A BILL

To control and prevent commercial counterfeiting, and for other purposes.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-

2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Anticounterfeiting5 Consumer Protection Act of 1995".

6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

7 The counterfeiting of trademarked and copyrighted8 merchandise—

9 (1) has been connected with organized crime;

(2) deprives legitimate trademark and copyright
 owners of substantial revenues and consumer good will;

4 (3) poses health and safety threats to American5 consumers;

6 (4) eliminates American jobs; and

7 (5) is a multibillion-dollar drain on the United8 States economy.

9 SEC. 3. COUNTERFEITING AS RACKETEERING.

Section 1961(1)(B) of title 18, United States Code, 10 is amended by inserting ", section 2318 (relating to traf-11 ficking in counterfeit labels for phonorecords, computer 12 programs or computer program documentation or packag-13 ing and copies of motion pictures or other audiovisual 14 works), section 2319 (relating to criminal infringement of 15 a copyright), section 2320 (relating to trafficking in goods 16 or services bearing counterfeit marks)" after "sections 17 2314 and 2315 (relating to interstate transportation of 18 stolen property),". 19

20 SEC. 4. APPLICATION TO COMPUTER PROGRAMS, COM-21PUTER PROGRAM DOCUMENTATION, OR22PACKAGING.

23 Section 2318 of title 18, United States Code, is24 amended—

(1) in subsection (a), by inserting "a computer
 program or computer program documentation or
 packaging or" after "copy of";

4 (2) in subsection (b)(3), by inserting "'com5 puter program,'" after "'motion picture,'"; and
6 (3) in subsection (c)(3), by inserting "a copy of

a computer program or computer program docu-mentation or packaging," after "enclose,".

9 SEC. 5. TRAFFICKING IN COUNTERFEIT GOODS OR SERV10 ICES.

11 Section 2320 of title 18, United States Code, is 12 amended by adding at the end the following new sub-13 section:

14 "(e) Beginning with the first year after the date of 15 enactment of this subsection, the Attorney General shall include in the report of the Attorney General to Congress 16 on the business of the Department of Justice prepared 17 pursuant to section 522 of title 28, on a district by district 18 basis, for all actions involving trafficking in counterfeit la-19 bels for phonorecords, copies of computer programs or 20 21 computer program documentation or packaging, copies of 22 motion pictures or other audiovisual works (as defined in section 2318 of title 18), criminal infringement of copy-23 24 rights (as defined in section 2319 of title 18), or traffick-

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ing in goods or services bearing counterfeit marks (as de-1 fined in section 2320 of title 18, an accounting of— 2

"(1) the number of open investigations; "(2) the number of cases referred by the United 4 States Customs Service; 5

"(3) the number of cases referred by other 6 7 agencies or sources; and

8 "(4) the number and outcome, including settle-9 ments, sentences, recoveries, and penalties, of all prosecutions brought under sections 2318, 2319, 10 11 and 2320 of title 18.".

12 **SEC. 6. SEIZURE OF COUNTERFEIT GOODS.**

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13 Section 34(d)(9) of the Act of July 5, 1946 (60 Stat. 427, chapter 540; 15 U.S.C. 1116(d)(9)), is amended by 14 15 striking the first sentence and inserting the following: "The court shall order that service of a copy of the order 16 under this subsection shall be made by a Federal law en-17 forcement officer (such as a United States marshal or an 18 officer or agent of the United States Customs Service, Se-19 cret Service, Federal Bureau of Investigation, or Post Of-20 fice) or may be made by a State or local law enforcement 21 22 officer, who, upon making service, shall carry out the sei-23 zure under the order.".

