(1) applies to any manager or supervisor in

workday because of time worked by the manager or
supervisor on another workday.

(b) For purposes of this section, the term "manager
or supervisor" means any management official or supervisor, as such terms are defined in section 7103(a) (10)
and (11) of title 5, United States Code.

SEC. 203. Appropriated funds received by the Library
of Congress from other Federal agencies to cover general
and administrative overhead costs generated by perform-

1 ing reimbursable work for other agencies under the au2 thority of 31 U.S.C. 1535 and 1536 shall not be used to
3 employ more than 65 employees and may be expended or
4 obligated—

5 (1) in the case of a reimbursement, only to
6 such extent or in such amounts as are provided in
7 appropriations Acts; or

8 (2) in the case of an advance payment,9 only—

10 (A) to pay for such general or adminis11 trative overhead costs as are attributable to the
12 work performed for such agency; or

(B) to such extent or in such amounts
as are provided in appropriations Acts, with respect to any purpose not allowable under subparagraph (A).

17 SEC. 204. Of the amounts appropriated to the Li-18 brary of Congress in this Act, not more than \$5,000 may 19 be expended, on the certification of the Librarian of Con-20 gress, in connection with official representation and recep-21 tion expenses for the incentive awards program.

SEC. 205. Of the amount appropriated to the Library
of Congress in this Act, not more than \$12,000 may be
expended, on the certification of the Librarian of Con-

3 SEC. 206. (a) For fiscal year 1997, the obligational 4 authority of the Library of Congress for the activities de-5 scribed in subsection (b) may not exceed \$108,275,000.

6 (b) The activities referred to in subsection (a) are re7 imbursable and revolving fund activities that are funded
8 from sources other than appropriations to the Library in
9 appropriations Acts for the legislative branch.

10 SEC. 207. (a)(1) Subject to subsection (b), for fiscal 11 year 1997, the obligational authority of the Library of 12 Congress for the activities described in paragraph (2) may 13 not exceed \$2,000,000.

(2) The activities referred to in paragraph (1) are
non-expenditure transfer activities in support of parliamentary development that are funded from sources
other than appropriations to the Library in appropriations
Acts for the legislative branch.

19 (b) The obligational authority under subsection (a)—

- 20 (1) shall be available only with respect to Rus-
- 21 sia, Ukraine, Albania, Slovakia, and Romania; and
- (2) shall expire on December 31, 1996.

SEC. 208. (a) Amounts appropriated for fiscal year
1997 for the Library of Congress under the headings specified in subsection (b) may be transferred among such

headings, upon approval of the Committee on Appropria tions of the House of Representatives and the Committee
 on Appropriations of the Senate.

4 (b) The headings referred to in subsection (a) are as
5 follows: (1) in title I, "CONGRESSIONAL RESEARCH SERV6 ICE", "SALARIES AND EXPENSES"; and (2) in this title,
7 "SALARIES AND EXPENSES"; "COPYRIGHT OFFICE",
8 "SALARIES AND EXPENSES"; "BOOKS FOR THE BLIND
9 AND PHYSICALLY HANDICAPPED", "SALARIES AND EX10 PENSES"; and "FURNITURE AND FURNISHINGS".

11 SEC. 209. From and after October 1, 1996, the Dis-12 bursing Officer of the Library of Congress is authorized 13 to disburse funds appropriated for the Office of Compliance, and the Library of Congress shall provide financial 14 15 management support to the Office of Compliance as may be required and mutually agreed to by the Librarian of 16 Congress and the Executive Director of the Office of Com-17 pliance. The Library of Congress is further authorized to 18 compute and disburse the basic pay of all personnel of the 19 20 Office of Compliance pursuant to the provisions of section 21 5504 of title 5.

