AN ACT

To establish within the United States National Park Service the National Underground Railroad Network to Freedom program, and for other purposes.

 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2 This Act may be cited as the "National Underground3 Railroad Network to Freedom Act of 1998".

4 SEC. 2. FINDINGS AND PURPOSES.

5 (a) FINDINGS.—The Congress finds the following:

6 (1) The Underground Railroad, which flour-7 ished from the end of the 18th century to the end 8 of the Civil War, was one of the most significant ex-9 pressions of the American civil rights movement dur-10 ing its evolution over more than 3 centuries.

11 (2) The Underground Railroad bridged the di-12 vides of race, religion, sectional differences, and na-13 tionality; spanned State lines and international bor-14 ders; and joined the American ideals of liberty and 15 freedom expressed in the Declaration of Independ-16 ence and the Constitution to the extraordinary ac-17 tions of ordinary men and women working in com-18 mon purpose to free a people.

(3) Pursuant to title VI of Public Law 101–628
(16 U.S.C. 1a–5 note; 104 Stat. 4495), the Underground Railroad Advisory Committee conducted a
study of the appropriate means of establishing an
enduring national commemorative Underground
Railroad program of education, example, reflection,
and reconciliation.

(4) The Underground Railroad Advisory Com mittee found that—
 (A) although a few elements of the Under-

(A) although a few elements of the Underground Railroad story are represented in existing National Park Service units and other sites, many sites are in imminent danger of being lost or destroyed, and many important resource types are not adequately represented and protected;

10 (B) there are many important sites which
11 have high potential for preservation and visitor
12 use in 29 States, the District of Columbia, and
13 the Virgin Islands;

(C) no single site or route completely reflects and characterizes the Underground Railroad, since its story and associated resources
involve networks and regions of the country
rather than individual sites and trails; and

(D) establishment of a variety of partnerships between the Federal Government and
other levels of government and the private sector would be most appropriate for the protection and interpretation of the Underground
Railroad.

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(5) The National Park Service can play a vital
 role in facilitating the national commemoration of
 the Underground Railroad.

4 (6) The story and significance of the Under-5 ground Railroad can best engage the American peo-6 ple through a national program of the National Park 7 Service that links historic buildings, structures, and 8 sites; routes, geographic areas, and corridors; inter-9 pretive centers, museums, and institutions; and pro-10 grams, activities, community projects, exhibits, and 11 multimedia materials, in a manner that is both uni-12 fied and flexible.

13 (b) PURPOSES.—The purposes of this Act are the fol-14 lowing:

(1) To recognize the importance of the Underground Railroad, the sacrifices made by those who
used the Underground Railroad in search of freedom
from tyranny and oppression, and the sacrifices
made by the people who helped them.

20 (2) To authorize the National Park Service to
21 coordinate and facilitate Federal and non-Federal
22 activities to commemorate, honor, and interpret the
23 history of the Underground Railroad, its significance
24 as a crucial element in the evolution of the national
25 civil rights movement, and its relevance in fostering

the spirit of racial harmony and national reconcili ation.

3 SEC. 3. NATIONAL UNDERGROUND RAILROAD NETWORK TO 4 FREEDOM PROGRAM.

5 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of the Interior (in
6 this Act referred to as the "Secretary") shall establish in
7 the National Park Service a program to be known as the
8 "National Underground Railroad Network to Freedom"
9 (in this Act referred to as the "national network"). Under
10 the program, the Secretary shall—

(1) produce and disseminate appropriate educational materials, such as handbooks, maps, interpretive guides, or electronic information;

14 (2) enter into appropriate cooperative agree15 ments and memoranda of understanding to provide
16 technical assistance under subsection (c); and

17 (3) create and adopt an official, uniform symbol
18 or device for the national network and issue regula19 tions for its use.

20 (b) ELEMENTS.—The national network shall encom-21 pass the following elements:

(1) All units and programs of the National
Park Service determined by the Secretary to pertain
to the Underground Railroad.

(2) Other Federal, State, local, and privately
 owned properties pertaining to the Underground
 Railroad that have a verifiable connection to the Un derground Railroad and that are included on, or de termined by the Secretary to be eligible for inclusion
 on, the National Register of Historic Places.

7 (3) Other governmental and nongovernmental
8 facilities and programs of an educational, research,
9 or interpretive nature that are directly related to the
10 Underground Railroad.

11 (c) COOPERATIVE AGREEMENTS AND MEMORANDA OF UNDERSTANDING.—To achieve the purposes of this 12 Act and to ensure effective coordination of the Federal 13 14 and non-Federal elements of the national network referred 15 to in subsection (b) with National Park Service units and programs, the Secretary may enter into cooperative agree-16 17 ments and memoranda of understanding with, and provide technical assistance to-18

19 (1) the heads of other Federal agencies, States,
20 localities, regional governmental bodies, and private
21 entities; and

(2) in cooperation with the Secretary of State,
the governments of Canada, Mexico, and any appropriate country in the Caribbean.

(d) APPROPRIATIONS.—There are authorized to be
 appropriated to carry out this Act not more than
 \$500,000 for each fiscal year. No amounts may be appro priated for the purposes of this Act except to the Secretary
 for carrying out the responsibilities of the Secretary as
 set forth in section 3(a).
