Mr. Lantos (for himself and Mr. Gingrich) submitted the following resolution; which was referred to the Committee on Foreign Affairs

RESOLUTION

To express the condolences of the House of Representatives to the victims of recent terrorist attacks, to condemn acts of terrorism, reaffirm support for the Middle East peace process, and express the sense of the House of Representatives that the President should convene an international conference to develop more effective means to deal with the serious and growing threat of international terrorism.

Whereas the world has been rocked by a series of terrorist attacks in recent days, including the bombing of the Jewish cultural center in Buenos Aires, Argentina, which resulted in the death of at least 95 people and the injury of more than 200 others; two car bombings in London,

England, one targeted against the Israeli embassy and the second against a building housing a Jewish charity, which resulted in the injury of 19 people; and the bombing of a commuter plane in Panama which resulted in the death of 22 people, including three United States citizens;

- Whereas, although the most recent terrorist attacks have been directed against the government of Israel and against Jewish citizens of the countries where these terrorist attacks have occurred, these terrorist attacks have also resulted in the death and injury of individuals of all faiths and races;
- Whereas United States citizens and American property have been frequent objects of international terrorist attacks, including over one-fifth of all terrorist actions committed in the past year, the bombing of the World Trade Center in New York City and the planned bombing of other buildings, tunnels, and facilities in New York;
- Whereas the number of individuals killed through terrorist actions in 1994 as a result only of the recent terrorist incidents already exceeds the 109 deaths due to terrorist actions in 1993, which was the highest number reported in the past five years;
- Whereas radical opponents of the Middle East peace process, which has been given renewed impetus in recent days with the signing of the Washington Declaration between the governments of Israel and Jordan, have threatened to undermine and disrupt the peace process through terrorist atrocities against the State of Israel, the governments of other countries in the Middle East, and in countries elsewhere around the world; and

Whereas there is substantial evidence linking the Government of Iran and the radical Lebanese organization Hizbollah, which is supported by Iran, to these terrorist activities, as well as substantial evidence of their involvement in other terrorist activities: Now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the House of Representatives—

- (1) conveys to the families of the victims who died and to all those injured in the bombing of the Jewish cultural center in Buenos Aires, Argentina, the bombings in London, England, targeted against the Israeli embassy and a building housing a Jewish charity, and the bombing of a commuter aircraft in Panama the sincerest condolences of the House of Representatives;
- (2) condemns these acts of terrorism and all acts of terrorism as a grave threat to democracy and to pluralistic open societies and denounces all individuals, organizations, groups, and governments which engage in terrorism or which support or shelter those who engage in terrorism;
- (3) reaffirms its strongest support for the peace process now underway in the Middle East between Israel and the Palestinian people, between Israel and Jordan, and between Israel and other Arab states; condemns the effort by opponents to undermine the peace process through terrorist acts; and urges all

- 1 countries and peoples to work actively to bring peace 2 to that region;
 - (4) urges the President unilaterally to take action to strengthen political, diplomatic, and economic sanctions against Iran, as well as against all other countries which support international terrorism, including Libya, Iraq, Syria, Sudan, Cuba, and North Korea, and to strengthen United States efforts against radical Islamic groups, including Hizbollah, which engage in acts of terrorism;
 - (5) urges the President to work to place the issue of international terrorism on the agenda for the next summit meeting of the leaders of the G–7 group of nations and in this forum to raise directly with the Japanese and our European allies the issue of intensifying economic, political and diplomatic pressure against Iran and other state sponsors of terrorism;
 - (6) requests the President to work to bring the issue of international terrorism before the Organization of American States as a priority issue and to provide technical support and assistance to the countries of the Americas to improve their intelligence and investigative capacity to counter threats and acts of international terrorism; and

(7) urges the President of the United States to convene a conference on international terrorism with the participation and involvement of government leaders at the highest level, to intensify and coordinate an effective international response in order to prevent future acts of terrorism and to bring to justice the perpetrators of such heinous and criminal acts against humanity, and to intensify and coordinate international political, diplomatic, and economic sanctions against Iran and other countries which support international terrorism.