All vouchers certified for payment by duly authorized certifying officers of the Library of Congress shall be supported with a certification by an officer or employee of the Office of Compliance duly authorized in writing by the

Executive Director of the Office of Compliance to certify 1 2 payments from appropriations of the Office of Compliance. 3 The Office of Compliance certifying officers shall (1) be 4 held responsible for the existence and correctness of the 5 facts recited in the certificate or otherwise stated on the voucher or its supporting paper and the legality of the pro-6 7 posed payment under the appropriation or fund involved, 8 (2) be held responsible and accountable for the correctness 9 of the computations of certifications made, and (3) be held 10 accountable for and required to make good to the United States the amount of any illegal, improper, or incorrect 11 12 payment resulting from any false, inaccurate, or mislead-13 ing certificate made by them, as well as for any payment prohibited by law which did not represent a legal obliga-14 15 tion under the appropriation or fund involved: *Provided*, That the Comptroller General of the United States may, 16 17 at his discretion, relieve such certifying officer or employee 18 of liability for any payment otherwise proper whenever he finds (1) that the certification was based on official 19 20 records and that such certifying officer or employee did 21 not know, and by reasonable diligence and inquiry could 22 not have ascertained the actual facts, or (2) that the obli-23 gation was incurred in good faith, that the payment was 24 not contrary to any statutory provision specifically prohib-25 iting payments of the character involved, and the United

States has received value for such payment: Provided fur-1 ther, That the Comptroller General shall relieve such cer-2 3 tifying officer or employee of liability for an overpayment 4 for transportation services made to any common carrier 5 covered by section 3726 of title 31, whenever he finds that the overpayment occurred solely because the administra-6 7 tive examination made prior to payment of the transpor-8 tation bill did not include a verification of transportation 9 rates, freight classifications, or land grant deductions.

10 The Disbursing Officer of the Library of Congress 11 shall not be held accountable or responsible for any illegal, 12 improper, or incorrect payment resulting from any false, 13 inaccurate, or misleading certificate, the responsibility for 14 which is imposed upon a certifying officer or employee of 15 the Office of Compliance.

For all necessary expenses for the mechanical and
structural maintenance, care and operation of the Library
buildings and grounds, \$9,003,000, of which \$560,000
shall remain available until expended.

4 For expenses of the Office of Superintendent of Doc-5 uments necessary to provide for the cataloging and indexing of Government publications and their distribution to 6 7 the public, Members of Congress, other Government agen-8 cies, and designated depository and international exchange 9 libraries as authorized by law, \$29,077,000: Provided, 10 That travel expenses, including travel expenses of the Depository Library Council to the Public Printer, shall not 11 12 exceed \$150,000: Provided further, That amounts of not 13 more than \$2,000,000, from current year appropriations are authorized for producing and disseminating Congres-14 15 sional serial sets and other related publications for 1995 and 1996 to depository and other designated libraries. 16

17 GOVERNMENT PRINTING OFFICE REVOLVING FUND

18 The Government Printing Office is hereby authorized to make such expenditures, within the limits of funds 19 20 available and in accord with the law, and to make such 21 contracts and commitments without regard to fiscal year 22 limitations as provided by section 9104 of title 31, United 23 States Code, as may be necessary in carrying out the pro-24 grams and purposes set forth in the budget for the current 25 fiscal year for the Government Printing Office revolving

fund: *Provided*, That not more than \$2,500 may be ex-1 pended on the certification of the Public Printer in connec-2 3 tion with official representation and reception expenses: 4 *Provided further*, That the revolving fund shall be available 5 for the hire or purchase of not more than twelve passenger motor vehicles: *Provided further*, That expenditures in con-6 7 nection with travel expenses of the advisory councils to 8 the Public Printer shall be deemed necessary to carry out 9 the provisions of title 44, United States Code: Provided 10 *further*, That the revolving fund shall be available for temporary or intermittent services under section 3109(b) of 11 title 5, United States Code, but at rates for individuals 12 13 not more than the daily equivalent of the annual rate of basic pay for level V of the Executive Schedule under sec-14 15 tion 5316 of such title: *Provided further*, That the revolving fund and the funds provided under the headings "OF-16 FICE OF SUPERINTENDENT OF DOCUMENTS" and "SALA-17 RIES AND EXPENSES" together may not be available for 18 19 the full-time equivalent employment of more than 3,600 20 workyears by the end of fiscal year 1997: Provided further, 21 That activities financed through the revolving fund may 22 provide information in any format: *Provided further*, That 23 the revolving fund shall not be used to administer any 24 flexible or compressed work schedule which applies to any 25 manager or supervisor in a position the grade or level of which is equal to or higher than GS-15: *Provided further*,
 That expenses for attendance at meetings shall not exceed
 \$75,000.