1 SEC. 7. RECOVERY FOR VIOLATION OF RIGHTS.

2 Section 35 of the Act of July 5, 1946 (60 Stat. 427,
3 chapter 540; 15 U.S.C. 1117), is amended by adding at
4 the end the following new subsection:

"(c) In a case involving the use of a counterfeit mark 5 (as defined in section 34(d) (15 U.S.C. 1116(d)) in con-6 7 nection with the sale, offering for sale, or distribution of 8 goods or services, the plaintiff may elect, at any time be-9 fore final judgment is rendered by the trial court, to recover, instead of actual damages and profits under sub-10 section (a), an award of statutory damages for any such 11 use in the amount of— 12

13 "(1) not less than \$500 or more than \$100,000
14 per counterfeit mark per type of goods or services
15 sold, offered for sale, or distributed, as the court
16 considers just; or

"(2) if the court finds that the use of the counterfeit mark was willful, not more than \$1,000,000
per counterfeit mark per type of goods or services
sold, offered for sale, or distributed, as the court
considers just.".

22 SEC. 8. DISPOSITION OF EXCLUDED ARTICLES.

Section 603(c) of title 17, United States Code, is amended in the second sentence by striking "as the case may be;" and all that follows through the end and inserting "as the case may be.".

1	0 SEC. 9. DISPOSITION OF MERCHANDISE BEARING AMER-
2	ICAN TRADEMARK.
3	Section 526(e) of the Tariff Act of 1930 (19 U.S.C.
4	1526(e)) is amended—
5	(1) in the second sentence, by inserting "de-
6	stroy the merchandise. Alternatively, if the merchan-
7	dise is not unsafe or a hazard to health, and the
8	Secretary has the consent of the trademark owner,
9	the Secretary may" after "shall, after forfeiture,";
10	(2) by inserting "or" at the end of paragraph
11	(2);
12	(3) by striking '', or'' at the end of paragraph
13	(3) and inserting a period; and
14	(4) by striking paragraph (4).
15	SEC. 10. CIVIL PENALTIES.
16	Section 526 of the Tariff Act of 1930 (19 U.S.C.
17	1526) is amended by adding at the end the following new
18	subsection:
19	((f)(1) Any person who directs, assists financially or
20	otherwise, or is in any way concerned in the importation

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22 under subsection (e) shall be subject to a civil fine.

by inserting "vessel or aircraft" before "manifest";
(2) by amending subparagraph (D) to read as
follows:

18 "(D) The name of the vessel, aircraft, or car-19 rier.";

20 (3) by amending subparagraph (E) to read as21 follows:

"(E) The seaport or airport of loading."; and

23 (4) by amending subparagraph (F) to read as24 follows:

25 "(F) The seaport or airport of discharge.".

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1 SEC. 12. CUSTOMS ENTRY DOCUMENTATION.

Section 484(d) of the Tariff Act of 1930 (19 U.S.C.
 3 1484(d)) is amended—

4 (1) by striking "Entries" and inserting "(1)
5 Entries"; and

6 (2) by adding at the end the following new7 paragraph:

8 "(2) The Secretary, in prescribing regulations governing the content of entry documentation, shall require 9 that entry documentation contain such information as may 10 be necessary to determine whether the imported merchan-11 dise bears an infringing trademark in violation of section 12 42 of the Act of July 5, 1946 (60 Stat. 440, chapter 540; 13 14 15 U.S.C. 1124) or any other applicable law, including a trademark appearing on the goods or packaging.". 15

23 (2) by striking the period at the end of para24 graph (5) and inserting "; or"; and

25 (3) by adding at the end the following new26 paragraph:

"(6)(A) A counterfeit label for a phonorecord,
 computer program or computer program documenta tion or packaging or copy of a motion picture or
 other audiovisual work (as defined in section 2318
 of title 18);

6 "(B) a phonorecord or copy in violation of sec-7 tion 2319 of title 18; or

8 ''(C) any good bearing a counterfeit mark (as
9 defined in section 2320 of title 18).''.

10 SEC. 14. REGULATIONS.

Not later than 6 months after the date of enactment
of this Act, the Secretary of the Treasury shall prescribe
such regulations or amendments to existing regulations
that may be necessary to implement and enforce this Act.

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
