AN ACT

To direct the Secretary of Agriculture to conduct a pilot project on designated lands within Plumas, Lassen, and Tahoe National Forests in the State of California to demonstrate the effectiveness of the resource management activities proposed by the Quincy Library Group and to amend current land and resource management plans for these national forests to consider the incorporation of these resource management activities.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Quincy Library Group
- 5 Forest Recovery and Economic Stability Act of 1997".
- 6 SEC. 2. PILOT PROJECT FOR PLUMAS, LASSEN, AND TAHOE
- 7 NATIONAL FORESTS TO IMPLEMENT QUINCY
- 8 LIBRARY GROUP PROPOSAL.
- 9 (a) Definition.—For purposes of this section, the
- 10 term "Quincy Library Group-Community Stability Pro-
- 11 posal" means the agreement by a coalition of representa-
- 12 tives of fisheries, timber, environmental, county govern-
- 13 ment, citizen groups, and local communities that formed
- 14 in northern California to develop a resource management
- 15 program that promotes ecologic and economic health for
- 16 certain Federal lands and communities in the Sierra Ne-
- 17 vada area. Such proposal includes the map entitled
- 18 "QUINCY LIBRARY GROUP Community Stability Pro-
- 19 posal", dated June 1993, and prepared by VESTRA Re-
- 20 sources of Redding, California.
- 21 (b) Pilot Project Required.—
- 22 (1) PILOT PROJECT AND PURPOSE.—The Sec-
- retary of Agriculture (in this section referred to as
- the "Secretary"), acting through the Forest Service

- 1 and after completion of an environmental impact 2 statement (a record of decision for which shall be 3 adopted within 200 days), shall conduct a pilot project on the Federal lands described in paragraph 5 (2) to implement and demonstrate the effectiveness 6 of the resource management activities described in 7 subsection (d) and the other requirements of this 8 section, as recommended in the Quincy Library 9 Group-Community Stability Proposal.
 - (2) PILOT PROJECT AREA.—The Secretary shall conduct the pilot project on the Federal lands within Plumas National Forest, Lassen National Forest, and the Sierraville Ranger District of Tahoe National Forest in the State of California designated as "Available for Group Selection" on the map entitled "QUINCY LIBRARY GROUP Community Stability Proposal", dated June 1993 (in this section referred to as the "pilot project area"). Such map shall be on file and available for inspection in the appropriate offices of the Forest Service.
- (c) Exclusion of Certain Lands, Riparian Pro Tection and Compliance.—
- 23 (1) EXCLUSION.—All spotted owl habitat areas 24 and protected activity centers located within the 25 pilot project area designated under subsection (b)(2)

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will be deferred from resource management activities
required under subsection (d) and timber harvesting
during the term of the pilot project.

(2) RIPARIAN PROTECTION.—

- (A) IN GENERAL.—The Scientific Analysis
 Team guidelines for riparian system protection
 described in subparagraph (B) shall apply to all
 resource management activities conducted
 under subsection (d) and all timber harvesting
 activities that occur in the pilot project area
 during the term of the pilot project.
- (B) GUIDELINES DESCRIBED.—The guidelines referred to in subparagraph (A) are those in the document entitled "Viability Assessments and Management Considerations for Species Associated with Late-Successional and Old-Growth Forests of the Pacific Northwest", a Forest Service research document dated March 1993 and co-authored by the Scientific Analysis Team, including Dr. Jack Ward Thomas.
- (3) Compliance.—All resource management activities required by subsection (d) shall be implemented to the extent consistent with applicable Federal law and the standards and guidelines for the conservation of the California spotted owl as set

