AN ACT

To assist in the conservation of Asian elephants by supporting and providing financial resources for the conservation programs of nations within the range of Asian elephants and projects of persons with demonstrated expertise in the conservation of Asian elephants.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Asian Elephant Con-5 servation Act of 1997".

6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

7 The Congress finds the following:

8 (1) Asian elephant populations in nations with-9 in the range of Asian elephants have continued to 10 decline to the point that the long-term survival of 11 the species in the wild is in serious jeopardy.

(2) The Asian elephant is listed as an endangered species under section 4 of the Endangered
Species Act of 1973 and under appendix I of the
Convention on International Trade of Endangered
Species of Wild Fauna and Flora.

17 (3) Because the challenges facing the conserva18 tion of Asian elephants are so great, resources to
19 date have not been sufficient to cope with the con20 tinued loss of habitat and the consequent diminution
21 of Asian elephant populations.

(4) The Asian elephant is a flagship species for
the conservation of tropical forest habitats in which
it is found and provides the consequent benefit from

1	such conservation to numerous other species of wild-
2	life including many other endangered species.
3	(5) Among the threats to the Asian elephant in
4	addition to habitat loss are population fragmenta-
5	tion, human-elephant conflict, poaching for ivory,
6	meat, hide, bones and teeth, and capture for domes-
7	tication.
8	(6) To reduce, remove, or otherwise effectively
9	address these threats to the long-term viability of
10	populations of Asian elephants in the wild will re-

populations of Asian elephants in the wild will require the joint commitment and effort of nations
within the range of Asian elephants, the United
States and other countries, and the private sector.

14 SEC. 3. PURPOSES.

15 The purposes of this Act are the following:

16 (1) To perpetuate healthy populations of Asian17 elephants.

(2) To assist in the conservation and protection
of Asian elephants by supporting the conservation
programs of Asian elephant range states and the
CITES Secretariat.

22 (3) To provide financial resources for those pro-23 grams.

24 SEC. 4. DEFINITIONS.

25 In this Act:

(1) The term "CITES" means the Convention
 on International Trade in Endangered Species of
 Wild Fauna and Flora, signed on March 3, 1973,
 and its appendices.

(2) The term "conservation" means the use of 5 6 methods and procedures necessary to bring Asian 7 elephants to the point at which there are sufficient 8 populations in the wild to ensure that the species 9 does not become extinct, including all activities asso-10 ciated with scientific resource management, such as 11 conservation, protection, restoration, acquisition, and 12 management of habitat; research and monitoring of 13 known populations; assistance in the development of 14 management plans for managed elephant ranges; 15 CITES enforcement; law enforcement through com-16 munity participation; translocation of elephants; con-17 flict resolution initiatives; and community outreach 18 and education.

19 (3) The term "Fund" means the Asian Ele20 phant Conservation Fund established under section
21 6(a).

(4) The term "Secretary" means the Secretaryof the Interior.

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(5) The term "Administrator" means the Ad ministrator of the Agency for International Develop ment.

4 SEC. 5. ASIAN ELEPHANT CONSERVATION ASSISTANCE.

5 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary, subject to the 6 availability of funds and in consultation with the Adminis-7 trator, shall use amounts in the Fund to provide financial 8 assistance for projects for the conservation of Asian ele-9 phants for which final project proposals are approved by 10 the Secretary in accordance with this section.

11 (b) PROJECT PROPOSAL.—Any relevant wildlife man-12 agement authority of a nation within the range of Asian 13 elephants whose activities directly or indirectly affect Asian elephant populations, the CITES Secretariat, or 14 15 any person with demonstrated expertise in the conservation of Asian elephants, may submit to the Secretary a 16 17 project proposal under this section. Each proposal shall 18 include the following:

- 19 (1) The name of the individual responsible for20 conducting the project.
- 21 (2) A succinct statement of the purposes of the22 project.
- 23 (3) A description of the qualifications of the in24 dividuals who will conduct the project.

