A BILL

To establish United States commemorative coin programs, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "United States Com-
- 5 memorative Coin Act of 1995".
- 6 SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.
- 7 For purposes of this Act—

1	(1) the term "Fund" means the National Law
2	Enforcement Officers Memorial Maintenance Fund
3	established under section 201;
4	(2) the term "recipient organization" means an
5	organization described in section 101 to which sur-
6	charges received by the Secretary from the sale of
7	coins issued under this Act are paid; and
8	(3) the term "Secretary" means the Secretary
9	of the Treasury.
10	TITLE I—COMMEMORATIVE
11	COIN PROGRAMS
12	SEC. 101. COMMEMORATIVE COIN PROGRAMS.
13	In accordance with the recommendations of the Citi-
14	zens Commemorative Coin Advisory Committee, the Sec-
15	retary shall mint and issue the following coins:
16	(1) BICENTENNIAL OF UNITED STATES.—On or
17	before December 31, 1995, the Secretary shall mint
18	not more than 25,000 \$10 gold coins with specifica-
19	tions to be determined by the Secretary.
20	(2) United nations and president tru-
21	MAN.—
22	(A) IN GENERAL.—To commemorate the
23	50th anniversary of the founding of the United
24	Nations and the role of President Harry S.
25	Truman in the founding of the United Nations,

1	during a 1-year period beginning in 1996, the
2	Secretary shall issue—
3	(i) not more than 75,000 \$5 coins,
4	each of which shall—
5	(I) weigh 8.359 grams;
6	(II) have a diameter of 0.850
7	inches; and
8	(III) contain 90 percent gold and
9	10 percent alloy; and
10	(ii) not more than 350,000 \$1 coins,
11	each of which shall—
12	(I) weigh 26.73 grams;
13	(II) have a diameter of 1.500
14	inches; and
15	(III) contain 90 percent silver
16	and 10 percent alloy.
17	(B) Surcharges.—All sales of the coins
18	issued under this subsection shall include a sur-
19	charge of \$35 per coin for each \$5 coin, and a
20	surcharge of \$10 per coin for each \$1 coin.
21	(C) Distribution of Surcharges.—All
22	surcharges received by the Secretary from the
23	sale of coins issued under this subsection shall
24	be promptly paid by the Secretary in accord-
25	ance with the following:

1	(i) Fifty percent of the surcharges re-
2	ceived shall be paid to the Harry S. Tru-
3	man Library Foundation.
4	(ii) Fifty percent of the surcharges re-
5	ceived shall be paid to the United Nations
6	Association.
7	(3) Smithsonian institution.—
8	(A) IN GENERAL.—To commemorate the
9	150th anniversary of the founding of the
10	Smithsonian Institution, during a 1-year period
11	beginning in August 1996, the Secretary shall
12	issue—
13	(i) not more than 100,000 \$5 coins,
14	each of which shall—
15	(I) weigh 8.359 grams;
16	(II) have a diameter of 0.850
17	inches; and
18	(III) contain 90 percent gold and
19	10 percent alloy; and
20	(ii) not more than 800,000 \$1 coins,
21	each of which shall—
22	(I) weigh 26.73 grams;
23	(II) have a diameter of 1.500
24	inches: and

1	(III) contain 90 percent silver
2	and 10 percent alloy.
3	(B) Surcharges.—All sales of the coins
4	issued under this subsection shall include a sur-
5	charge of \$35 per coin for each \$5 coin, and a
6	surcharge of \$10 per coin for each \$1 coin.
7	(C) Distribution of surcharges.—All
8	surcharges received by the Secretary from the
9	sale of coins issued under this subsection shall
10	be promptly paid by the Secretary to the Smith-
11	sonian Institution to be used to support the Na-
12	tional Numismatic Collection at the National
13	Museum of American History.
14	(D) DESIGN.—The design of the coins is-
15	sued under this subsection shall be emblematic
16	of the scientific, educational, and cultural sig-
17	nificance and importance of the Smithsonian
18	Institution. Each coin issued under this sub-
19	section shall include an inscription of the fol-
20	lowing words from the original bequest of
21	James Smithson: "for the increase and diffu-
22	sion of knowledge".
23	(4) Franklin delano roosevelt.—
24	(A) IN GENERAL.—To commemorate the
25	public opening of the Franklin Delano Roo-
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1	sevelt Memorial in Washington, D.C., which will
2	honor President Roosevelt's leadership and leg-
3	acy, during a 1-year period beginning in 1997,
4	the Secretary shall issue not more than 100,000
5	\$5 coins, each of which shall—
6	(i) weigh 8.359 grams;
7	(ii) have a diameter of 0.850 inches;
8	and
9	(iii) contain 90 percent gold and 10
10	percent alloy.
11	(B) Surcharges.—All sales of the coins
12	issued under this subsection shall include a sur-
13	charge of \$35 per coin.
14	(C) Distribution of Surcharges.—All
15	surcharges received by the Secretary from the
16	sale of coins issued under this subsection shall
17	be promptly paid by the Secretary to the
18	Franklin Delano Roosevelt Memorial Commis-
19	sion.
20	(5) YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK.—
21	(A) In general.—To commemorate the
22	125th anniversary of the establishment of Yel-
23	lowstone National Park as the first national
24	park in the United States, and the birth of the
25	national park idea, during a 1-year period be-