- 1 forth in the California Spotted Owl Sierran Provence
- 2 Interim Guidelines, or the subsequently issued final
- 3 guidelines whichever is in effect.
- 4 (d) Resource Management Activities.—During
- 5 the term of the pilot project, the Secretary shall implement
- 6 and carry out the following resource management activi-
- 7 ties on an acreage basis on the Federal lands included
- 8 within the pilot project area designated under subsection
- 9 (b)(2):
- 10 (1) Fuelbreak construction.—Construction
- of a strategic system of defensible fuel profile zones,
- including shaded fuelbreaks, utilizing thinning, indi-
- vidual tree selection, and other methods of vegeta-
- tion management consistent with the Quincy Library
- 15 Group-Community Stability Proposal, on not less
- than 40,000, but not more than 60,000, acres per
- 17 year.
- 18 (2) Group selection and individual tree
- 19 SELECTION.—Utilization of group selection and indi-
- vidual tree selection uneven-aged forest management
- 21 prescriptions described in the Quincy Library
- Group-Community Stability Proposal to achieve a
- desired future condition of all-age, multistory, fire
- resilient forests as follows:

(A) Group selection.—Group selection
on an average acreage of .57 percent of the
pilot project area land each year of the pilot
project.
(B) Individual tree selection.—Indi-
vidual tree selection may also be utilized within
the pilot project area.
(3) Total acreage or
which resource management activities are imple-
mented under this subsection shall not exceed
70,000 acres each year.
(4) Riparian management.—A program of ri-
parian management, including wide protection zones
and riparian restoration projects, consistent with ri-
parian protection guidelines in subsection $(c)(2)(B)$
(e) Cost-Effectiveness.—In conducting the pilot
project, Secretary shall use the most cost-effective means
available, as determined by the Secretary, to implement
resource management activities described in subsection
(d).
(f) Funding.—
(1) Source of funds.—In conducting the
pilot project, the Secretary shall use, subject to the
relevant reprogramming guidelines of the House and

Senate Committees on Appropriations—

- 1 (A) those funds specifically provided to the
 2 Forest Service by the Secretary to implement
 3 resource management activities according to the
 4 Quincy Library Group-Community Stability
 5 Proposal; and
 - (B) excess funds that are allocated for the administration and management of Plumas National Forest, Lassen National Forest, and the Sierraville Ranger District of Tahoe National Forest.
 - (2) Prohibition on use of Certain Funds.—The Secretary may not conduct the pilot project using funds appropriated for any other unit of the National Forest System.
 - (3) Flexibility.—Subject to normal reprogramming guidelines, during the term of the pilot project, the forest supervisors of Plumas National Forest, Lassen National Forest, and Tahoe National Forest may allocate and use all accounts that contain excess funds and all available excess funds for the administration and management of Plumas National Forest, Lassen National Forest, and the Sierraville Ranger District of Tahoe National Forest to perform the resource management activities described in subsection (d).

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1	(4) RESTRICTION.—The Secretary or the forest
2	supervisors, as the case may be, shall not utilize au-
3	thority provided under paragraphs (1)(B) and (3) if,
4	in their judgment, doing so will limit other nontim-
5	ber related multiple use activities for which such
6	funds were available.
7	(5) Overhead.—Of amounts available to carry
8	out this section—
9	(A) not more than 12 percent may be used
10	or allocated for general administration or other
11	overhead; and
12	(B) at least 88 percent shall be used to im-
13	plement and carry out activities required by
14	this section.
15	(6) Authorized supplemental funds.—
16	There are authorized to be appropriated to imple-
17	ment and carry out the pilot project such sums as
18	are necessary.
19	(7) Baseline funds.—Amounts available for
20	resource management activities authorized under
21	subsection (d) shall at a minimum include existing
22	baseline funding levels.
23	(g) TERM OF PILOT PROJECT.—The Secretary shall
24	conduct the pilot project during the period beginning on