6 For necessary expenses of the General Accounting 7 Office, including not more than \$7,000 to be expended on 8 the certification of the Comptroller General of the United 9 States in connection with official representation and recep-10 tion expenses; temporary or intermittent services under section 3109(b) of title 5, United States Code, but at rates 11 12 for individuals not more than the daily equivalent of the 13 annual rate of basic pay for level IV of the Executive Schedule under section 5315 of such title; hire of one pas-14 15 senger motor vehicle; advance payments in foreign countries in accordance with 31 U.S.C. 3324; benefits com-16 17 parable to those payable under sections 901(5), 901(6)18 and 901(8) of the Foreign Service Act of 1980 (22 U.S.C. 4081(5), 4081(6) and 4081(8); and under regulations 19 20 prescribed by the Comptroller General of the United 21 States, rental of living quarters in foreign countries; 22 \$332,520,000: *Provided*, That not more than \$100,000 of 23 reimbursements received incident to the operation of the 24 General Accounting Office Building shall be available for 25 use in fiscal year 1997: Provided further, That notwith-

standing 31 U.S.C. 9105 hereafter amounts reimbursed 1 2 to the Comptroller General pursuant to that section shall be deposited to the appropriation of the General Account-3 4 ing Office then available and remain available until ex-5 pended, and not more than \$5,805,000 of such funds shall be available for use in fiscal year 1997: Provided further, 6 7 That this appropriation and appropriations for adminis-8 trative expenses of any other department or agency which 9 is a member of the Joint Financial Management Improve-10 ment Program (JFMIP) shall be available to finance an appropriate share of JFMIP costs as determined by the 11 12 JFMIP, including the salary of the Executive Director 13 and secretarial support: *Provided further*, That this appropriation and appropriations for administrative expenses of 14 15 any other department or agency which is a member of the National Intergovernmental Audit Forum or a Regional 16 17 Intergovernmental Audit Forum shall be available to finance an appropriate share of Forum costs as determined 18 19 by the Forum, including necessary travel expenses of non-20 Federal participants. Payments hereunder to either the 21 Forum or the JFMIP may be credited as reimbursements 22 to any appropriation from which costs involved are initially 23 financed: *Provided further*, That to the extent that funds 24 are otherwise available for obligation, agreements or con-25 tracts for the removal of asbestos, and renovation of the

building and building systems (including the heating, ven-1 2 tilation and air conditioning system, electrical system and 3 other major building systems) of the General Accounting 4 Office Building may be made for periods not exceeding 5 five years: *Provided further*, That this appropriation and appropriations for administrative expenses of any other 6 7 department or agency which is a member of the American 8 Consortium on International Public Administration 9 (ACIPA) shall be available to finance an appropriate share 10 of ACIPA costs as determined by the ACIPA, including any expenses attributable to membership of ACIPA in the 11 12 International Institute of Administrative Sciences.

13 TITLE III—GENERAL PROVISIONS

14 SEC. 301. No part of the funds appropriated in this 15 Act shall be used for the maintenance or care of private 16 vehicles, except for emergency assistance and cleaning as 17 may be provided under regulations relating to parking fa-18 cilities for the House of Representatives issued by the 19 Committee on House Oversight and for the Senate issued 20 by the Committee on Rules and Administration.

SEC. 302. No part of the funds appropriated in this
Act shall remain available for obligation beyond fiscal year
1997 unless expressly so provided in this Act.

SEC. 303. Whenever in this Act any office or positionnot specifically established by the Legislative Pay Act of

1929 is appropriated for or the rate of compensation or 1 2 designation of any office or position appropriated for is 3 different from that specifically established by such Act, 4 the rate of compensation and the designation in this Act 5 shall be the permanent law with respect thereto: *Provided*, That the provisions in this Act for the various items of 6 official expenses of Members, officers, and committees of 7 8 the Senate and House of Representatives, and clerk hire 9 for Senators and Members of the House of Representa-10 tives shall be the permanent law with respect thereto.

11 SEC. 304. The expenditure of any appropriation 12 under this Act for any consulting service through procure-13 ment contract, pursuant to 5 U.S.C. 3109, shall be limited 14 to those contracts where such expenditures are a matter 15 of public record and available for public inspection, except 16 where otherwise provided under existing law, or under ex-17 isting Executive order issued pursuant to existing law.

18 SEC. 305. (a) It is the sense of the Congress that,
19 to the greatest extent practicable, all equipment and prod20 ucts purchased with funds made available in this Act
21 should be American-made.

