# A BILL

- To provide surveillance and research to better understand the prevalence and pattern of autism and other pervasive developmental disabilities so that effective treatment and prevention strategies can be implemented.
  - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
  - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

## **3** SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Autism Statistics, Sur-

5 veillance, Research, and Epidemiology Act of 1998 (AS-

6 SURE)".

# 7 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

8 The Congress makes the following findings:

1 (1) Autism and other pervasive developmental 2 disabilities (fragile X syndrome, Rett's syndrome, 3 childhood disintegrative disorder, Landau-Kleffner 4 syndrome, and pervasive developmental disorders not otherwise specified) 5 are biologically based 6 neurodevelopmental diseases which cause severe im-7 pairment in cognition, language, and affective abili-8 ties.

9 (2) Autism and pervasive developmental disabil-10 ities are not rare; they may affect as many as one 11 in every 500 children, and more than 500,000 Amer-12 icans.

13 (3) There is little information on the prevalence 14 of autism and other pervasive developmental disabil-15 ities in the United States. There have never been 16 any national prevalence studies in the United States, 17 and the two studies that were conducted in the 18 1980s examined only selected areas of the country. 19 Recent studies in Canada, Europe, and Japan sug-20 gest that the prevalence of classic autism alone may 21 be 300 percent to 400 percent higher than pre-22 viously estimated.

(4) The cost of caring for individuals with autism and pervasive developmental disabilities is esti-

1	mated at more than \$13,000,000,000 per year for
2	direct costs only.
3	(5) Autism is considered by many scientists to
4	be one of the most heritable of all the developmental
5	disorders, and the most likely to yield to the latest
6	scientific advancements in genetics and neurology.
7	(6) The discovery of effective treatments and a
8	cure for autism will be greatly enhanced when sci-
9	entists and epidemiologists have an accurate under-
10	standing of the prevalence and incidence of autism.
11	(7) Recent research suggests that environ-
12	mental factors may contribute to autism. As a re-
13	sult, contributing causes of autism, if identified, may
14	be preventable.
15	(8) Finding the answers to the causes of autism
16	and related developmental disabilities may help re-
17	searchers to understand other disorders, ranging
18	from learning problems, to hyperactivity, to commu-
19	nications deficits that affect millions of Americans.
20	SEC. 3. DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES SURVEILLANCE
21	AND RESEARCH PROGRAMS.
22	(a) NATIONAL AUTISM AND PERVASIVE DEVELOP-
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23	MENTAL DISABILITIES SURVEILLANCE PROGRAM.—The
23 24	MENTAL DISABILITIES SURVEILLANCE PROGRAM.—The Secretary of Health and Human Services (in this Act re-

of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, may 1 2 make awards of grants and cooperative agreements for the 3 collection, analysis, and reporting of data on autism and 4 pervasive developmental disabilities. An entity may receive 5 such an award only if the entity is a public or nonprofit private entity (including health departments of States and 6 political subdivisions of States, and including universities 7 8 and other educational entities). In making such awards, 9 the Secretary may provide direct technical assistance in lieu of cash. 10

(b) CENTERS OF EXCELLENCE IN AUTISM AND PER12 VASIVE DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES EPIDEMIOL13 OGY.—

GENERAL.—The 14 (1)IN Secretary, acting 15 through the Director of the Centers for Disease 16 Control and Prevention, shall (subject to the extent 17 of amounts made available in appropriations Acts) 18 establish not less than three, and not more than five, 19 regional centers of excellence in autism and perva-20 sive developmental disabilities epidemiology for the 21 purpose of collecting and analyzing information on 22 the number, incidence, correlates, and causes of au-23 tism and related developmental disabilities.

24 (2) RECIPIENTS OF AWARDS FOR ESTABLISH25 MENT OF CENTERS.—Centers under paragraph (1)

shall be established and operated through the award
 of grants or cooperative agreements to public or
 nonprofit private entities that conduct research, in cluding health departments of States and political
 subdivisions of States, and including universities and
 other educational entities.

7 (3) CERTAIN REQUIREMENTS.—An award for a
8 center under paragraph (1) may be made only if the
9 entity involved submits to the Secretary an applica10 tion containing such agreements and information as
11 the Secretary may require, including an agreement
12 that the center involved will operate in accordance
13 with the following:

14 (A) The center will collect, analyze, and re-15 port autism and pervasive developmental dis-16 abilities data according to guidelines prescribed 17 the Director, after consultation with relevant 18 State and local public health officials, private 19 sector developmental disability researchers, and 20 advocates for those with developmental disabil-21 ities:

(B) The center will assist with the development and coordination of State autism and pervasive developmental disabilities surveillance efforts within a region;

1 The center will provide education, (C) 2 training, and clinical skills improvement for 3 health professionals aimed at better under-4 standing and treatment of autism and related 5 developmental disabilities; and 6 (D) The center will identify eligible cases 7 and controls through its surveillance systems 8 and conduct research into factors which may 9 cause autism and related developmental disabil-10 ities; each program will develop or extend an 11 area of special research expertise (including, 12 but not limited to, genetics, environmental ex-13 posure to contaminants, immunology, and other 14 relevant research specialty areas).

