## A BILL

Entitled the "Middle East Peace Facilitation Act of 1993".

## **3 SECTION 1. FINDINGS.**

4 The Congress finds that—

(a) The Palestine Liberation Organization has 5 recognized the State of Israel's right to exist in 6 peace and security; accepted United Nations Secu-7 rity Council resolutions 242 and 338; committed it-8 self to the peace process and peaceful coexistence 9 10 with Israel, free from violence and all other acts 11 which endanger peace and stability; and assumed re-12 sponsibility over all PLO elements and personnel in