1	ginning in 1997, the Secretary shall issue not
2	more than 500,000 \$1 coins, each of which
3	shall—
4	(i) weigh 26.73 grams;
5	(ii) have a diameter of 1.500 inches
6	and
7	(iii) contain 90 percent silver and 10
8	percent alloy.
9	(B) Surcharges.—All sales of the coins
10	issued under this subsection shall include a sur-
11	charge of \$10 per coin.
12	(C) Distribution of Surcharges.—All
13	surcharges received by the Secretary from the
14	sale of coins issued under this subsection shall
15	be promptly paid by the Secretary in accord-
16	ance with the following:
17	(i) Fifty percent of the surcharges re-
18	ceived shall be paid to the National Park
19	Foundation to be used for the support of
20	national parks.
21	(ii) Fifty percent of the surcharges re-
22	ceived shall be paid to Yellowstone Na-
23	tional Park.
24	(6) National law enforcement officers
25	MEMORIAL.—

1	(A) IN GENERAL.—To recognize the sac-
2	rifice of law enforcement officers and their fam-
3	ilies in preserving public safety, during a 1-year
4	period beginning in 1997, the Secretary shall
5	issue not more than 500,000 \$1 coins, each of
6	which shall—
7	(i) weigh 26.73 grams;
8	(ii) have a diameter of 1.500 inches;
9	and
10	(iii) contain 90 percent silver and 10
11	percent alloy.
12	(B) Surcharges.—All sales of the coins
13	issued under this subsection shall include a sur-
14	charge of \$10 per coin.
15	(C) Distribution of surcharges.—
16	After receiving surcharges from the sale of the
17	coins issued under this subsection, the Sec-
18	retary shall transfer to the Secretary of the In-
19	terior an amount equal to the surcharges re-
20	ceived from the sale of the coins issued under
21	this subsection, which amount shall be depos-
22	ited in the Fund established under section 201.
23	(D) Availability.—The coins issued
24	under this subsection shall be available for issu-
25	ance not later than May 1997.

SEC. 102. DESIGN.

- 2 (a) Selection.—The design for each coin issued
- 3 under this Act shall be—
- 4 (1) selected by the Secretary after consultation
- 5 with the appropriate recipient organization or orga-
- 6 nizations and the Commission of Fine Arts; and
- 7 (2) reviewed by the Citizens Commemorative
- 8 Coin Advisory Committee.
- 9 (b) Designation and Inscriptions.—On each coin
- 10 issued under this Act there shall be—
- 11 (1) a designation of the value of the coin;
- 12 (2) an inscription of the year; and
- 13 (3) inscriptions of the words "Liberty", "In
- God We Trust", "United States of America", and
- "E Pluribus Unum".
- 16 SEC. 103. LEGAL TENDER.
- 17 The coins issued under this Act shall be legal tender,
- 18 as provided in section 5103 of title 31, United States
- 19 Code.
- 20 SEC. 104. SOURCES OF BULLION.
- 21 (a) GOLD.—The Secretary shall obtain gold for mint-
- 22 ing coins under this Act pursuant to the authority of the
- 23 Secretary under other provisions of law.
- 24 (b) SILVER.—The Secretary shall obtain silver for
- 25 minting coins under this Act from sources the Secretary
- 26 determines to be appropriate, including stockpiles estab-

