SEPTEMBER 9 (legislative day, SEPTEMBER 7), 1993 Mr. KEMPTHORNE introduced the following joint resolution; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on the Judiciary

JOINT RESOLUTION

Designating October 27, 1993, as "National Unfunded Federal Mandates Day".

- Whereas in the Report of the National Performance Review issued on September 7, 1993, it states that "(T)he President should issue a directive limiting the use of unfunded mandates by the administration," and recommends that "Congress refrain from this practice.";
- Whereas the Congress recognizes and supports the efforts of States and local communities to provide quality government service to the people of the United States;
- Whereas, over the years, the hardship placed on State and local governments by the ever increasing burden of Federal regulation threatens to crush them under a mountain of regulations; and

Whereas knowledge of the impact of unfunded Federal mandates on State and local governments among the citizens of the United States is limited and as a result the United States Conference of Mayors, the National Association of Counties, the National League of Cities, and the International City/County Management Association have declared Wednesday, October 27, 1993, as "National Unfunded Federal Mandates Day" to heighten public awareness on this issue: Now, therefore, be it

1 Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, 2 That Wednesday, October 27, 1993, is designated as "Na-3 tional Unfunded Federal Mandates Day" in recognition 4 of the impact unfunded Federal mandates have on State 5 and local governments and in an attempt to heighten citi-6 7 zen awareness of this issue and to forge a new relationship with those levels of government. The President is author-8 ized and requested to issue a proclamation calling upon 9 the people of the United States to observe the day with 10 voluntary 11 appropriate programs, ceremonies, and 12 activities.
