A BILL

To establish the Oklahoma City National Memorial as a unit of the National Park System, to designate the Oklahoma City Memorial Trust, and for other purposes. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Oklahoma City National
5 Memorial Act of 1997".

6 SEC. 2 FINDINGS AND PURPOSES.

7 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds that—

8 (1) few events in the past quarter-century have 9 rocked Americans' perception of themselves and their 10 institutions, and brought together the people of our 11 Nation with greater intensity than the April 19, 12 1995, bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal 13 Building in downtown Oklahoma City;

(2) the resulting deaths of 168 people, some of
whom were children, immediately touched thousands
of family members whose lives will forever bear scars
of having those precious to them taken away so brutally;

19 (3) suffering with such families are countless
20 survivors, including children, who struggle not only
21 with the suffering around them, but their own phys22 ical and emotional injuries and with shaping a life
23 beyond April 19;

24 (4) such losses and struggles are personal and,
25 since they resulted from so public an attack, they are

also shared with a community, a nation, and the
 world; and,

3 (5) the story of the bombing does not stop with
4 the attack itself or with the many losses it caused. The
5 responses of Oklahoma's public servants and private
6 citizens, and those from throughout the nation, re7 main as a testament to the sense of unity, compas8 sion, even heroism, that characterized the rescue and
9 recovery following the bombing.

10 (6) During the days immediately following the
11 Oklahoma City bombing, Americans and people from
12 around the world of all races, political philosophies,
13 religions and walks of life responded with unprece14 dented solidarity and selflessness; and

15 (7) Given the national and international impact 16 and reaction, the federal character of the site of the 17 bombing, and the significant percentage of the victims 18 and survivors who were federal employees the Okla-19 homa City Memorial will be established, designed, 20 managed and maintained to educate present and fu-21 ture generations, through a public/private partner-22 ship, to work together efficiently and respectfully in 23 developing a National Memorial relating to all as-24 pects of the April 19, 1995, bombing in Oklahoma 25 City.

1 SEC. 3. DEFINITIONS.

2 In this Act:

3 (1) MEMORIAL.—The term "Memorial" means
4 the Oklahoma City National Memorial designated
5 under section 4(a).

6 (2) SECRETARY.—The term "Secretary" means
7 the Secretary of the Interior.

8 (3) TRUST.—The term "Trust" means the Okla9 homa City National Memorial Trust designated under
10 section 5(a).

11 SEC. 4. OKLAHOMA CITY NATIONAL MEMORIAL.

12 (a) ESTABLISHMENT.—In order to preserve for the benefit and inspiration of the people of the United States 13 and the World, as a National Memorial certain lands lo-14 cated in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, there is established as 15 16 a unit of the National Park System the Oklahoma City National Memorial. The Memorial shall be administered by 17 18 the Trust in cooperation with the Secretary and in accord-19 ance with the provisions of this Act, the Act of August 25, 1916 (39 Stat. 535; 16 U.S.C. 1 et seq.), and the Act of 20 August 21, 1935 (49 Stat 666; 16 U.S.C. 461–467). 21

(b) The Memorial area shall be comprised of the lands,
facilities and structures generally depicted on the map entitled "Oklahoma City National Memorial", numbered
OCNM 001, and dated May 1997 (hereinafter referred to
in this Act as the "map"):

1	(1) Such map shall be on file and available for
2	public inspection in the appropriate offices of the Na-
3	tional Park Service and the Trust.
4	(2) After advising the Committee on Energy and
5	Natural Resources of the Senate and the Committee
б	on Resources of the House of Representatives, in writ-
7	ing, the Trust, as established by section 5 of this Act,
8	in consultation with the Secretary, may make minor
9	revisions of the boundaries of the Memorial when nec-
10	essary by publication of a revised drawing or other
11	boundary description in the Federal Register.
12	SEC. 5. OKLAHOMA CITY NATIONAL MEMORIAL TRUST.
13	(a) ESTABLISHMENT.—There is established a wholly
14	owned government corporation to be known as the Okla-
15	homa City National Memorial Trust.
16	(b) Board of Directors.—
17	(1) IN GENERAL.—The powers and management
18	of the Trust shall be vested in a board of Directors
19	(hereinafter referred to as the "Board") consisting of
20	the following 9 members:
21	(A) The Secretary or the Secretary's des-
22	ignee.
23	(B) Eight individuals, appointed by the
24	President, from a list of recommendations sub-
25	mitted by the Governor of the State of Oklahoma;

