A BILL

To designate portions of the Maurice River and its tributaries in the State of New Jersey as components of the National Wild and Scenic Rivers Systems.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-

2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

1 SECTION 1. FINDINGS AND PURPOSES.

2 (a) FINDINGS.—The Congress finds that—

3 (1) the Maurice River and its tributaries,
4 Menantico Creek, the Manumuskin River, and
5 Muskee Creek, are eligible for inclusion into the Na6 tional Wild and Scenic Rivers System, the segments
7 and their classifications being as follows—

8 (A) the Maurice River, lower segment, 9 from the United States Geological Survey Sta-10 tion at Shellpile to Route 670 Bridge at 11 Mauricetown, approximately 7.0 miles, as a rec-12 reational river;

(B) the Maurice River, middle segment,
from Route 670 Bridge at Mauricetown to 3.6
miles upstream (at drainage ditch just upstream of Fralinger Farm), approximately 3.8
miles as a scenic river;

(C) the Maurice River, middle segment,
from the drainage ditch just upstream of
Fralinger Farm to one-half mile upstream from
the United States Geological Survey Station at
Burcham Farm, approximately 3.1 miles, as a
recreational river;

(D) the Maurice River, upper segment,
from one-half mile upstream from the United
States Geological Survey Station at Burcham

1	Farm to the south side of the Millville sewage
2	treatment plant, approximately 3.6 miles, as a
3	scenic river;
4	(E) the Menantico Creek, lower segment,
5	from its confluence with the Maurice River to
6	the Route 55 Bridge, approximately 1.4 miles,
7	as a recreational river;
8	(F) the Menantico Creek, upper segment,
9	from the Route 55 Bridge to the base of the
10	Impoundment at Menantico Lake, approxi-
11	mately 6.5 miles, as a scenic river;
12	(G) the Manumuskin River, lower segment,
13	from its confluence with the Maurice River to
14	2.0 miles upstream, as a recreational river;
15	(H) the Manumuskin River, upper seg-
16	ment, from 2.0 miles upstream from its con-
17	fluence with the Maurice River to headwaters
18	near Route 557, approximately 12.3 miles, as a
19	scenic river; and
20	(I) the Muskee Creek from its confluence
21	to the Pennsylvania Reading Seashore Line
22	Railroad bridge, approximately 2.7 miles, as a
23	scenic river;
24	(2) a resource assessment of the Maurice River
25	and its tributaries, Menantico Creek, the

Manumuskin River, and the Muskee Creek shows 1 2 that the area possesses numerous outstandingly remarkable natural, cultural, scenic, and recreational 3 4 resources that are significant at the local, regional, and international levels, including rare plant and 5 6 animal species and critical habitats for birds migrat-7 ing to and from the north and south hemispheres; 8 and

9 (3) a river management plan for the river system has been developed by the Cumberland County 10 11 Department of Planning and Development and 12 adopted by the Maurice River Township, Commercial Township, and the City of Millville that would 13 14 meet the requirements of section 6(c) of the Wild 15 and Scenic Rivers Act, the City of Vineland has 16 adopted a master plan which calls for river planning 17 and management and is in the process of adopting 18 zoning ordinances to implement their plan, and 19 Buena Vista Township in Atlantic County has 20 adopted a land use plan consistent with the Pine-21 lands Comprehensive Plan which is more restrictive 22 than the Cumberland County local river management plan. 23

24 (b) PURPOSES.—The purposes of this Act are to—

1 (1) declare the importance and irreplaceable re-2 source values of the Maurice River and its tributaries to water quality, human health, traditional 3 4 economic activities, ecosystem integrity, biotic diver-5 sity, fish and wildlife, scenic open space and recre-6 ation and protect such values through designation of 7 the segments as components of the National Wild 8 and Scenic Rivers System; and

9 (2) recognize that the Maurice River System 10 will continue to be threatened by major development 11 and that land use regulations of the individual local 12 political jurisdictions through which the river seg-13 ments pass cannot alone provide for an adequate 14 balance between conservation of the river's resources 15 and commercial and industrial development; and

(3) recognize that segments of the Maurice
River and its tributaries additional to those designated under this Act are eligible for potential designation at some point in the near future.

20 SEC. 2. DESIGNATION.

(a) IN GENERAL. Section 3(a) of the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act (16 U.S.C. 1274(a)) is amended by adding
the following new paragraphs at the end thereof:

24 "() THE MAURICE RIVER, MIDDLE SEGMENT.—
25 From Route 670 Bridge at Mauricetown to 3.6 miles up-

stream (at drainage ditch just upstream of Fralinger
 Farm), approximately 3.8 miles to be administered by the
 Secretary of the Interior as a scenic river.

4 "() THE MAURICE RIVER, MIDDLE SEGMENT.—
5 From the drainage ditch just upstream of Fralinger Farm
6 to one-half mile upstream from the United States Geologi7 cal Survey Station at Burcham Farm, approximately 3.1
8 miles, to be administered by the Secretary of the Interior
9 as a recreational river.

10 "() THE MAURICE RIVER, UPPER SEGMENT.— 11 From one-half mile upstream from the United States Geo-12 logical Survey Station at Burcham Farm to the south side 13 of the Millville sewage treatment plant, approximately 3.6 14 miles, to be administered by the Secretary of the Interior 15 as a scenic river.

