 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. FINDINGS.

- 4 Congress makes the following findings:
- 5 (1) The national transplant system, established
 6 by the National Organ Transplant Act of 1984, has
 7 saved over 200,000 lives. In 1998, 20,000 lives were

saved by donated organs. Approximately 60,000
 Americans currently are awaiting an organ trans plant.

4 (2) Every 16 minutes a new name is added to5 the national organ waiting list.

6 (3) Every day in the United States, 11 people
7 on the national waiting list die (more than 4,000
8 every year) because there are not enough donated
9 organs.

10 (4) Eliminating the geographic criteria for
11 donor organ allocation, as proposed by the Depart12 ment of Health and Human Services, will have po13 tentially negative consequences for the nation.

14 (5) Eliminating the geographic criteria for
15 donor organ allocation will make organ transplants
16 economically prohibitive for a large percentage of the
17 population, especially for the 22 percent of trans18 plant recipients covered under the medicaid pro19 gram.

20 (6) The following provisions proposed by the
21 Department of Health and Human Services with re22 spect to organ donation are appropriate and work23 able and should be studied—

24 (A) the standardized listing criteria for pa25 tient placement on lists;

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1 (b) GUIDELINES.—During the 1-year period de-2 scribed in subsection (a), the Secretary of Health and 3 Human Services shall consult with appropriate individuals 4 and organizations in the medical community, including na-5 tional and local organ donation organizations (including those serving low-income patients), to develop workable 6 7 guidelines with respect to the operation of the Organ Pro-8 curement and Transplantation Network.

The Secretary shall ensure that any such modifications, 16 17 together with the results of the study, are open for public comment for a period of at least 90-days prior to the effec-18 tive date of such modifications. 19

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