# 15 SEC. 4. CLEARINGHOUSE.

16 The Secretary, acting through the Director of the17 Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, shall carry18 out the following:

(1) The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention shall serve as the coordinating agency for
autism and pervasive developmental disabilities surveillance activities through the establishment of a
clearinghouse for the collection and storage of data
generated from the monitoring programs created by
this Act. The functions of such a clearinghouse shall

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include facilitating the coordination of research and
 policy development relating to the epidemiology of
 autism and other pervasive developmental disabil ities.

5 (2) The Secretary, acting through the Centers 6 for Disease Control and Prevention, shall coordinate 7 the Federal response to requests for assistance from 8 State health department officials regarding potential 9 or alleged autism or developmental disability clus-10 ters.

#### 11 SEC. 5. ADVISORY COMMITTEE.

(a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall establish an
Advisory Committee for Autism and Pervasive Developmental Disabilities Epidemiology Research (in this section
referred to as the "Committee"). The Committee shall
provide advice and recommendations to the Director of the
Centers for Disease Control and Prevention on—

18 (1) the establishment of a national autism and
19 pervasive developmental disabilities surveillance pro20 gram;

21 (2) the establishment of centers of excellence in
22 autism and pervasive developmental disabilities epi23 demiology;

24 (3) methods and procedures to more effectively25 coordinate government and non-government pro-

1	grams and research on autism and pervasive devel-
2	opmental disabilities epidemiology; and
3	(4) the effective operation of autism and perva-
4	sive developmental disabilities epidemiology research
5	activities.
6	(b) Composition.—
7	(1) IN GENERAL.—The Committee shall be
8	composed of ex officio members in accordance with
9	paragraph (2) and 11 appointed members in accord-
10	ance with paragraph (3).
11	(2) Ex officio members.—The following offi-
12	cials shall serve as ex officio members of the Com-
13	mittee:
14	(A) The Director of the National Center
15	for Environmental Health.
16	(B) The Assistant Administrator of the
17	Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Reg-
18	istry.
19	(C) The Director of the National Institute
20	of Child Health and Human Development.
21	(D) The Director of the National Institute
22	of Neurological Disorders and Stroke.
23	(3) Appointed members.—Appointments to
24	the Committee shall be made in accordance with the
25	following:

1 (A) Two members shall be research sci-2 entists with demonstrated achievements in re-3 search related to autism and related develop-4 mental disabilities. The scientists shall be ap-5 pointed by the Secretary in consultation with 6 the National Academy of Sciences. 7 (B) Five members shall be representatives 8 of the five national organizations whose primary 9 emphasis is on research into autism and other 10 pervasive developmental disabilities. One rep-11 resentative from each of such organizations 12 shall be appointed by the Secretary in consulta-13 tion with the National Academy of Sciences. 14 (C) Two members shall be clinicians whose 15 practice is primarily devoted to the treatment of 16 individuals with autism and other pervasive de-17 velopmental disabilities. The clinicians shall be 18 appointed by the Secretary in consultation with 19 the Institute of Medicine and the National 20 Academy of Sciences. 21 (D) Two members shall be individuals who 22 are the parents or legal guardians of a person 23 or persons with autism or other pervasive devel-24 opmental disabilities. The individuals shall be

appointed by the Secretary in consultation with

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1	the ex officio members under paragraph (1) and
2	the five national organizations referred to in
3	subparagraph (B).
4	(c) Administrative Support; Terms of Service;
5	OTHER PROVISIONS.—The following apply with respect to
6	the Committee:
7	(1) The Committee shall receive necessary and
8	appropriate administrative support from the Depart-
9	ment of Health and Human Services.
10	(2) Members of the Committee shall be ap-
11	pointed for a term of three years, and may serve for
12	an unlimited number of terms if reappointed.
13	(3) The Committee shall meet no less than two
14	times per year.
15	(4) Members of the Committee shall not receive
16	additional compensation for their service. Such
17	members may receive reimbursement for appropriate
18	and additional expenses that are incurred through
19	service on the Committee which would not have in-
20	curred had they not been a member of the Commit-
21	tee.
22	SEC. 6. REPORT TO CONGRESS.
23	The Secretary shall prepare and submit to the Con-
24	gress, after consultation and comment by the Advisory
25	Committee, an annual report regarding the prevalence and

incidence of autism and other pervasive developmental dis orders, the results of research into the etiology of autism
 and other pervasive developmental disorders, public health
 responses to known or preventable causes of autism and
 other pervasive developmental disorders, and the need for
 additional research into promising lines of scientific in quiry.

8 SEC. 7. DEFINITION.

9 For purposes of this Act, the term "State" means 10 each of the several States, the District of Columbia, the 11 Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, American Samoa, Guam, 12 the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, the 13 Virgin Islands, and the Trust Territory of the Pacific Is-14 lands.

# 15 SEC. 8. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

For the purpose of carrying out this Act, there is authorized to be appropriated \$7,500,000 for each of the fiscal years 1999 through 2003.

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