16 "() THE MENANTICO CREEK, LOWER SEGMENT.—
17 From its confluence with the Maurice River to the Route
18 55 Bridge, approximately 1.4 miles, to be administered by
19 the Secretary of the Interior as a recreational river.

20 "() THE MENANTICO CREEK, UPPER SEGMENT.—
21 From the Route 55 Bridge to the base of the impound22 ment at Menantico Lake, approximately 6.5 miles, to be
23 administered by the Secretary of the Interior as a scenic
24 river.

"() MANUMUSKIN RIVER, LOWER SEGMENT.—
 From its confluence with the Maurice River to a point 2.0
 miles upstream, to be administered by the Secretary of
 the Interior as a recreational river.

5 "() MANUMUSKIN RIVER, UPPER SEGMENT.— 6 From a point 2.0 miles upstream from its confluence with 7 the Maurice River to its headwaters near Route 557, 8 aproximately 12.3 miles, to be administered by the Sec-9 retary of the Interior as a scenic river.

10 "() MUSKEE CREEK, NEW JERSEY.—From its
11 confluence with the Maurice River to the Pennsylvania
12 Seashore Line Railroad Bridge, approximately 2.7 miles,
13 to be administered by the Secretary of the Interior as a
14 scenic river.".

15 SEC. 3. MANAGEMENT.

(a) DUTIES OF SECRETARY.—The Secretary of the 16 Interior shall manage the river segments designated as 17 components of the National Wild and Scenic Rivers Sys-18 tem by this Act through cooperative agreements with the 19 political jurisdictions within which such segments pass, 20 pursuant to section 10(e) of the Wild and Scenic Rivers 21 22 Act, and in consultation with such jurisdictions, except that publicly-owned lands within the boundaries of such 23 24 segments shall continue to be managed by the agency hav-25 ing jurisdiction over such lands.

(b) AGREEMENTS.—(1) Cooperative agreements for 1 management of the river segments referred to in sub-2 section (a) shall provide for the long-term protection, pres-3 ervation, and enhancement of such segments and shall be 4 5 consistent with the comprehensive management plan for such segments to be prepared by the Secretary of the Inte-6 7 rior pursuant to section 3(d) of the Wild and Scenic Rivers 8 Act and with the local river management plans prepared 9 by appropriate local political jurisdictions in conjunction 10 with the Secretary of the Interior.

11 (2) The Secretary of the Interior, in consultation with appropriate representatives of local political jurisdictions 12 and the State of New Jersey, shall review local river man-13 agement plans described in paragraph (1) to assure that 14 their proper implementation will protect the values for 15 which the river segments described in section 2 were des-16 ignated as components of the National Wild and Scenic 17 Rivers System. If after such review the Secretary deter-18 mines that such plans and their implementing local zoning 19 ordinances meet the protection standards specified in sec-20 tion 6(c) of the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act, then such 21 22 plans shall be deemed to constitute "local zoning ordinances" and each township and other incorporated local 23 jurisdiction covered by such plans shall be deemed to con-24 25 stitute a "village" for the purposes of section 6(c) (prohibiting the acquisition of lands by condemnation) of the Wild
 and Scenic Rivers Act.

3 (3) The Secretary of the Interior shall biennially review compliance with the local river management plans de-4 scribed in paragraph (1) and shall promptly report to the 5 Committee on Natural Resources of the United States 6 7 House of Representatives and to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources of the United States Senate 8 9 any deviation from such which would result in any diminu-10 tion of the values for which the river segment concerned was designated as a component of the National Wild and 11 Scenic Rivers System. 12

13 (c) PLANNING ASSISTANCE.—The Secretary of the Interior may provide planning assistance to local political 14 subdivisions of the State of New Jersey through which 15 flow river segments that are designated as components of 16 the National Wild and Scenic Rivers System, and may 17 enter into memoranda of understanding or cooperative 18 agreements with officials or agencies of the United States 19 or the State of New Jersey to ensure that Federal and 20 State programs that could affect such segments are car-21 ried out in a manner consistent with the Wild and Scenic 22 23 Rivers Act and applicable river management plans.

24 (d) SEGMENT ADDITIONS.—The Secretary of the In-25 terior is encouraged to continue to work with the local mu-

nicipalities to negotiate agreement and support for des-1 ignating those segments of the Maurice River and its trib-2 utaries which were found eligible for designation pursuant 3 to Public Law 100–33 and were not designated pursuant 4 to this Act (hereinafter referred to as "additional eligible 5 segments"). For a period of 3 years after the date of en-6 7 actment of this Act, the provisions of the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act applicable to segments included in section 5 8 9 of that Act shall apply to the additional eligible segments. 10 The Secretary of the Interior is directed to report to the appropriate congressional committees within 3 years after 11 the date of enactment of this Act on the status of discus-12 sions and negotiations with the local municipalities and 13 on recommendations toward inclusion of additional river 14 segments into the National Wild and Scenic Rivers 15 System. 16

(e) APPROPRIATIONS.—For the purposes of the segment described by subsection (a), there are authorized to
be appropriated such sums as may be necessary to carry
out the provisions of this Act.
