Mr. DOLE (for himself, Mr. SIMON, Mr. HELMS, Mr. ROBB, Mr. McCAIN, Mr. D'AMATO, Mr. KENNEDY, Mr. GRAMM, and Mr. HATFIELD) introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Foreign Relations

A BILL

To prohibit United States assistance to countries that prohibit or restrict the transport or delivery of United States humanitarian assistance.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Humanitarian Aid
5 Corridor Act”.

6 **SEC. 2. FINDINGS.**

7 The Congress makes the following findings:

8 (1) The United States Federal budget deficit
9 and spending constraints require the maximum effi-

1 ciency in the usage of United States foreign assist-
2 ance.

3 (2) The delivery of humanitarian assistance to
4 people in need is consistent with the fundamental
5 values of our Nation and is an important component
6 of United States foreign policy.

7 (3) As a matter of principle and in furtherance
8 of fiscal prudence, the United States should seek to
9 promote the delivery of humanitarian assistance to
10 people in need in a manner that is both timely and
11 cost effective.

12 (4) Recipients of United States assistance
13 should not hinder or delay the transport or delivery
14 of United States humanitarian assistance to other
15 countries.

16 **SEC. 3. LIMITATION ON ASSISTANCE TO COUNTRIES THAT**
17 **RESTRICT THE TRANSPORT OR DELIVERY OF**
18 **UNITED STATES HUMANITARIAN ASSIST-**
19 **ANCE.**

20 (a) PROHIBITION ON ASSISTANCE.—Notwithstanding
21 any other provision of law, funds appropriated or other-
22 wise made available for United States assistance may not
23 be made available for any country whose government pro-
24 hibits or otherwise restricts, directly or indirectly, the

1 transport or delivery of United States humanitarian as-
2 sistance.

3 (b) WAIVER.—The prohibition on United States as-
4 sistance contained in subsection (a) shall not apply if the
5 President determines and notifies Congress in writing that
6 providing such assistance to a country is in the national
7 security interest of the United States.

8 (c) RESUMPTION OF ASSISTANCE.—A suspension or
9 termination of United States assistance for any country
10 under subsection (a) shall cease to be effective when the
11 President certifies in writing to the Speaker of the House
12 of Representatives and the Committee on Foreign Rela-
13 tions of the Senate that such country is no longer prohibit-
14 ing or otherwise restricting, either directly or indirectly,
15 the transport or delivery of United States humanitarian
16 assistance.

17 **SEC. 4. REPORT.**

18 (a) IN GENERAL.—At the time of the annual budget
19 submission to Congress, the President shall submit a re-
20 port to Congress describing any information available to
21 the President concerning prohibitions or restrictions, di-
22 rect or indirect, on the transport or delivery of United
23 States humanitarian assistance by the government of any
24 country receiving or eligible to receive United States for-
25 eign assistance during the current or preceding fiscal year.

1 (b) APPLICABILITY OF LAW.—The President shall in-
2 clude in the report required by subsection (a) a statement
3 as to whether the prohibition in section 3(a) is being ap-
4 plied to each country for which the President has informa-
5 tion available to him concerning prohibitions or restric-
6 tions, direct or indirect, on the transport or delivery of
7 United States humanitarian assistance.

8 **SEC. 5. DEFINITION.**

9 As used in this Act, the term “United States assist-
10 ance” has the same meaning given that term in section
11 481(e)(4) of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961.

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
