JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the United States relating to taxes.

4 ing article is proposed as an amendment to the Constitu-

5 tion of the United States, which shall be valid to all intents

- 6 and purposes as part of the Constitution when ratified by
- 7 the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States with-

8 in seven years after the date of its submission for ratifica-

"ARTICLE —

"SECTION 1. Any bill, resolution, or other legislative
measure changing the internal revenue laws shall require
for final adoption in either House the concurrence of twothirds the members present, unless that bill, resolution,
or measure is determined at the time of adoption, in a
reasonable manner prescribed by law, not to increase the
internal revenue by more than a de minimis amount.

9 "SECTION 2. The Congress may waive section 1 when a declaration of war is in effect. The Congress may also 10 waive section 1 when the United States is engaged in mili-11 tary conflict which causes an imminent and serious threat 12 to national security and is so declared by a joint resolu-13 tion, adopted by a majority of the whole number of each 14 15 House, which becomes law. Any provision of law which would, standing alone, be subject to section 1 but for this 16 17 section and which becomes law pursuant to such a waiver shall be effective for not longer than 2 years. 18

"SECTION 3. All votes taken by the House of Representatives or the Senate under this article shall be determined by yeas and nays and the names of persons voting
for and against shall be entered on the Journal of each
House respectively.".
