposure to volatile organic chemicals and other 11 substances and lead to new therapies.

12 SEC. 3. RESEARCH PROGRAM.

Research to be conducted at the facility for which a 13 grant is made under section 2 shall explore, in an environ-14 mentally controlled setting, the health effects in humans 15 of exposure to low levels of volatile organic chemicals and 16 other substances and the individual susceptibility of hu-17 mans to such exposure. Such research shall focus on (but 18 shall not be limited to) persons who, while serving on ac-19 tive duty in the Armed Forces in the Southwest Asia thea-20 ter of operation during the Persian Gulf War, may have 21 22 been exposed to environmental hazards or chemical substances (including petrochemicals, smoke from burning 23 24 landfills or petrochemicals, pharmaceuticals, pesticides, or other chemicals or agents utilized by the Department of
 Defense).

3 SEC. 4. ANNUAL REPORT TO CONGRESS.

4 The Secretary of Defense shall submit to Congress5 an annual report on activities under this Act during the6 preceding year.

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
