A BILL

To amend the Trade Act of 1974 in order to require reciprocal responses to foreign acts, policies, and practices that deny national treatment to United States investment.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 That section 301 of the Trade Act of 1974 (19 U.S.C.
- 4 2411) is amended—

1	(1) by inserting "(except with respect to the ac-
2	tion required under subsection (c)(2))" before "sub-
3	ject to the specific direction," in subsection (b);
4	(2) by redesignating paragraphs (2) through
5	(6) of subsection (c) as paragraphs (3) through (7),
6	respectively; and
7	(3) by inserting after paragraph (1) of sub-
8	section (c) the following new paragraph:
9	"(2) For purposes of carrying out the provi-
10	sions of subsection (b) with respect to any act, pol-
11	icy, or practice of a foreign country that denies na-
12	tional treatment to United States investment—
13	"(A) action by the United States shall be
14	treated as being appropriate under section
15	304(a)(1); and
16	"(B) the Trade Representative shall, in ad-
17	dition to any other action considered appro-
18	priate and feasible, impose with respect to in-
19	vestment by that country and its nationals in
20	the United States conditions, limitations, and
21	prohibitions that are similar to those imple-
22	mented through such act, policy, or practice.".