1 and a list of recommendations submitted by the 2 Mayor of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma; and a list of recommendations submitted by the United 3 4 States Senators from Oklahoma; and, a list of recommendations submitted by United States 5 6 Representatives from Oklahoma. The President 7 shall make the appointments referred to in this 8 subparagraph within 90 days after the enact-9 ment of this Act.

10 (2) TERMS.—Members of the Board appointed 11 under paragraph (1)(B) shall each serve for a term 12 of 4 years, except that of the members first appointed, 13 2 shall serve for a term of 3 years; and 2 shall serve 14 a term of 2 years. Any vacancy in the Board shall 15 be filled in the same manner in which the original 16 appointment was made, and any member appointed 17 to fill a vacancy shall serve for the remainder of that 18 term for which his or her predecessor was appointed. 19 No appointed member may serve more than 8 years 20 in consecutive terms.

21 (3) QUORUM.—Five members of the Board shall
22 constitute a quorum for the conduct of business by the
23 Board.

24 (4) ORGANIZATION AND COMPENSATION.—The
25 Board shall organize itself in such a manner as it

deems most appropriate to effectively carry out the
 authorized activities of the Trust. Board members
 shall serve without pay, but may be reimbursed for
 the actual and necessary travel and subsistence expenses incurred by them in the performance of the du ties of the Trust.

7 (5) LIABILITY OF DIRECTORS.—Members of the
8 Board of Directors shall not be considered Federal
9 employees by virtue of their membership on the
10 Board, except for purposes of the Federal Tort Claims
11 Act and the Ethics in Government Act, and the provi12 sions of chapter 11 of title 18, United States Code.

13 (6) MEETINGS.—The Board shall meet at least 14 three times per year in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 15 and at least two of those meetings shall be opened to 16 the public. Upon a majority vote, the Board may 17 close any other meetings to the public. The Board 18 shall establish procedures for providing public infor-19 mation and opportunities for public comment regard-20 ing operations maintenance and management of the 21 Memorial; as well as, policy, planning and design is-22 sues.

- 23 (7) Staff.—
- 24 (A) NON-NATIONAL PARK SERVICE STAFF.—
 25 The Trust is authorized to appoint and fix the

1	compensation and duties of an executive director
2	and such other officers and employees as it deems
3	necessary without regard to the provisions of
4	title 5, United States Code, governing appoint-
5	ments in the competitive service, and may pay
6	them without regard to the provisions of chapter
7	51, and subchapter III of chapter 53, title 5,
8	United States Code, relating to classification and
9	General Schedule pay rates.
10	(B) INTERIM PARK SERVICE STAFF.—At the
11	request of the Trust, the Secretary shall provide
12	for a period not to exceed 2 years, such personnel
13	and technical expertise, as necessary, to provide
14	assistance in the implementation of the provi-
15	sions of this Act.
16	(C) PARK SERVICE STAFF.—At the request
17	of the Trust, the Secretary shall provide such
18	uniformed personnel, on a reimbursable basis, to
19	carry out day to day visitor service programs.
20	(D) Other federal employees.—At the
21	request of the Trust, the Director of any other
22	Federal agency may provide such personnel, on
23	a reimbursable basis, to carry out day to day
24	visitor service programs.

