## AN ACT

To establish within the United States National Park Service the National Underground Railroad Network to Freedom program, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

### 1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 2 This Act may be cited as the "National Underground
- 3 Railroad Network to Freedom Act of 1998".

### 4 SEC. 2. FINDINGS AND PURPOSES.

- 5 (a) FINDINGS.—The Congress finds the following:
- 6 (1) The Underground Railroad, which flour-
- 7 ished from the end of the 18th century to the end
- 8 of the Civil War, was one of the most significant ex-
- 9 pressions of the American civil rights movement dur-
- ing its evolution over more than 3 centuries.
- 11 (2) The Underground Railroad bridged the di-
- vides of race, religion, sectional differences, and na-
- tionality; spanned State lines and international bor-
- ders; and joined the American ideals of liberty and
- freedom expressed in the Declaration of Independ-
- ence and the Constitution to the extraordinary ac-
- tions of ordinary men and women working in com-
- mon purpose to free a people.
- 19 (3) Pursuant to title VI of Public Law 101–628
- 20 (16 U.S.C. 1a–5 note; 104 Stat. 4495), the Under-
- 21 ground Railroad Advisory Committee conducted a
- study of the appropriate means of establishing an
- enduring national commemorative Underground
- Railroad program of education, example, reflection,
- and reconciliation.

1	(4) The Underground Railroad Advisory Com-
2	mittee found that—
3	(A) although a few elements of the Under-
4	ground Railroad story are represented in exist-
5	ing National Park Service units and other sites,
6	many sites are in imminent danger of being lost
7	or destroyed, and many important resource
8	types are not adequately represented and pro-
9	tected;
10	(B) there are many important sites which
11	have high potential for preservation and visitor
12	use in 29 States, the District of Columbia, and
13	the Virgin Islands;
14	(C) no single site or route completely re-
15	flects and characterizes the Underground Rail-
16	road, since its story and associated resources
17	involve networks and regions of the country
18	rather than individual sites and trails; and
19	(D) establishment of a variety of partner-
20	ships between the Federal Government and
21	other levels of government and the private sec-
22	tor would be most appropriate for the protec-
23	tion and interpretation of the Underground
24	Railroad.

- 1 (5) The National Park Service can play a vital 2 role in facilitating the national commemoration of 3 the Underground Railroad.
  - (6) The story and significance of the Underground Railroad can best engage the American people through a national program of the National Park Service that links historic buildings, structures, and sites; routes, geographic areas, and corridors; interpretive centers, museums, and institutions; and programs, activities, community projects, exhibits, and multimedia materials, in a manner that is both unified and flexible.
- 13 (b) Purposes.—The purposes of this Act are the fol-14 lowing:
  - (1) To recognize the importance of the Underground Railroad, the sacrifices made by those who used the Underground Railroad in search of freedom from tyranny and oppression, and the sacrifices made by the people who helped them.
  - (2) To authorize the National Park Service to coordinate and facilitate Federal and non-Federal activities to commemorate, honor, and interpret the history of the Underground Railroad, its significance as a crucial element in the evolution of the national civil rights movement, and its relevance in fostering

1	the spirit of racial harmony and national reconcili-
2	ation.
3	SEC. 3. NATIONAL UNDERGROUND RAILROAD NETWORK TO
4	FREEDOM PROGRAM.
5	(a) In General.—The Secretary of the Interior (in
6	this Act referred to as the "Secretary") shall establish in
7	the National Park Service a program to be known as the
8	"National Underground Railroad Network to Freedom"
9	(in this Act referred to as the "national network"). Under
10	the program, the Secretary shall—
11	(1) produce and disseminate appropriate edu-
12	cational materials, such as handbooks, maps, inter-
13	pretive guides, or electronic information;
14	(2) enter into appropriate cooperative agree-
15	ments and memoranda of understanding to provide
16	technical assistance under subsection (c); and
17	(3) create and adopt an official, uniform symbol
18	or device for the national network and issue regula-
19	tions for its use.
20	(b) Elements.—The national network shall encom-
21	pass the following elements:
22	(1) All units and programs of the National
23	Park Service determined by the Secretary to pertain
24	to the Underground Railroad.

- 1 (2) Other Federal, State, local, and privately
  2 owned properties pertaining to the Underground
  3 Railroad that have a verifiable connection to the Un4 derground Railroad and that are included on, or de5 termined by the Secretary to be eligible for inclusion
  6 on, the National Register of Historic Places.
- 7 (3) Other governmental and nongovernmental 8 facilities and programs of an educational, research, 9 or interpretive nature that are directly related to the 10 Underground Railroad.
- 11 (c) Cooperative Agreements and Memoranda
  12 of Understanding.—To achieve the purposes of this
  13 Act and to ensure effective coordination of the Federal
  14 and non-Federal elements of the national network referred
  15 to in subsection (b) with National Park Service units and
  16 programs, the Secretary may enter into cooperative agree17 ments and memoranda of understanding with, and provide
  18 technical assistance to—
  - (1) the heads of other Federal agencies, States, localities, regional governmental bodies, and private entities; and
- (2) in cooperation with the Secretary of State,
   the governments of Canada, Mexico, and any appropriate country in the Caribbean.

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- 1 (d) APPROPRIATIONS.—There are authorized to be
- 2 appropriated to carry out this Act not more than
- 3 \$500,000 for each fiscal year. No amounts may be appro-
- 4 priated for the purposes of this Act except to the Secretary
- 5 for carrying out the responsibilities of the Secretary as
- 6 set forth in section 3(a).