- 1 the date of the enactment of this Act and ending on the
- 2 later of the following:
- 3 (1) The date on which the Secretary completes
- 4 amendment or revision of the land and resource
- 5 management plans for Plumas National Forest,
- 6 Lassen National Forest, and Tahoe National Forest
- 7 pursuant to subsection (i).
- 8 (2) The date that is five years after the date of
- 9 the commencement of the pilot project.
- 10 (h) Consultation.—(1) Each statement required
- 11 by subsection (b)(1) shall be prepared in consultation with
- 12 the Quincy Library Group.
- 13 (2) Contracting.—The Forest Service, subject to
- 14 the availability of appropriations, may carry out any (or
- 15 all) of the requirements of this section using private con-
- 16 tracts.
- 17 (i) Corresponding Forest Plan Amendments.—
- 18 Within 180 days after the date of the enactment of this
- 19 Act, the Regional Forester for Region 5 shall initiate the
- 20 process to amend or revise the land and resource manage-
- 21 ment plans for Plumas National Forest, Lassen National
- 22 Forest, and Tahoe National Forest. The process shall in-
- 23 clude preparation of at least one alternative that—
- 24 (1) incorporates the pilot project and area des-
- 25 ignations made by subsection (b), the resource man-

- agement activities described in subsection (d), and other aspects of the Quincy Library Group Community Stability Proposal; and
- 4 (2) makes other changes warranted by the anal5 yses conducted in compliance with section 102(2) of
 6 the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (42
 7 U.S.C. 4332(2)), section 6 of the Forest and Range8 land Renewable Resources Planning Act of 1974 (16
 9 U.S.C. 1604), and other applicable laws.

(j) Reporting Requirements.—

- (1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than February 28 of each year during the term of the pilot project, the Secretary after consultation with the Quincy Library Group, shall submit to Congress a report on the status of the pilot project. The report shall include at least the following:
 - (A) A complete accounting of the use of funds made available under subsection (f)(1)(A) until such funds are fully expended.
 - (B) A complete accounting of the use of funds and accounts made available under subsection (f)(1) for the previous fiscal year, including a schedule of the amounts drawn from each account used to perform resource management activities described in subsection (d).

- 1 (C) A description of total acres treated for 2 each of the resource management activities re-3 quired under subsection (d), forest health im-4 provements, fire risk reductions, water yield in-5 creases, and other natural resources-related 6 benefits achieved by the implementation of the 7 resource management activities described in 8 subsection (d).
 - (D) A description of the economic benefits to local communities achieved by the implementation of the pilot project.
 - (E) A comparison of the revenues generated by, and costs incurred in, the implementation of the resource management activities described in subsection (d) on the Federal lands included in the pilot project area with the revenues and costs during each of the fiscal years 1992 through 1997 for timber management of such lands before their inclusion in the pilot project.
 - (F) A schedule for the resource management activities to be undertaken in the pilot project area during the calendar year.
 - (2) Limitation on expenditures.—The amount of Federal funds expended on each annual

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1 report under this subsection shall not exceed 2 \$50,000. (k) FINAL REPORT.— 3 4 (1) In General.—Beginning after completion 5 of 6 months of the second year of the pilot project, 6 the Secretary shall compile a science-based assess-7 ment of, and report on, the effectiveness of the pilot 8 project in meeting the stated goals of this pilot 9 project. Such assessment and report— 10 (A) shall include watershed monitoring of 11 lands treated under this section, that should ad-12 dress the following issues on a priority basis: 13 timing of water releases, water quality changes, 14 and water yield changes over the short and long 15 term in the pilot project area; 16 (B) shall be compiled in consultation with 17 the Quincy Library Group; and 18 (C) shall be submitted to the Congress by 19 July 1, 2002. 20 LIMITATIONS ON EXPENDITURES.—The 21 amount of Federal funds expended for the assessment and report under this subsection, other than 22 23 for watershed monitoring under paragraph (1)(A),

shall not exceed \$150,000. The amount of Federal

funds expended for watershed monitoring under

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- 1 paragraph (1)(A) shall not exceed \$75,000 for each
- 2 of fiscal years 2000, 2001, and 2002.
- 3 (l) Relationship to Other Laws.—Nothing in
- 4 this section exempts the pilot project from any Federal
- 5 environmental law.
