Mr. REDMOND introduced the following bill; which was referred to the  
Committee on Resources

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## A BILL

To modify the boundaries of the Bandelier National Monument to include the lands within the headwaters of the Upper Alamo Watershed, which drain into the Monument and which are not currently within the jurisdiction of a Federal land management agency, to authorize acquisition of those lands, and for other purposes.

1       *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2       *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3       **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE; TABLE OF CONTENTS.**

4       (a) **SHORT TITLE.**—This Act may be cited as the  
5       “Bandelier National Monument Administrative Improve-  
6       ment and Watershed Protection Act of 1998”.

1 (b) TABLE OF CONTENTS.—The table of contents of  
2 this Act is as follows:

3 **SEC. 2. FINDINGS AND PURPOSES.**

4 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds that:

5 (1) Bandelier National Monument (in this Act  
6 referred to as the “Monument”) was established by  
7 Presidential proclamation on February 11, 1916, to  
8 preserve the archaeological resources of a “vanished  
9 people, with as much land as may be necessary for  
10 the proper protection thereof. . .” (Presidential  
11 Proclamation No. 1322; 39 Stat. 1764).

12 (2) At various times since the establishment of  
13 the Monument, the Congress and the President have  
14 adjusted the boundaries and purpose of the Monu-  
15 ment to further preservation of archaeological and  
16 natural resources within the Monument:

17 (A) On February 25, 1932, the Otowi Sec-  
18 tion of the Santa Fe National Forest (some  
19 4,699 acres of land) was transferred to the  
20 Monument from the Santa Fe National Forest  
21 (Presidential Proclamation No. 1991; 47 Stat.  
22 2503).

1           (B) On December 9, 1959, 3,600 acres of  
2           Frijoles Mesa were transferred to the National  
3           Park Service from the Atomic Energy Commis-  
4           sion, and such lands were subsequently added  
5           to the Monument on January 9, 1961, because  
6           of “pueblo-type archeological ruins germane to  
7           those in the monument area” (Presidential  
8           Proclamation No. 3388; 75 Stat. 1014).

9           (C) On May 27, 1963, Upper Canyon, con-  
10          sisting of 2,882 acres of land previously admin-  
11          istered by the Atomic Energy Commission, was  
12          added to the Monument to preserve the lands  
13          “unusual scenic character together with geo-  
14          logic and topographic features, the preservation  
15          of which would implement the purposes of such  
16          monument (Presidential Proclamation No.  
17          3539; 77 Stat. 1006).

18          (D) In 1976, concerned about upstream  
19          land management activities that could result in  
20          flooding and erosion in the Monument, Con-  
21          gress enacted Public Law 94–578 (90 Stat.  
22          2732, 2736) to include the headwaters of the  
23          Rito de los Frijoles and the Cañada de Cochiti  
24          Grant (a total of 7,310 acres) within the  
25          boundaries of the Monument.

3 **SEC. 4. LAND ACQUISITION.**

4 (a) ACQUISITION AUTHORITY; METHODS.—Subject  
5 to subsections (b), (c), and (d), the Secretary of the Inte-  
6 rior may acquire lands and interests therein within the  
7 boundaries of the area added to the Monument by this  
8 Act by donation, purchase with donated or appropriated  
9 funds, transfer with another Federal agency, or exchange.

10 (b) CONSENT OF OWNER REQUIRED.—Lands or in-  
11 terests therein may be acquired under subsection (a) only  
12 with the consent of the owner of the lands.

13 (c) STATE AND LOCAL LANDS.—Lands or interests  
14 therein owned by the State of New Mexico, or a political  
15 subdivision thereof, may be acquired under subsection (a)  
16 only by donation or exchange.

17 (d) ACQUISITION OF LESS THAN FEE INTERESTS IN  
18 LAND.—The Secretary may acquire less than fee interests  
19 in land only if the Secretary determines that such less  
20 than fee acquisition will adequately protect the Monument  
21 from flooding, erosion, and degradation of its drainage wa-  
22 ters.

23 **SEC. 5. ADMINISTRATION.**

24 The Secretary of the Interior, acting through the Di-  
25 rector of the National Park Service, shall manage the

1 Monument, including lands added to the Monument by  
2 this Act, in accordance with this Act, the provisions of  
3 law generally applicable to units of National Park System,  
4 including the Act of August 25, 1916 (16 U.S.C. 1 et seq.;  
5 commonly known as the National Park Service Organic  
6 Act), and such specific laws as heretofore have been en-  
7 acted regarding the Monument.

8 **SEC. 6. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.**

9       There is authorized to be appropriated such sums as  
10 may be necessary to carry out the purpose of this Act.

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