(b) In providing financial assistance to, or entering
into any contract with, any entity using funds made available in this Act, the head of each Federal agency, to the
greatest extent practicable, shall provide to such entity a

notice describing the statement made in subsection (a) by
 the Congress.

3 (c) If it has been finally determined by a court or 4 Federal agency that any person intentionally affixed a label bearing a "Made in America" inscription, or any in-5 scription with the same meaning, to any product sold in 6 7 or shipped to the United States that is not made in the 8 United States, such person shall be ineligible to receive 9 any contract or subcontract made with funds provided 10 pursuant to this Act, pursuant to the debarment, suspension, and ineligibility procedures described in section 11 9.400 through 9.409 of title 48, Code of Federal Regula-12 13 tions.

14 SEC. 306. During fiscal year 1997 and fiscal years 15 thereafter, amounts appropriated to the Architect of the 16 Capitol (including amounts relating to the Botanic Gar-17 den) may be transferred among accounts available to the 18 Architect of the Capitol upon the approval of—

(1) the Committee on Appropriations of the
House of Representatives, in the case of amounts
transferred from the appropriation for Capitol buildings and grounds under the heading "HOUSE OFFICE
BUILDINGS";

24 (2) the Committee on Appropriations of the25 Senate, in the case of amounts transferred from the

appropriation for Capitol buildings and grounds
 under the heading "SENATE OFFICE BUILDINGS";
 and

4 (3) the Committees on Appropriations of the
5 Senate and the House of Representatives, in the
6 case of amounts transferred from any other appro7 priation.

8 SEC. 307. (a) Upon approval of the Committee on 9 Appropriations of the House of Representatives, and in 10 accordance with conditions determined by the Committee on House Oversight, positions in connection with House 11 12 public address sound system activities and related funding 13 shall be transferred from the appropriation for the Architect of the Capitol for Capitol buildings and grounds under 14 the heading "CAPITOL BUILDINGS" to the appropriation 15 for salaries and expenses of the House of Representatives 16 17 for the Office of the Clerk under the heading "SALARIES, 18 OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES".

(b) For purposes of section 8339(m) of title 5, United
States Code, the days of unused sick leave to the credit
of any such employee as of the date such employee is
transferred under subsection (a) shall be included in the
total service of such employee in connection with the computation of any annuity under subsections (a) through (e)
and (o) of such section.

1 (c) In the case of days of annual leave to the credit 2 of any such employee as of the date such employee is 3 transferred under subsection (a), the Architect of the Cap-4 itol is authorized to make a lump sum payment to each 5 such employee for that annual leave. No such payment 6 shall be considered a payment or compensation within the 7 meaning of any law relating to dual compensation.

8 SEC. 308. (a) Effective October 1, 1996, the respon-9 sibility for maintenance of security systems for the Capitol 10 buildings and grounds is transferred from the Architect of the Capitol to the Capitol Police Board. Such mainte-11 nance shall be carried out under the direction of the Com-12 13 mittee on House Oversight of the House of Representatives and the Committee on Rules and Administration of 14 15 the Senate. On and after October 1, 1996, any alteration to a structural, mechanical, or architectural feature of the 16 17 Capitol buildings and grounds that is required for security 18 system maintenance under the preceding sentence may be carried out only with the approval of the Architect of the 19 20 Capitol.

(b)(1) Effective October 1, 1996, all positions specified in paragraph (2) and each individual holding any such
position (on a permanent basis) immediately before that
date, as identified by the Architect of the Capitol, shall
be transferred to the Capitol Police.

(2) The positions referred to in paragraph (1) are
 those positions which, immediately before October 1,
 1996, are—

4 (A) under the Architect of the Capitol;
5 (B) within the Electronics Engineering Division
6 of the Office of the Architect of the Capitol; and
7 (C) related to the maintenance of security sys8 tems for the Capitol buildings and grounds.

9 (3) All annual leave and sick leave standing to the 10 credit of an individual immediately before such individual 11 is transferred under paragraph (1) shall be credited to 12 such individual, without adjustment, in the new position 13 of the individual.

14 SEC. 309. Such sums as may be necessary are appro-15 priated to the account described in subsection (a) of sec-16 tion 415 of Public Law 104–1 to pay awards and settle-17 ments as authorized under such subsection.

