Mr. CRANE (for himself and Mr. RANGEL) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Ways and Means

A BILL

To authorize the extension of nondiscriminatory treatment (most-favored-nation treatment) to the products of Bulgaria.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. CONGRESSIONAL FINDINGS AND SUPPLE-4 MENTAL ACTION.

5 (a) CONGRESSIONAL FINDINGS.—The Congress finds6 that Bulgaria—

7 (1) has received most-favored-nation treatment
8 since 1991 and has been found to be in full compli9 ance with the freedom of emigration requirements
10 under title IV of the Trade Act of 1974 since 1993;

(2) has reversed many years of Communist dic tatorship and instituted a constitutional republic
 ruled by a democratically elected government as well
 as basic market-oriented reforms, including privat ization;

6 (3) is in the process of acceding to the General 7 Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT) and the 8 World Trade Organization (WTO), and extension of 9 unconditional most-favored-nation treatment would 10 enable the United States to avail itself of all rights 11 under the GATT and the WTO with respect to Bul-12 garia; and

(4) has demonstrated a strong desire to build
friendly relationships and to cooperate fully with the
United States on trade matters.

16 (b) SUPPLEMENTAL ACTION.—The Congress notes that the United States Trade Representative intends to 17 negotiate with Bulgaria in order to preserve the commit-18 ments of that country under the bilateral commercial 19 20 agreement in effect between that country and the United 21 States that are consistent with the GATT and the WTO. 22 SEC. 2. TERMINATION OF APPLICATION OF TITLE IV OF 23 THE TRADE ACT OF 1974 TO BULGARIA.

24 (a) PRESIDENTIAL DETERMINATIONS AND EXTEN-25 SION OF NONDISCRIMINATORY TREATMENT.—Notwith-

standing any provision of title IV of the Trade Act of 1974
 (19 U.S.C. 2431 et seq.), the President may—

3 (1) determine that such title should no longer4 apply to Bulgaria; and

5 (2) after making a determination under para-6 graph (1) with respect to Bulgaria, proclaim the ex-7 tension of nondiscriminatory treatment (most-fa-8 vored-nation treatment) to the products of that 9 country.

10 (b) TERMINATION OF APPLICATION OF TITLE IV.— 11 On and after the effective date of the extension under sub-12 section (a)(2) of nondiscriminatory treatment to the prod-13 ucts of Bulgaria, title IV of the Trade Act of 1974 shall 14 cease to apply to that country.
