- 5 SAFE SCHOOLS PROGRAM AUTHORIZED
- 6 SEC. 2. (a) With funds appropriated under subsection
- 7 (b)(1), the Secretary shall make competitive grants to eli-
- 8 gible local educational agencies to carry out projects de-
- 9 signed to achieve Goal Six of the National Education
- 10 Goals by helping to ensure that all schools are safe and
- 11 free of violence.
- 12 (b)(1) There are authorized to be appropriated to
- 13 carry out this Act \$75,000,000 for fiscal year 1994,

3	APPLICATIONS AND PLANS
4	SEC. 4. (a) In order to receive a grant under this
5	Act, an eligible local educational agency shall submit to
6	the Secretary an application that includes—
7	(1) an assessment of the current violence and
8	crime problems in the schools to be served by the
9	grant and in the community to be served by the
10	applicant;
11	(2) an assurance that the applicant has written
12	policies regarding school safety, student discipline,
13	and the appropriate handling of violent or disruptive
14	acts;
15	(3) a description of the schools and commu-
16	nities to be served by the grant, the activities and
17	projects to be carried out with grant funds, and how
18	these activities and projects will help to reduce the
19	current violence and crime problems in the schools
20	and communities served;
21	(4) if the local educational agency receives
22	funds under Goals 2000: Educate America Act, an
23	explanation of how activities assisted under this Act
24	will be coordinated with and support its systemic
25	education improvement plan prepared under that
26	Act;

- (5) the applicant's plan to establish school-level advisory committees, which include faculty, parents, staff, and students, for each school to be served by the grant and a description of how each committee will assist in assessing that school's violence and discipline problems as well as in designing appropriate programs, policies, and practices to combat those problems;
 - (6) the applicant's plan for collecting baseline and future data, by individual schools, to monitor violence and discipline problems and to measure its progress in achieving the purpose of this Act;
 - (7) an assurance that grant funds under this Act will be used to supplement and not to supplant State and local funds that would, in the absence of funds under this Act, be made available by the applicant for the purposes of the grant;
 - (8) an assurance that the applicant will cooperate with, and provide assistance to, the Secretary in gathering statistics and other data the Secretary determines are necessary to determine the effectiveness of projects and activities under this Act or the extent of school violence and discipline problems throughout the Nation; and

3	(b) In order to receive funds under this Act for the
4	second year of a project, a grantee shall submit to the
5	Secretary its comprehensive, long-term, school safety plan
6	for combating and preventing school violence and dis-

20	GRANTS AND USE OF FUNDS
21	SEC. 5. (a) Grants under this Act may not exceed—
22	(1) two years in duration; and
23	(2) \$3,000,000 for each year.
24	(b)(1) A local educational agency may use funds
25	awarded under section 2(a) for one or more of the follow-
26	ing activities—

- (A) identifying and assessing school violence and discipline problems, including coordinating needs assessment activities and education, law-enforcement, judicial, health, social service, and other appropriate agencies and organizations;
 - (B) conducting school safety reviews or violence prevention reviews of programs, policies, practices, and facilities to determine what changes are needed to reduce or prevent violence and promote safety and discipline;
 - (C) planning for comprehensive, long-term strategies for combating and preventing school violence and discipline problems through the involvement and coordination of school programs with other education, law-enforcement, judicial, health, social service, and other appropriate agencies and organizations;
 - (D) community education programs involving parents, businesses, local government, the media, and other appropriate entities about the local educational agency's plan to promote school safety and reduce and prevent school violence and discipline problems and the need for community support;
 - (E) coordination of school-based activities designed to promote school safety and reduce or pre-

3	health, social service, and other appropriate agencies
4	and organizations;
5	(F) developing and implementing violence pre-
6	vention activities, including—

22	(H) developing and implementing innovative
23	curricula to prevent violence in schools and training
24	staff how to stop disruptive or violent behavior if it
25	occurs:

1	(I) supporting "safe zones of passage" for stu-
2	dents between home and school through such meas-
3	ures as Drug- and Weapon-Free School Zones, en-
4	hanced law enforcement, and neighborhood patrols;
5	(J) counseling programs for victims and wit-

5	NATIONAL LEADERSHIP
6	SEC. 6. To carry out the purpose of this Act, the Sec-
