A BILL

- To save lives and prevent injuries to children in motor vehicles through improved national, State, and local child passenger protection program.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Child Passenger Pro-
- 5 tection Act".

6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

- 7 The Congress finds the following:
- 8 (1) Annually the losses in the United States9 from motor vehicle collisions is estimated to be over

1	800 deaths and over 80,000 injuries to children
2	through the age of 4.
3	(2) Properly used child restraints in motor vehi-
4	cles can reduce the chance of serious or fatal injury
5	in a motor vehicle collision by 69 percent for infants
6	and 47 percent for toddlers through the age of 4.
7	(3) Some of the most common seating position
8	designs that have emerged in motor vehicles during
9	the last decade make secure installation of child re-
10	straints difficult and, in some circumstances, impos-
11	sible.
12	(4) Results from regional child restraint clinics
13	have shown that 70 to 90 percent of child restraints
14	are improperly installed or otherwise misused largely
15	due to the complication and wide variation of seat
16	belt and child restraint designs.
17	(5) There is an immediate need to expand the
18	availability of national, State, and local child re-
19	straint education programs and supporting resources
20	and materials to help agencies and associated orga-
21	nizations to carry out effective public education in
22	child restraints.
23	SEC. 3. CHILD PASSENGER EDUCATION.

23 SEC. 3. CHILD PASSENGER EDUCATION.

(a) AWARDS.—The Secretary may enter into con-tracts or cooperative agreements with, and may make

grants to, State highway offices and other experienced
 child passenger safety organizations to obtain and distrib ute national, State, and local child restraint education pro grams and supporting educational materials.

5 (b) USE OF FUNDS.—Funds provided under a con-6 tract, cooperative agreement, or grant under subsection 7 (a) shall be used to implement child restraint programs 8 which are designed to prevent deaths and injuries to chil-9 dren through the age of 4 and which—

(1) educate the public in all aspects of proper
installation of child restraints using standard seat
belt hardware, supplemental hardware and modification devices where needed, and special installation
techniques;

(2) educate the public in appropriate child restraint design selection and placement and in harness threading and harness adjustment; and

(3) train and retrain child passenger safety professionals, police officers, fire and emergency medical personnel, and other educators in all aspects of
child restraint use.

(c) DISTRIBUTION OF FUNDS.—An entity which receives funds under a contract, cooperative agreement, or
grant under subsection (a) shall in carrying out subsection
(b)—

(1) use not more than 25 percent of such funds
 on existing nationwide child restraint education pro grams;

4 (2) use not more than 25 percent of such funds
5 on existing State child restraint education programs;
6 and

7 (3) use at least 50 percent of such funds to im8 plement new national, State, and local child re9 straint education programs.

10 SEC. 4. APPLICATIONS AND REPORTS.

(a) APPLICATIONS.—An entity desiring a contract,
cooperative agreement, or grant under section 3(a) shall
submit an application to the Secretary at such time, in
such manner, and accompanied by such information as the
Secretary may reasonably require.

16 (b) REPORTS.—An entity which receives a contract, cooperative agreement, or grant under section 3(a) shall 17 prepare and submit to the Secretary an annual report dur-18 ing the period in which it receives funds under such con-19 20 tract, cooperative agreement, or grant. Such a report shall 21 contain such information as the Secretary may require 22 and shall, at a minimum, describe the program activities 23 undertaken with such funds, including—

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(1) any child restraint education program that
 has been developed directly or indirectly by such en tity and the target population of such program;
 (2) support materials for such a program that

have been obtained by such entity and the method
by which the entity distributed such materials; and
(3) any initiatives undertaken by such entity to
develop public-private partnerships to secure nonFederal support for the development and distribution of child restraint education programs and materials.

12 SEC. 5. REPORT TO CONGRESS.

13 The Secretary shall prepare and submit to the Con-14 gress an annual report on the implementation of this Act 15 which includes a description of the programs undertaken 16 and materials developed and distributed by entities receiv-17 ing funds under section 3(a).

18 SEC. 6. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

For the purpose of carrying out section 3 of this Act,
there are authorized to be appropriated to the Secretary
\$7,500,000 for each of the fiscal years 1998 and 1999,
of which not more than \$350,000 may be spent in any
fiscal year for administrative costs.

24 SEC. 7. DEFINITIONS.

25 For purposes of this Act—

(1) the term "Secretary" means the Secretary
 of Transportation;

3 (2) the term "child restraint education pro4 grams" includes publications, audiovisual presen5 tations, demonstrations, and computerized pro6 grams; and

7 (3) the term "State" means any State of the
8 United States, the District of Columbia, the Com9 monwealth of Puerto Rico, the United States Virgin
10 Islands, Guam, American Samoa, the Northern Mar11 iana Islands, and any other territory or possession
12 of the United States.

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
