## A BILL

To amend the Communications Act of 1934 to authorize the States to regulate interference with radio frequencies.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-

2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. AUTHORITY OF STATES TO REGULATE RADIO
 4 FREQUENCY INTERFERENCE.

5 Section 302 of the Communications Act of 1934 (47
6 U.S.C. 302) is amended by adding at the end the follow7 ing:

8 "(e) Where radio frequency interference to home elec9 tronic equipment is caused by a CB radio station through
10 the use of a transmitter or amplifier that is not authorized

for use by a CB radio station pursuant to Commission 1 2 rules, the State, county, municipal, or other local govern-3 ment shall not be preempted from exercising its police 4 powers to resolve the interference by prohibiting the use 5 of such unauthorized equipment or by imposing fines or 6 other monetary sanctions. For purpose of this subsection, 7 home electronic equipment includes, but is not limited to, 8 television receivers, radio receivers, stereo components or 9 systems, video cassette recorders, audio recorders, loud 10 speakers, telephone equipment and other electronic devices 11 normally used in the home. Any action taken by the State, 12 county, municipal, or local government shall not preclude 13 concurrent action by the Commission. Nothing in this sub-14 section shall be construed to diminish the Commission's 15 exclusive jurisdiction over radio frequency interference in any matter outside the scope of this subsection.". 16
