A BILL

 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "National Underground"

5 Railroad Network to Freedom Act of 1998".

6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS AND PURPOSES.

- 7 (a) FINDINGS.—The Congress finds the following:
- 8 (1) The Underground Railroad, which flourished
- 9 from the end of the 18th century to the end of the
- 10 Civil War, was one of the most significant expressions

of the American civil rights movement during its evo lution over more than 3 centuries.

(2) The Underground Railroad bridged the di-3 4 vides of race, religion, sectional differences, and nationality; spanned State lines and international bor-5 6 ders; and joined the American ideals of liberty and 7 freedom expressed in the Declaration of Independence 8 and the Constitution to the extraordinary actions of 9 ordinary men and women working in common pur-10 pose to free a people.

(3) Pursuant to title VI of Public Law 101–628
(16 U.S.C. 1a–5 note; 104 Stat. 4495), the Underground Railroad Advisory Committee conducted a
study of the appropriate means of establishing an enduring national commemorative Underground Railroad program of education, example, reflection, and
reconciliation.

18 (4) The Underground Railroad Advisory Com19 mittee found that—

20 (A) although a few elements of the Under21 ground Railroad story are represented in exist22 ing National Park Service units and other sites,
23 many sites are in imminent danger of being lost
24 or destroyed, and many important resource types
25 are not adequately represented and protected;

1	(B) there are many important sites which
2	have high potential for preservation and visitor
3	use in 29 States, the District of Columbia, and
4	the Virgin Islands;
5	(C) no single site or route completely re-
6	flects and characterizes the Underground Rail-
7	road, since its story and associated resources in-
8	volve networks and regions of the country rather
9	than individual sites and trails; and
10	(D) establishment of a variety of partner-
11	ships between the Federal Government and other
12	levels of government and the private sector would
13	be most appropriate for the protection and inter-
14	pretation of the Underground Railroad.
15	(5) The National Park Service can play a vital
16	role in facilitating the national commemoration of the
17	Underground Railroad.
18	(6) The story and significance of the Under-
19	ground Railroad can best engage the American people
20	through a national program of the National Park
21	Service that links historic buildings, structures, and
22	sites; routes, geographic areas, and corridors; inter-
23	pretive centers, museums, and institutions; and pro-
24	grams, activities, community projects, exhibits, and

multimedia materials, in a manner that is both uni fied and flexible.

3 (b) PURPOSES.—The purposes of this Act are the fol-4 lowing:

5 (1) To recognize the importance of the Under6 ground Railroad, the sacrifices made by those who
7 used the Underground Railroad in search of freedom
8 from tyranny and oppression, and the sacrifices made
9 by the people who helped them.

10 (2) To authorize the National Park Service to co-11 ordinate and facilitate Federal and non-Federal ac-12 tivities to commemorate, honor, and interpret the his-13 tory of the Underground Railroad, its significance as 14 a crucial element in the evolution of the national civil 15 rights movement, and its relevance in fostering the 16 spirit of racial harmony and national reconciliation. 17 SEC. 3. NATIONAL UNDERGROUND RAILROAD NETWORK TO 18 FREEDOM PROGRAM.

(a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of the Interior (in
this Act referred to as the "Secretary") shall establish in
the National Park Service a program to be known as the
"National Underground Railroad Network to Freedom" (in
this Act referred to as the "national network"). Under the
program, the Secretary shall—

1	(1) produce and disseminate appropriate edu-
2	cational materials, such as handbooks, maps, inter-
3	pretive guides, or electronic information;
4	(2) enter into appropriate cooperative agree-
5	ments and memoranda of understanding to provide
6	technical assistance under subsection (c); and
7	(3) create and adopt an official, uniform symbol
8	or device for the national network and issue regula-
9	tions for its use.
10	(b) ELEMENTS.—The national network shall encom-
11	pass the following elements:
12	(1) All units and programs of the National Park
13	Service determined by the Secretary to pertain to the
14	Underground Railroad.
15	(2) Other Federal, State, local, and privately
16	owned properties pertaining to the Underground
17	Railroad that have a verifiable connection to the Un-
18	derground Railroad and that are included on, or de-
19	termined by the Secretary to be eligible for inclusion
20	on, the National Register of Historic Places.
21	(3) Other governmental and nongovernmental fa-
22	cilities and programs of an educational, research, or
23	interpretive nature that are directly related to the
24	Underground Railroad.

(c) Cooperative Agreements and Memoranda of 1 2 UNDERSTANDING.—To achieve the purposes of this Act and to ensure effective coordination of the Federal and non-Fed-3 4 eral elements of the national network referred to in subsection (b) with National Park Service units and programs, 5 the Secretary may enter into cooperative agreements and 6 7 memoranda of understanding with, and provide technical 8 assistance to-

9 (1) the heads of other Federal agencies, States,
10 localities, regional governmental bodies, and private
11 entities; and

(2) in cooperation with the Secretary of State,
the governments of Canada, Mexico, and any appropriate country in the Caribbean.

(d) APPROPRIATIONS.—There are authorized to be appropriated to carry out this Act not more than \$500,000
for each fiscal year. No amounts may be appropriated for
the purposes of this Act except to the Secretary for carrying
out the responsibilities of the Secretary as set forth in section 3(a).

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