lished under the Strategic and Critical Materials Stock Piling Act. 2 SEC. 105. SALE PRICE. Each coin issued under this Act shall be sold by the 4 Secretary at a price equal to the sum of— 6 (1) the face value of the coin; 7 (2) the surcharge provided in section 101 with respect to the coin; 8 9 (3) the cost of designing and issuing the coin 10 (including labor, materials, dies, use of machinery, 11 overhead expenses, marketing, and shipping); and 12 (4) the estimated profit determined under sec-13 tion 106(b) with respect to the coin. 14 SEC. 106. DETERMINATION OF COSTS AND PROFIT. 15 (a) DETERMINATION OF COSTS.—With respect to the coins issued under this Act, the Secretary shall, on an on-16 going basis, determine— 17 18 (1) the costs incurred in carrying out each coin 19 program authorized under this Act; and 20 (2) the allocation of overhead costs among all coin programs authorized under this Act. 21 22 (b) DETERMINATION OF PROFIT.—Prior to the sale of each coin issued under this Act, the Secretary shall calculate the estimated profit to be included in the sale price

of the coin under section 105(4).

l SEC. 107. GENERAL WAIVER OF PROCUREMENT REGULA-

- 2 TIONS.
- 3 Section 5112(j) of title 31, United States Code, shall
- 4 apply to the procurement of goods or services necessary
- 5 to carrying out the programs and operations of the United
- 6 States Mint under this Act.

7 SEC. 108. PROHIBITION ON JUDICIAL REVIEW.

- 8 Each determination made by the Secretary in imple-
- 9 menting a commemorative coin program under this Act
- 10 shall be made in the sole discretion of the Secretary and
- 11 shall not be subject to judicial review.
- 12 **SEC. 109. AUDITS.**
- 13 The Comptroller General of the United States shall
- 14 have the right to examine such books, records, documents,
- 15 and other data of each recipient organization as may be
- 16 related to the expenditures of amounts paid under section
- 17 101.

18 SEC. 110. FINANCIAL ASSURANCES.

- 19 It is the sense of the Congress that each coin program
- 20 authorized under this Act should be self-sustaining and
- 21 should be administered so as not to result in any net cost
- 22 to the Numismatic Public Enterprise Fund.

1	TITLE II—NATIONAL LAW EN-
2	FORCEMENT OFFICERS ME-
3	MORIAL MAINTENANCE FUND
4	SEC. 201. NATIONAL LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS MEMO-
5	RIAL MAINTENANCE FUND.
6	(a) Establishment.—
7	(1) IN GENERAL.—There is established the Na-
8	tional Law Enforcement Officers Memorial Mainte-
9	nance Fund, which shall be a revolving fund admin-
10	istered by the Secretary of the Interior (or the des-
11	ignee of the Secretary of the Interior).
12	(2) Funding.—Amounts in the Fund shall in-
13	clude—
14	(A) amounts deposited in the Fund under
15	section 101(6); and
16	(B) any donations received under para-
17	graph (3).
18	(3) Donations.—The Secretary of the Interior
19	may accept donations to the Fund.
20	(4) Interest-bearing account.—The Fund
21	shall be maintained in an interest-bearing account
22	within the Treasury of the United States.
23	(b) Purposes.—The Fund shall be used—

- (1) for the maintenance and repair of the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial in Washington, D.C.;
 - (2) to periodically add the names of law enforcement officers who have died in the line of duty to the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial;
 - (3) for the security of the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial site, including the posting of National Park Service rangers and United States Park Police, as appropriate;
 - (4) at the discretion of the Secretary of the Interior and in consultation with the Secretary and the Attorney General of the United States, who shall establish an equitable procedure between the Fund and such other organizations as may be appropriate, to provide educational scholarships to the immediate family members of law enforcement officers killed in the line of duty whose names appear on the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial, the total annual amount of such scholarships not to exceed 10 percent of the annual income of the Fund;
 - (5) for the dissemination of information regarding the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial to the general public;

1	(6) to administer the Fund, including contract-
2	ing for necessary services, in an amount not to ex-
3	ceed the lesser of—
4	(A) 10 percent of the annual income of the
5	Fund; or
6	(B) \$200,000 during any 1-year period;
7	and
8	(7) at the discretion of the Secretary of the In-
9	terior, in consultation with the Fund, for appro-
10	priate purposes in the event of an emergency affect-
11	ing the operation of the National Law Enforcement
12	Officers Memorial, except that, during any 1-year
13	period, not more than \$200,000 of the principal of
14	the Fund may be used to carry out this paragraph.
15	(c) Budget and Audit Treatment.—The Fund
16	shall be subject to the budget and audit provisions of chap-
17	ter 91 of title 31, United States Code.

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