1 (4) An estimate of the funds and time required 2 to complete the project. 3 (5) Evidence of support of the project by appro-4 priate governmental entities of countries in which 5 the project will be conducted, if the Secretary deter-6 mines that the support is required for the success of 7 the project. 8 (6)Information regarding the source and 9 amount of matching funding available to the appli-10 cant. 11 (7) Any other information the Secretary consid-12 ers to be necessary for evaluating the eligibility of 13 the project for funding under this Act. 14 (c) PROJECT REVIEW AND APPROVAL.— 15 (1) IN GENERAL.—Within 30 days after receiv-16 ing a final project proposal, the Secretary shall pro-17 vide a copy of the proposal to the Administrator. 18 The Secretary shall review each final project pro-19 posal to determine if it meets the criteria set forth 20 in subsection (d). 21 (2)CONSULTATION; APPROVAL OR DIS-22 APPROVAL.—Not later than 6 months after receiving 23 a final project proposal, and subject to the availabil-24 ity of funds, the Secretary, after consulting with the 25 Administrator, shall—

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1	(A) request written comments on the pro-
2	posal from each country within which the
3	project is to be conducted;
4	(B) after requesting those comments, ap-
5	prove or disapprove the proposal; and
6	(C) provide written notification of that ap-
7	proval or disapproval to the person who submit-
8	ted the proposal, the Administrator, and each
9	of those countries.
10	(d) CRITERIA FOR APPROVAL.—The Secretary may
11	approve a final project proposal under this section if the
12	project will enhance programs for conservation of Asian
13	elephants by assisting efforts to—
14	(1) implement conservation programs;
15	(2) address the conflicts between humans and
16	elephants that arise from competition for the same
17	habitat;
18	(3) enhance compliance with provisions of
19	CITES and laws of the United States or a foreign
20	country that prohibit or regulate the taking or trade
21	of Asian elephants or regulate the use and manage-
22	ment of Asian elephant habitat;
23	(4) develop sound scientific information on the
24	condition of Asian elephant habitat, Asian elephant

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1	population numbers and trends, or the threats to
2	such habitat, numbers, or trends; or
3	(5) promote cooperative projects on those topics
4	with other foreign governments, affected local com-
5	munities, nongovernmental organizations, or others
6	in the private sector.

7 (e) PROJECT SUSTAINABILITY.—To the maximum 8 extent practical, in determining whether to approve project 9 proposals under this section, the Secretary shall give con-10 sideration to projects which will enhance sustainable integrated conservation development programs to ensure ef-11 fective, long-term conservation of Asian elephants. 12

13 (f) PROJECT REPORTING.—Each person who receives 14 assistance under this section for a project shall provide 15 periodic reports, as the Secretary considers necessary, to the Secretary and the Administrator. Each report shall in-16 17 clude all information required by the Secretary, after consulting with the Administrator, for evaluating the progress 18 19 and success of the project.

20(g) MATCHING FUNDS.—In determining whether to 21 approve project proposals under this section, the Secretary 22 shall give priority to those projects for which there exists 23 some measure of matching funds.

24 (h) LIMITATION ON USE FOR CAPTIVE BREEDING.— 25 Amounts provided as a grant under this Act may not be

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used for captive breeding of Asian elephants other than
 for release in the wild.

3 SEC. 6. ASIAN ELEPHANT CONSERVATION FUND.

4 (a) ESTABLISHMENT.—There is established in the
5 general fund of the Treasury a separate account to be
6 known as the "Asian Elephant Conservation Fund", which
7 shall consist of amounts deposited into the Fund by the
8 Secretary of the Treasury under subsection (b).

9 (b) DEPOSITS INTO THE FUND.—The Secretary of10 the Treasury shall deposit into the Fund—

(1) all amounts received by the Secretary in theform of donations under subsection (d); and

13 (2) other amounts appropriated to the Fund.
14 (c) USE.—

(1) IN GENERAL.—Subject to paragraph (2),
the Secretary may use amounts in the Fund without
further appropriation to provide assistance under
section 5.

19 (2) ADMINISTRATION.—Of amounts in the
20 Fund available for each fiscal year, the Secretary
21 may use not more than 3 percent to administer the
22 Fund.

23 (d) ACCEPTANCE AND USE OF DONATIONS.—The
24 Secretary may accept and use donations to provide assist25 ance under section 5. Amounts received by the Secretary

in the form of donations shall be transferred to the Sec retary of the Treasury for deposit into the Fund.

3 SEC. 7. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

4 There are authorized to be appropriated to the Fund
5 \$5,000,000 for each of fiscal years 1998, 1999, 2000,
6 2001, and 2002 to carry out this Act, which may remain
7 available until expended.