18 SEC. 310. Any amount appropriated in this Act for 19 "HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES—Salaries and Ex-20 penses—Members' Representational Allowances" shall be 21 available only for fiscal year 1997. Any amount remaining 22 after all payments are made under such allowances for 23 such fiscal year shall be deposited in the Treasury, to be 24 used for deficit reduction. 1 SEC. 311. (a) Each mass mailing sent by a Member 2 of the House of Representatives shall bear in a prominent 3 place on its face, or on the envelope or outside cover or 4 wrapper in which the mail matter is sent, the following notice: "THIS MAILING WAS PREPARED, PUBLISHED, 5 AND MAILED AT TAXPAYER EXPENSE.", or a notice to 6 the same effect in words which may be prescribed under 7 8 subsection (c). The notice shall be printed in a type size 9 not smaller than 7-point.

10 (b)(1) There shall be published in the itemized report 11 of disbursements of the House of Representatives as re-12 quired by law, a summary tabulation setting forth, for the 13 office of each Member of the House of Representatives, 14 the total number of pieces of mass mail mailed during the 15 period involved and the total cost of those mass mailings.

16 (2) Each such tabulation shall also include—

(A) the total cost (as referred to in paragraph
(1)) divided by the number (as determined by the
Postmaster General) of addresses (other than business possible delivery stops) in the Congressional
district from which the Member was elected (as such
addresses are described in section 3210(d)(7)(B) of
title 39, United States Code); and

(B) the total number of pieces of mass mail (as
referred to in paragraph (1)) divided by the number

1 (as determined by the Postmaster General) of ad-2 dresses (other than business possible delivery stops) 3 in the Congressional district from which the Member 4 was elected (as such addresses are described in sec-5 tion 3210(d)(7)(B) of title 39, United States Code). 6 (c) The Committee on House Oversight shall pre-7 scribe such rules and regulations and shall take such other 8 action as the Committee considers necessary and proper 9 for Members to conform to the provisions of this sub-10 section and applicable rules and regulations.

11 (d) For purposes of this section—

(1) the term "Member of the House of Representatives" means a Representative in, or a Delegate or Resident Commissioner to, the Congress;
and

16 (2) the term "mass mailing" has the meaning
17 given such term by section 3210(a)(6)(E) of title 39,
18 United States Code.

(e) This section shall apply with respect to sessionsof Congress beginning after the date of the enactment ofthis Act.

SEC. 312. (a) In addition to any other estimates the Director is required to make pursuant to the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 and the Rules of the House of Representatives, the Director of the Congressional

1 Budget Office shall, upon the request of the chairman of 2 the Committee on the Budget of the House of Representa-3 tives (after consultation with the ranking minority mem-4 ber of that committee), prepare an estimate for any major 5 spending legislation, as designated by the majority leader of the House of Representatives (after consultation with 6 7 the minority leader of the House), of the change in spend-8 ing and revenues resulting from that legislation on the 9 basis of assumptions that estimate the probable dynamic 10 macroeconomic feedback effects of such legislation, and shall include a statement identifying those assumptions. 11 12 Such estimates shall be submitted to the chairmen and 13 ranking minority members of the Committee on the Budget and of the committees of subject-matter jurisdiction, 14 15 and, if timely submitted, shall be included in the reports on such legislation. 16

17 (b) In addition to any other estimates the Chief of Staff is required to make pursuant to the Congressional 18 19 Budget Act of 1974, the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, and the Rules of the House of Representatives, the Chief 20 21 of Staff of the Joint Committee on Taxation shall, upon 22 the request of the chairman of the Committee on Ways 23 and Means of the House of Representatives (after con-24 sultation with the ranking minority member of that com-25 mittee), prepare an analysis of any major tax legislation,

as designated by the majority leader of the House of Rep-1 2 resentatives (after consultation with the minority leader 3 of the House), of the change in spending and revenues 4 resulting from that legislation on the basis of assumptions 5 that estimate the probable dynamic macroeconomic feedback effects of such legislation, and shall include a state-6 7 ment identifying those assumptions. Such analyses shall 8 be submitted to the chairmen and ranking minority mem-9 bers of the Committee on Ways and Means and of the 10 committees of subject-matter jurisdiction, and, if timely 11 submitted, shall be included in the reports on such legisla-12 tion.

13 (c) Estimates and analyses made pursuant to this14 section are to be used for informational purposes only.

15 This Act may be cited as the "Legislative Branch Ap-16 propriations Act, 1997".
