- (B) the extent to which criminal or other improper practices or activities are, or have been, engaged in the field of labor-management relations or in groups or organizations of employees or employers, to the detriment of interests of the public, employers, or employees, and to determine whether any changes are required in the laws of the United States in order to protect such interests against the occurrence of such practices or activities;
- (C) organized criminal activities which may operate in or otherwise utilize the facilities of inter-

state or international commerce in furtherance of any transactions and the manner and extent to which, and the identity of the persons, firms, or corporations, or other entities by whom such utilization is being made, and further, to study and investigate the manner in which and the extent to which persons engaged in organized criminal activity have infiltrated lawful business enterprise, and to study the adequacy of Federal laws to prevent the operations of organized crime in interstate or international commerce; and to determine whether any changes are required in the laws of the United States in order to protect the public against such practices or activities;

- (D) all other aspects of crime and lawlessness within the United States which have an impact upon or affect the national health, welfare, and safety; including but not limited to investment fraud schemes, commodity and security fraud, computer fraud, and the use of offshore banking and corporate facilities to carry out criminal objectives;
- (E) the efficiency and economy of operations of all branches and functions of the Government with particular reference to—

1	(i) the effectiveness of present national se-
2	curity methods, staffing, and processes as test-
3	ed against the requirements imposed by the
4	rapidly mounting complexity of national secu-
5	rity problems;
6	(ii) the capacity of present national secu-
7	rity staffing, methods, and processes to make
8	full use of the Nation's resources of knowledge
9	and talents;
10	(iii) the adequacy of present intergovern-
11	mental relations between the United States and
12	international organizations principally con-
13	cerned with national security of which the
14	United States is a member; and
15	(iv) legislative and other proposals to im-
16	prove these methods, processes, and relation-
