A BILL

To amend the Food, Agriculture, Conservation, and Trade Act of 1990 to provide that a single Federal agency shall be responsible for making technical determinations with respect to wetland or converted wetland on agricultural lands, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2	This	Act	may	be	cited	as	the	"Wetlands	Simplifica-
3	tion Act".								

4 SEC. 2. FINDINGS AND PURPOSES.

- (a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds that—
- (1) technical determinations with respect to wetland or converted wetland on agricultural lands (including the identification of wetland and the development of wetland restoration and mitigation plans) are currently made by—
 - (A) the Soil Conservation Service, in consultation with the Fish and Wildlife Service, to carry out subtitle C of title XII of the Food Security Act of 1985 (16 U.S.C. 3821 et seq.); and
 - (B) the Secretary of the Army, acting through the Chief of Engineers, to carry out section 404 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act (33 U.S.C. 1344);
- (2) the system of separate determinations made under such Acts has led to unnecessarily cumbersome and slow decisionmaking and to a lack of consistency and unpredictable results in determinations;
- (3) the lack of consistency places substantial burdens on private property owners that could be al-

- leviated if responsibility for making the determinations was carried out by one agency; and
- 4 (4) the Soil Conservation Service has a long 4 history of working with agricultural producers to 5 protect soil and water resources, has considerable 6 soils expertise, and has field personnel in almost 7 every county of the United States.
 - (b) Purposes.—It is the purpose of this Act to—
 - (1) provide that a single Federal agency shall be responsible for making technical determinations on agricultural lands with respect to wetland or converted wetland (including the identification of wetland and the development of wetland restoration and mitigation plans) in order to reduce confusion among agricultural producers; and
 - (2) provide that the Soil Conservation Service, in consultation with the Fish and Wildlife Service, shall be the Federal agency responsible for all such technical determinations concerning wetland and converted wetland on agricultural lands.

21 SEC. 3. COMPLIANCE WITH WETLAND CONSERVATION RE-

- 22 **QUIREMENTS.**
- 23 Section 1222(j) of the Food Security Act of 1985 (16
- 24 U.S.C. 3822(j)) is amended by adding at the end the fol-
- 25 lowing new paragraph:

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"(4)	Effect	OF	DETERMINATIONS.—
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"(A) IN GENERAL.—Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a technical determination with respect to wetland or converted wetland on agricultural lands (including the identification of wetland under paragraph (1) and the development of a wetland restoration or mitigation plan developed under paragraph (1)) shall be used in the administration of section 404 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act (33 U.S.C. 1344).

"(B) Consistency.—Any area of agricultural land or any activities related to the land determined to be exempt from the requirements of this subtitle shall also be exempt from the requirements of section 404 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act (33 U.S.C. 1344) for such period of time as those lands are used as agricultural lands.

"(C) DEFINITION.—As used in this paragraph, the term 'agricultural lands' means cropland, pastureland, native pasture, rangeland, orchards, vineyards, nonindustrial forest land, and any other land used to produce or support the production of an annual or perennial crop

- 2 product, or livestock.".

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
