AN ACT

To award a congressional gold medal to Ruth and Billy Graham.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. FINDINGS.

4 The Congress hereby finds the following:

1 (1) Ruth and Billy Graham have made out-2 standing and lasting contributions to morality, racial 3 equality, family, philanthropy, and religion. 4 (2) America's most respected and admired 5 evangelical leader for the past half century, Billy 6 Graham's crusades have reached 100,000,000 people 7 in person and reached over 2,000,000,000 people 8 worldwide on television. 9 (3) Billy Graham, throughout his 76 years of 10 life and his 52-year marriage to Ruth Graham, has 11 exemplified the highest ideals of teaching, counsel-12 ing, ethics, charity, faith, and family. 13 (4) Billy Graham's daily newspaper column and 14 14 books have provided spiritual counseling and per-15 sonal enrichment to millions of people. 16 (5) Ruth and Billy Graham have been the driv-17 ing force to create the Ruth and Billy Graham Chil-18 dren's Health Center at Memorial Mission Hospital 19 in Asheville, North Carolina, whose vision it is to im-20 prove the health and well-being of children and to 21 become a new resource for ending the pain and suf-22 fering of children.

23 SEC. 2. CONGRESSIONAL GOLD MEDAL.

(a) PRESENTATION AUTHORIZED.—The Speaker ofthe House of Representatives and the President pro tem-

pore of the Senate are authorized to present, on behalf
 of the Congress, to Billy and Ruth Graham a gold medal
 of appropriate design, in recognition of their outstanding
 and enduring contributions toward faith, morality, and
 charity.

6 (b) DESIGN AND STRIKING.—For purposes of the
7 presentation referred to in subsection (a), the Secretary
8 of the Treasury shall strike a gold medal with suitable em9 blems, devices, and inscriptions to be determined by the
10 Secretary.

11 (c) GIFTS AND DONATIONS.—

(1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of the Treasury may accept, use, and disburse gifts or donations
of property or money to carry out this section.

15 (2) NO APPROPRIATION AUTHORIZED.—No
16 amount is authorized to be appropriated to carry out
17 this section.

18 SEC. 3. DUPLICATE MEDALS.

19 The Secretary of the Treasury may strike and sell 20 duplicates in bronze of the gold medal struck pursuant 21 to section 2 under such regulations as the Secretary may 22 prescribe, at a price sufficient to cover the cost thereof, 23 including labor, materials, dies, use of machinery, and 24 overhead expenses, and the cost of the gold medal.

1 SEC. 4. STATUS OF MEDALS.

2 (a) NATIONAL MEDALS.—The medals struck pursu3 ant to this Act are national medals for purposes of chapter
4 51 of title 31, United States Code.

5 (b) NUMISMATIC ITEMS.—For purposes of section
6 5134 of title 31, United States Code, all medals struck
7 under this Act shall be considered to be numismatic items.
8 SEC. 5. TRANSFER OF ANY PROFIT TO LIBRARY OF CON9 GRESS.

10 The Secretary of the Treasury shall transfer an11 amount equal to the amount by which—

(1) the sum of any gifts and donations received
by the Secretary in accordance with section 2(c)(2)
and any proceeds from the sale of duplicate medals
under section 3, exceeds

16 (2) the total amount of the costs incurred by17 the Secretary in carrying out this Act,

18 from the Numismatic Public Enterprise Fund to the Li-

19 brary of Congress.