1	(8) Necessary powers.—The Trust shall have
2	all necessary and proper powers for the exercise of the
3	authorities vested in it.
4	(9) TAXES.—The Trust and all properties ad-
5	ministered by the Trust shall be exempt from all taxes
6	and special assessments of every kind by the State of
7	Oklahoma, and its political subdivisions including
8	the county of Oklahoma and the city of Oklahoma
9	City.
10	(10) Government corporation.—
11	(A) The Trust shall be treated as a wholly
12	owned Government corporation subject to chapter
13	91 of title 31, United States Code (commonly re-
14	ferred to as the Government Corporation Control
15	Act). Financial statements of the Trust shall be
16	audited annually in accordance with section
17	9105 of title 31 of the United States Code.
18	(B) At the end of each calendar year, the
19	Trust shall submit to the Committee on Energy
20	and Natural Resources of the United States Sen-
21	ate and the Committee on Resources of the House
22	of Representatives a comprehensive and detailed
23	report of its operations, activities, and accom-
24	plishments for the prior fiscal year. The report
25	also shall include a section that describes in gen-

eral terms the Trust's goals for the current fiscal
 year.

3 SEC. 6. DUTIES AND AUTHORITIES OF THE TRUST.

4 (a) OVERALL REQUIREMENTS OF THE TRUST.—The
5 Trust shall administer the operation, maintenance, man6 agement and interpretation of the Memorial including, but
7 not limited to, leasing, rehabilitation, repair and improve8 ment of property within the Memorial under its adminis9 trative jurisdiction using the authorities provided in this
10 section, which shall be exercised in accordance with—

(1) the provisions of law generally applicable to
 units of the National Park Service, including: "An
 Act to establish a National Park Service, and for
 other purposes" approved August 25, 1916 (39 Stat.
 535; 16 U.S.C. 1, 2–4);

16 (2) the Act of August 21, 1935 (49 Stat. 666;
17 U.S.C. 461-467;

18 (3) the general objectives of the "Memorial Mis19 sion Statement", adopted March 26, 1996, by the
20 Oklahoma City Memorial Foundation;

(4) the "Oklahoma City Memorial Foundation
 Intergovernmental Letter of Understanding", dated,
 October 28, 1996; and

(5) the Cooperative Agreement to be entered into
 between the Trust and the Secretary pursuant to this
 Act.

4 (b) AUTHORITIES.—

(1) The Trust may participate in the develop-5 6 ment of programs and activities at the properties des-7 ignated by the map, and the Trust shall have the au-8 thority to negotiate and enter into such agreements, 9 leases, contracts and other arrangements with any 10 person, firm, association, organization, corporation or 11 governmental entity, including, without limitation, 12 entities of Federal, State and local governments as 13 are necessary and appropriate to carry out its au-14 thorized activities. Any such agreements may be en-15 tered into without regard to section 321 of the Act of 16 June 30, 1932 (40 U.S.C. 303b).

17 (2) The Trust shall establish procedures for lease
18 agreements and other agreements for use and occu19 pancy of Memorial facilities, including a requirement
20 that in entering into such agreements the Trust shall
21 obtain reasonable competition.

22 (3) The Trust may not dispose of or convey fee
23 title to any real property transferred to it under this
24 Act.

1	(4) Federal laws and regulations governing pro-
2	curement by Federal Agencies shall not apply to the
3	Trust, with the exception of laws and regulations re-
4	lated to Federal Government contracts governing
5	working conditions, and any civil rights provisions
6	otherwise applicable thereto.
7	(5) The Trust, in consultation with the Adminis-
8	trator of Federal Procurement Policy, shall establish
9	and promulgate procedures applicable to the Trust's
10	procurement of goods and services including, but not
11	limited to, the award of contracts on the basis of con-
12	tractor qualifications, price, commercially reasonable
13	buying practices, and reasonable competition.
14	(c) Management Program.—Within one year after
15	the enactment of this Act, the Trust, in consultation with
16	
	the Secretary, shall develop a cooperative agreement for
17	the Secretary, shall develop a cooperative agreement for management of those lands, operations and facilities within
17 18

