A BILL

To provide for a national medal for public safety officers who act with extraordinary valor above and beyond the call of duty. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Public Safety Officer
5 Medal of Valor Act of 1998".

6 SEC. 2. AUTHORIZATION OF MEDAL.

7 The President may award, and present in the name 8 of Congress, a Medal of Valor of appropriate design, with 9 ribbons and appurtenances, to a public safety officer who 10 is cited by the Attorney General, on the advice of the Medal 11 of Valor Review Board, for extraordinary valor above and 12 beyond the call of duty.

13 SEC. 3. BOARD.

(a) BOARD.—There is established a permanent Medal
of Valor Review Board (hereinafter in this Act referred to
as the "Board"). The Board shall—

- 17 (1) be composed of 11 members appointed in ac-18 cordance with subsection (b); and
- 19 (2) conduct its business in accordance with this20 Act.

21 (b) Membership.—

22 (1) IN GENERAL.—The members of the Board
23 shall be appointed as follows:

24 (A) 2 shall be appointed by the Speaker of
25 the House of Representatives.

1	(B) 2 shall be appointed by the minority
2	leader of the House of Representatives.
3	(C) 2 shall be appointed by the Majority
4	Leader of the Senate.
5	(D) 2 shall be appointed by the Minority
6	Leader of the Senate.
7	(E) 3 shall be appointed by the President,
8	one of whom shall have substantial experience in
9	firefighting, one of whom shall have substantial
10	experience in law enforcement, and one of whom
11	shall have substantial experience in emergency
12	services.
13	(2) PERSONS ELIGIBLE.—The members of the
14	Board shall be individuals who have knowledge or ex-
15	pertise, whether by experience or training, in the field
16	of public safety.
17	(3) TERM.—The term of a Board member is 4
18	years.
19	(4) VACANCIES.—Any vacancy in the member-
20	ship of the Board shall not affect the powers of the
21	Board and shall be filled in the same manner as the
22	original appointment.
23	(5) Operation of the board.—
24	(A) MEETINGS.—The Board shall meet at
25	the call of the Chairman and not less than twice

1 each year. The initial meeting of the Board shall 2 be conducted not later than 30 days after the appointment of the last member of the Board. 3 4 (B) QUORUM; VOTING; RULES.—A majority of the members of the Board shall constitute a 5 6 quorum to conduct business, but the Board may 7 establish a lesser quorum for conducting hearings 8 scheduled by the Board. The Board may establish 9 by majority vote any other rules for the conduct 10 of the Board's business, if such rules are not in-11 consistent with this Act or other applicable law. 12 (c) DUTIES.—The Board shall select candidates as re-13 cipients of the Medal of Valor from among those applications received by the National Medal Office. Not more often 14 15 than once each year, the Board shall present to the Attorney General the name or names of those it recommends as Medal 16 of Valor recipients. In a given year, the Board is not re-17 quired to choose any names, but is limited to a maximum 18 19 number of 6 recipients. The Board shall set an annual timetable for fulfilling its duties under this Act. 20

21 (d) HEARINGS.—

(1) IN GENERAL.—The Board may hold such
hearings, sit and act at such times and places, administer such oaths, take such testimony, and receive

1	such evidence as the Board considers advisable to
2	carry out its duties.
3	(2) WITNESS EXPENSES.—Witnesses requested to
4	appear before the Board may be paid the same fees
5	as are paid to witnesses under section 1821 of title
6	28, United States Code. The per diem and mileage al-
7	lowances for witnesses shall be paid from funds ap-
8	propriated to the Board.
9	(e) INFORMATION FROM FEDERAL AGENCIES.—The
10	Board may secure directly from any Federal department
11	or agency such information as the Board considers nec-

12 essary to carry out its duties. Upon the request of the13 Board, the head of such department or agency may furnish14 such information to the Board.

(f) INFORMATION TO BE KEPT CONFIDENTIAL.—The
Board shall not disclose any information which may compromise an ongoing law enforcement investigation or is otherwise required by law to be kept confidential.

19 SEC. 4. BOARD PERSONNEL MATTERS.

(a) COMPENSATION OF MEMBERS.—(1) Except as provided in paragraph (2), each member of the Board shall
be compensated at a rate equal to the daily equivalent of
the annual rate of basic pay prescribed for level IV of the
Executive Schedule under section 5315 of title 5, United
States Code, for each day (including travel time) during

which such member is engaged in the performance of the
 duties of the Board.

3 (2) All members of the Board who serve as officers or
4 employees of the United States, a State, or a local govern5 ment, shall serve without compensation in addition to that
6 received for those services.

7 (b) TRAVEL EXPENSES.—The members of the Board
8 shall be allowed travel expenses, including per diem in lieu
9 of subsistence, at rates authorized for employees of agencies
10 under subchapter I of chapter 57 of title 5, United States
11 Code, while away from their homes or regular places of
12 business in the performance of service for the Board.

13 SEC. 5. DEFINITIONS.

14 For the purposes of this Act:

(1) PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICER.—The term "Public
Safety Officer" has the same meaning given that term
in section 1204 of the Omnibus Crime Control and
Safe Streets Act of 1968.

19 (2) STATE.—The term "State" means each of the
20 several States of the United States, the District of Co21 lumbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, the Virgin
22 Islands, Guam, American Samoa, and the Common23 wealth of the Northern Mariana Islands.

1 SEC. 6. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

2 There are authorized to be appropriated to the Attor3 ney General such sums as may be necessary to carry out
4 this Act.

5 SEC. 7. OFFICE.

6 There is established within the Department of Justice 7 a national medal office. The office shall staff the Medal of 8 Valor Review Board and establish criteria and procedures 9 for the submission of recommendations of nominees for the 10 Medal of Valor.

11 SEC. 8. CONFORMING REPEAL.

12 Section 15 of the Federal Fire Prevention and Control13 Act of 1974 is repealed.

14 SEC. 9. CONSULTATION REQUIREMENT.

15 The Attorney General shall consult with the Institute 16 of Heraldry within the Department of Defense regarding 17 the design and artistry of the Medal of Valor. The Attorney 18 General shall also consider suggestions received by the De-19 partment of Justice regarding the design of the medal, in-20 cluding those made by persons not employed by the 21 Department.

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
