A BILL

To establish a commission to advise the President on proposals for national commemorative events.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-

2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "National Commemora-

5 tive Events Advisory Act".

6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

7 The Congress finds that—

8 (1) the preparation and consideration of the 9 multitude of bills proposing particular days, weeks, 10 months, or years for recognition through Presi-

1	dential proclamation unduly burdens the Congress
2	and consumes an inordinate amount of time;
3	(2) such proposals could be more efficiently
4	considered by a commission whose sole function
5	would be to review proposals for national commemo-
6	rative events and to make positive or negative rec-
7	ommendations thereon to the President;
8	(3) such a commission would streamline the
9	process by which such proposals are currently con-
10	sidered and save the Congress considerable time and
11	resources which could be devoted to matters of more
12	pressing national concern; and
13	(4) such a commission would better ensure the
14	impartial review of proposals for national commemo-
15	rative events generated by a wide variety of constitu-
16	ent groups.
17	SEC. 3. ESTABLISHMENT AND MEMBERSHIP.
18	(a) IN GENERAL.—There shall be established a com-
19	mission to be known as the "President's Advisory Com-

(a) IN GENERAL.—There shall be established a commission to be known as the "President's Advisory Commission on National Commemorative Events" (hereinafter
in this Act referred to as the "Commission").

(b) MEMBERS.—The Commission shall be composedof 11 members, as follows:

24 (1) 2 members shall be appointed by the Speak-25 er of the House of Representatives.

1 (2) 2 members shall be appointed by the Presi-2 dent pro tempore of the Senate. 3 (3) 7 members shall be appointed by the Presi-4 dent. Members under this paragraph shall represent, insofar as possible, a wide range of educational, geo-5 6 graphical, and professional backgrounds. A Member 7 of Congress may not be appointed under this paragraph. 8 All members must be citizens of the United States. 9 (c) TERMS.—(1) Each member shall be appointed for 10 a term of 2 years, except as provided in paragraph (2). 11 12 (2) Of the members first appointed under subsection (b)(3)— 13 14 (A) 3 shall be appointed for 1 year, and (B) 4 shall be appointed for 2 years, 15 as designated by the President. 16 17 (3) If a member was appointed to the Commission as a Member of Congress and the member ceases to be 18 a Member of Congress, that member may continue as a 19 member for not longer than the 30-day period beginning 20 21 on the date that member ceases to be a Member of Con-22 gress. (d) VACANCIES.—A vacancy shall be filled in the 23

23 (d) VACANCIES.—A vacancy shall be filled in the
24 manner in which the original appointment was made. A
25 vacancy in the Commission shall not affect its powers. Any

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member appointed to fill a vacancy occurring before the
 expiration of the term for which the member's predecessor
 was appointed shall be appointed only for the remainder
 of such term.

5 (e) CHAIRMAN.—The Chairman of the Commission 6 shall be designated by the President from among the mem-7 bers under subsection (b)(3). The term of office of the 8 Chairman shall be 2 years.

9 (f) QUORUM.—6 members of the Commission shall 10 constitute a quorum. Action by a quorum shall be nec-11 essary for the Commission to issue a recommendation 12 under section 6(d).

(g) MEETINGS.—The Commission shall meet on at
least a quarterly basis. Meetings shall be held in the District of Columbia.

16 (h) PAY.—(1) Except as provided in paragraph (2), 17 each member of the Commission shall be paid the daily 18 equivalent of the maximum rate of basic pay payable for 19 grade GS–15 of the General Schedule for each day, includ-20 ing traveltime, during which such member is performing 21 duties of the Commission.

(2) Members of the Commission who are full-time officers or employees of the United States or Members of
Congress may not receive additional pay by reason of their
service on the Commission.

TRAVEL EXPENSES.—While away from their 1 (i) homes or regular places of business in the performance 2 of services for the Commission, members of the Commis-3 sion shall be allowed travel expenses, including a per diem 4 allowance in lieu of subsistence, in the same manner as 5 persons employed intermittently in the Government service 6 7 are allowed travel expenses under section 5703 of title 5 8 of the United States Code.

9 SEC. 4. DIRECTOR; STAFF.

(a) AUTHORITY.—The Commission may appoint and
fix the pay of a Director and such staff as the Commission
considers appropriate.

13 (b) INAPPLICABILITY OF CERTAIN CIVIL SERVICE LAWS.—The Director and staff of the Commission may 14 be appointed without regard to the provisions of title 5, 15 United States Code, governing appointments in the com-16 petitive service, and may be paid without regard to the 17 provisions of chapter 51 and subchapter III of chapter 53 18 of that title relating to classification and General Schedule 19 pay rates, except that an individual so appointed may not 20 21 receive pay in excess of the maximum rate of basic pay 22 payable for grade GS-15 of the General Schedule.

23 (c) STAFF OF FEDERAL AGENCIES.—Upon request
24 of the Chairman, the head of any Federal department or
25 agency may detail, on a reimbursable basis, any of the

personnel of that department or agency to the Commission
 to assist it in carrying out its duties under this Act.

3 SEC. 5. POWERS OF THE COMMISSION.

4 (a) HEARINGS.—The Commission may, for the pur-5 pose of carrying out this Act, hold such hearings, take 6 such testimony, and receive such evidence, as it considers 7 appropriate.

8 (b) GIFTS.—The Commission may accept, use, and 9 dispose of gifts or donations of services or property, but 10 not from a source having a direct interest in any matter 11 before the Commission.

(c) MAILS.—The Commission may use the United
States mails in the same manner and under the same conditions as other departments and agencies of the United
States.

(d) ADMINISTRATIVE SUPPORT SERVICES.—The Administrator of General Services shall provide to the Commission, on a reimbursable basis, such administrative support services as the Commission may request.

20 SEC. 6. DUTIES OF THE COMMISSION.

(a) CRITERIA.—The Commission shall establish criteria for recommending to the President that a proposed
commemorative event be approved or disapproved.

(b) SUBMISSION OF PROPOSALS.—The Commissionshall establish and publish in the Federal Register proce-

dures for submitting proposals for national commemora tive events to the Commission.

3 (c) REVIEW OF PROPOSALS.—The Commission shall
4 review all proposals submitted to it in accordance with
5 subsection (b).

6 (d) RECOMMENDATION TO THE PRESIDENT.—The 7 Commission shall issue a recommendation to the President 8 for approval or disapproval of each proposal submitted to 9 it in accordance with subsection (b). Each recommenda-10 tion shall be accompanied by a brief explanation of the 11 reasons why such recommendation was made.

12SEC. 7. EFFECTIVE DATE; COMMENCEMENT AND TERMI-13NATION PROVISIONS.

14 (a) EFFECTIVE DATE.—This Act shall take effect at15 the beginning of the One Hundred Third Congress.

(b) COMMENCEMENT; TERMINATION.—(1) Members
of the Commission shall be appointed, and the Commission
shall first meet, within 90 days after the effective date
of this Act.

20 (2) The Commission shall terminate 5 years after the21 date on which it first meets.
