To provide for the safety of journeymen boxers, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Professional Boxing
- 5 Safety Act".
- 6 **SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.**
- 7 For purposes of this Act—

18	SEC. 7. REPORTING.
19	(a) BOXING MATCH RESULTS. Not later than 48
20	business hours (excluding Saturdays and Sundays) after
21	the conclusion of a professional boxing match, the results
22	of such match shall be reported to the professional boxing
23	registries certified by the Association of Boxing Commis-
24	sioners (ABC) and to the Florida State Athletic Commis-
25	sion.

- 3 commission orders the suspension of a boxer, promoter,

- 9 (a) INJUNCTIONS.—Whenever the United States At-
- 10 torney in a State has reasonable cause to believe that a
- 11 person or entity is engaged in a violation of this Act in
- 12 such State, the United States Attorney may bring a civil
- 13 action in the appropriate district court of the United
- 14 States requesting such relief, including a permanent or
- 15 temporary injunction, restraining order, or other order,
- 16 against the person or entity, as the United States Attor-
- 17 ney determines necessary to restrain the person or entity
- 18 from continuing to engage in, or to sanction, a profes-
- 19 sional boxing match in violation of this Act.

- 21 (1) Managers and promoters.—Any man-
- 22 ager or promoter who knowingly and willfully vio-
- 23 lates any provision of this Act shall be imprisoned
- 24 for not more than 1 year or fined more than
- 25 \$20,000, or both.

3	Act shall be fined not more than \$1,000.

4	(7) the term "State boxing commission" means
5	a State agency with authority to regulate professional
6	boxing.
7	SEC. 3. PURPOSE.
8	The purposes of this Act are—
9	(1) to improve and expand the system of safety

15	SEC. 4. PROFESSIONAL BOXING MATCHES.

22	event in a State that does not have a boxing commis-
23	sion has entered into an agreement with the chief ad-

3	SEC. 5. REGISTRATION.
4	(a) REQUIREMENT.—Each professional boxer shall reg-

12	(b) Identification Card.—

14	issue to each professional boxer who registers in ac-
15	cordance with subsection (a), an identification card
16	that contains—
17	(A) a recent photograph of the boxer;
18	(B) the social security number of the boxer
19	(or, in the case of a foreign boxer, any similar
20	citizen identification number or professional
21	boxer number from the country of residence of
22	the boxer); and
23	(C) the personal identification numbers as-
24	signed to the boxer by the boxing registries cer-

16	(a) Boxing Match Results.—Not later than 48
17	business hours (excluding Saturdays and Sundays) after
18	the conclusion of a professional boxing match, the results
19	of such match shall be reported to the professional boxing
20	registries certified by the Association of Boxing Commis-
21	sions (ABC) and to the Florida State Athletic Commission.
22	(b) Suspensions.—Not later than 48 business hours
23	(excluding Saturdays and Sundays) after a State boxing
24	commission orders the suspension of a boxer, promoter, or
25	manager, such suspension shall be reported to the profes-

- 12 (a) Injunctions.—Whenever the United States Attor-
- 13 ney in a State has reasonable cause to believe that a person
- 14 or entity is engaged in a violation of this Act in such State,
- 15 the United States Attorney may bring a civil action in the
- 16 appropriate district court of the United States requesting
- 17 such relief, including a permanent or temporary injunction,
- 18 restraining order, or other order, against the person or en-
- 19 tity, as the United States Attorney determines necessary to
- 20 restrain the person or entity from continuing to engage in,
- 21 or to sanction, a professional boxing match in violation of
- 22 this Act.
- 23 (b) Criminal Penalties.—
- 24 (1) Managers, promoters, matchmakers,
- 25 AND LICENSEES.—Each manager, promoter, match-

- 1 maker, and licensee who knowingly and willfully vio-
- 2 lates any provision of this Act shall be imprisoned for
- 3 not more than 1 year or fined more than \$20,000, or
- 4 both.
- 5 (2) Boxers.—Any professional boxer who know-
- 6 ingly and willfully violates any provision of this Act
- 7 shall be fined not more than \$1,000.
- 8 **SEC. 9. STUDY.**
- 9 (a) In General.—The Secretary of Labor shall con-
- 10 duct a study on the feasibility and cost of a national pen-
- 11 sion system for professional boxers, including potential
- 12 funding sources.
- 13 (b) Report.—Not later than 180 days after the date
- 14 of enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Labor shall submit
- 15 a report to the Congress on the findings of the study con-
- 16 ducted pursuant to subsection (a).