3 (d) DONATIONS.—The Trust may solicit and accept 4 donations of funds, property, supplies, or services from individuals, foundations, corporations, and other private or 5 public entities for the purposes of carrying out its duties. 6 (e) PROCEEDS.—Notwithstanding section 1341 of title 7 8 31 of the United States Code, all proceeds received by the 9 Trust shall be retained by the Trust, and such proceeds shall 10 be available, without further appropriation, for the administration, operation, preservation, restoration, operation 11 12 and maintenance, improvement, repair and related ex-13 penses incurred with respect to Memorial properties under its administrative jurisdiction. The Secretary of the Treas-14 15 ury, at the option of the Trust shall invest excess monies of the Trust in public debt securities which shall bear inter-16 est at rates determined by the Secretary of the Treasury 17 taking into consideration the current average market yield 18 on outstanding marketable obligations of the United States 19 of comparable maturity. 20

(f) SUITS.—The Trust may sue and be sued in its own
name to the same extent as the Federal Government. Litigation arising out of the activities of the Trust shall be conducted by the Attorney General; except that the Trust may
retain private attorneys to provide advice and counsel. The

District Court for the Western District of Oklahoma shall
 have exclusive jurisdiction over any suit filed against the
 Trust.

4 (q) BYLAWS, RULES AND REGULATIONS.—The Trust may adopt, amend, repeal, and enforce bylaws, rules and 5 regulations governing the manner in which its business 6 7 may be conducted and the powers vested in it may be exer-8 cised. The Trust is authorized, in consultation with the Sec-9 retary, to adopt and to enforce those rules and regulations 10 that are applicable to the operation of the National Park System and that may be necessary and appropriate to 11 carry out its duties and responsibilities under this Act. The 12 13 Trust shall give notice of the adoption of such rules and regulations by publication in the Federal Register. 14

(h) INSURANCE.—The Trust shall require that all
leaseholders and contractors procure proper insurance
against any loss in connection with properties under lease
or contract, or the authorized activities granted in such
lease or contract, as is reasonable and customary.

20 SEC. 7. LIMITATIONS ON FUNDING.

21 (a) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—

(1) IN GENERAL.—In furtherance of the purposes
of this Act, there is hereby authorized the sum of
\$5,000,000, to remain available until expended.

1 (2) MATCHING REQUIREMENT.—Amounts appro-2 priated in any fiscal year to carry out the provisions 3 of this Act may only be expended on a matching basis 4 in a ratio of at least one non-Federal dollar to every Federal Dollar. For the purposes of this provision, 5 6 each non-Federal dollar donated to the Trust or to the 7 Oklahoma City Memorial Foundation for the cre-8 ation, maintenance, or operation of the Memorial 9 shall satisfy the matching dollar requirement without 10 regard to the fiscal year in which such donation is 11 made.

12 SEC. 8. ALFRED P. MURRAH FEDERAL BUILDING.

(a) Prior to the construction of the Memorial the Administrator of General Services shall, among other actions,
exchange, sell, lease, donate, or otherwise dispose of the site
of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building, or a portion
thereof, to the Trust. Any such disposal shall not be subject
to—

19 (1) the Public Buildings Act of 1959 (40 U.S.C.
20 601 et seq.);

21 (2) the Federal Property and Administrative
22 Services Act of 1949 (40 U.S.C. et seq.); or

23 (3) any other Federal law establishing require24 ments or procedures for the disposal of Federal prop25 erty.

1 SEC. 9. GENERAL ACCOUNTING OFFICE STUDY.

2 (a) Six years after the first meeting of the Board of 3 Directors of the Trust, the General Accounting Office shall conduct an interim study of the activities of the Trust and 4 5 shall report the results of the study to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources and the Committee on Ap-6 propriations of the United States Senate, and the Commit-7 tee on Resources and Committee on Appropriations of the 8 House of Representatives. The study shall include, but shall 9 not be limited to, details of how the Trust is meeting its 10 11 obligations under this Act.
