Mr. YOUNG of Alaska introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Natural Resources

A BILL

To provide for the exchange of lands within Gates of the Arctic National Park and Preserve, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Anaktuvuk Pass Land
5 Exchange and Wilderness Redesignation Act of 1994”.

6 **SEC. 2. FINDINGS.**

7 The Congress makes the following findings:

8 (a) On December 2, 1980, the Alaska National
9 Interest Lands Conservation Act (94 Stat. 2371) es-
10 tablished Gates of the Arctic National Park and

1 Preserve and Gates of the Arctic Wilderness. The
2 village of Anaktuvuk Pass, located in the highlands
3 of the central Brooks Range, is virtually surrounded
4 by these national park and wilderness lands and is
5 the only village located within the boundary of a Na-
6 tional Park System unit in Alaska.

7 (b) Unlike most other Alaskan Native commu-
8 nities, the village of Anaktuvuk Pass is not located
9 on a major river, lake, or coastline that can be used
10 as a means of access. The residents of Anaktuvuk
11 Pass have relied increasingly on snow machines in
12 winter and all-terrain vehicles in summer as their
13 primary means of access to pursue caribou and
14 other subsistence resources.

15 (c) In a 1983 land exchange agreement, linear
16 easements were reserved by the Inupiat Eskimo peo-
17 ple for use of all-terrain vehicles across certain na-
18 tional park lands, mostly along stream and river
19 banks. These linear easements proved unsatisfactory,
20 because they provided inadequate access to subsist-
21 ence resources while causing excessive environmental
22 impact from concentrated use.

23 (d) The National Park Service and the
24 Nunamiut Corporation initiated discussions in 1985
25 to address concerns over the use of all-terrain vehi-

1 cles on park and wilderness land. Those discussions
2 resulted in an agreement, originally executed in
3 1992 and thereafter amended in 1993 and 1994,
4 among the National Park Service, the Nunamiut
5 Corporation, the City of Anaktuvuk Pass, and the
6 Arctic Slope Regional Corporation. Full effectuation
7 of this agreement, as amended, requires ratification
8 by the Congress.

9 **SEC. 3. RATIFICATION OF AGREEMENT.**

10 (a) RATIFICATION.—

11 (1) IN GENERAL.—The terms, conditions, pro-
12 cedures, covenants, reservations and other provisions
13 set forth in the document entitled “Donation, Ex-
14 change of Lands and Interests in Lands and Wilder-
15 ness Redesignation Agreement Among Arctic Slope
16 Regional Corporation, Nunamiut Corporation, City
17 of Anaktuvuk Pass and the United States of Amer-
18 ica” (hereinafter referred to in this Act as “the
19 Agreement”), executed by the parties on December
20 17, 1992, as amended, are hereby incorporated in
21 this Act, are ratified and confirmed, and set forth
22 the obligations and commitments of the United
23 States, Arctic Slope Regional Corporation,
24 Nunamiut Corporation and the City of Anaktuvuk
25 Pass, as a matter of Federal law.

1 (2) LAND ACQUISITION.—Lands acquired by
2 the United States pursuant to the Agreement shall
3 be administered by the Secretary of the Interior
4 (hereinafter referred to as the “Secretary”) as part
5 of the Gates of the Arctic National Park and Pre-
6 serve, subject to the laws and regulations applicable
7 thereto.

8 (b) MAPS.—The maps set forth as Exhibits C1, C2,
9 and D through I to the Agreement depict the lands subject
10 to the conveyances, retention of surface access rights, ac-
11 cess easements and all-terrain vehicle easements. These
12 lands are depicted in greater detail on a map entitled
13 “Land Exchange Actions, Proposed Anaktuvuk Pass Land
14 Exchange and Wilderness Redesignation, Gates of the
15 Arctic National Park and Preserve”, Map No. 185/80,039,
16 dated April 1994, and on file at the Alaska Regional Of-
17 fice of the National Park Service and the offices of Gates
18 of the Arctic National Park and Preserve in Fairbanks,
19 Alaska. Written legal descriptions of these lands shall be
20 prepared and made available in the above offices. In case
21 of any discrepancies, Map No. 185/80,039, shall be con-
22 trolling.

23 **SEC. 4. NATIONAL PARK SYSTEM WILDERNESS.**

24 (a) REDESIGNATION.—Section 701(2) of the Alaska
25 National Interest Lands Conservation Act (94 Stat. 2371,

1 2417) establishing the Gates of the Arctic Wilderness is
2 hereby amended with the addition of approximately fifty-
3 six thousand eight hundred and twenty-five acres as wil-
4 derness and the rescission of approximately seventy-three
5 thousand nine hundred and ninety-three acres as wilder-
6 ness, thus revising the Gates of the Arctic Wilderness to
7 approximately seven million thirty-four thousand eight
8 hundred and thirty-two acres.

9 (b) MAPS.—The lands redesignated in subsection (a)
10 are depicted on a map entitled “Wilderness Actions, Pro-
11 posed Anaktuvuk Pass Land Exchange and Wilderness
12 Redesignation, Gates of the Arctic National Park and Pre-
13 serve”, Map No. 185/80,040, dated April 1994 and on file
14 at the Alaska Regional Office of the National Park Service
15 and the office of Gates of the Arctic National Park and
16 Preserve in Fairbanks, Alaska.

17 **SEC. 5. CONFORMANCE WITH OTHER LAW.**

18 (a) ALASKA NATIVE CLAIMS SETTLEMENT ACT.—All
19 of the lands, or interests therein, conveyed to and received
20 by Arctic Slope Regional Corporation or Nunamiut Cor-
21 poration pursuant to the Agreement shall be deemed con-
22 veyed and received pursuant to exchanges under section
23 22(f) of the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act, as
24 amended (43 U.S.C. 1601, 1621(f)). All of the lands or

1 interests in lands conveyed pursuant to the Agreement
2 shall be conveyed subject to valid existing rights.

3 (b) ALASKA NATIONAL INTEREST LANDS CONSERVA-
4 TION ACT.—Nothing in this Act or in the Agreement shall
5 be construed to enlarge or diminish the rights, privileges
6 or obligations of any person, except to the extent specifi-
7 cally set forth in this Act or the Agreement, including spe-
8 cifically the preference for subsistence uses and access to
9 subsistence resources provided under title VIII of the
10 Alaska National Interest Lands Conservation Act, as
11 amended (94 Stat. 2371, 2422).

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
