A BILL

- To amend the Public Health Service Act to provide for the expansion, intensification, and coordination of the activities of the National Institutes of Health with respect to research on autism.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
 - 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
 - 4 This Act may be cited as the "Advancement in Pedi-
 - 5 atric Autism Research Act".
 - 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
- 7 The Congress finds as follows:

- (1) Infantile autism and autism spectrum disorders are biologically-based neurodevelopmental diseases that cause severe impairments in language and communication and generally manifest in young children sometime during the first two years of life.
 - (2) Best estimates indicate that 1 in 500 children born today will be diagnosed with an autism spectrum disorder and that 400,000 Americans have autism or an autism spectrum disorder.
 - (3) Three quarters of those with infantile autism spend their adult lives in institutions or group homes, and usually enter institutions by the age of 13.
 - (4) The cost of caring for individuals with autism and autism spectrum disorder is great, and is estimated to be \$13.3 billion per year solely for direct costs.
 - (5) The rapid advancements in biomedical science suggest that effective treatments and a cure for autism are attainable if—
 - (A) there is appropriate coordination of the efforts of the various agencies of the Federal Government involved in biomedical research on autism and autism spectrum disorders;

1	(B) there is an increased understanding of
2	autism and autism spectrum disorders by the
3	scientific and medical communities involved in
4	autism research and treatment; and
5	(C) sufficient funds are allocated to re-
6	search.
7	(6) Specifically, more knowledge is needed con-
8	cerning—
9	(A) the underlying causes of autism and
10	autism spectrum disorders, how to treat the un-
11	derlying abnormality or abnormalities causing
12	the severe symptoms of autism, and how to pre-
13	vent these abnormalities from occurring in the
14	future;
15	(B) the epidemiology of, and the identifica-
16	tion of risk factors for, infantile autism and au-
17	tism spectrum disorders;
18	(C) the development of methods for early
19	medical diagnosis and functional assessment of
20	individuals with autism and autism spectrum
21	disorders, including identification and assess-
22	ment of the subtypes within the autism spec-
23	trum disorders, for the purpose of monitoring

the course of the disease and developing medi-

1	cally sound strategies for improving the out-
2	comes of such individuals;
3	(D) existing biomedical and diagnostic
4	data that are relevant to autism and autism
5	spectrum disorders for dissemination to medical
6	personnel, particularly pediatricians, to aid in
7	the early diagnosis and treatment of this dis-
8	ease; and
9	(E) the costs incurred in educating and
10	caring for individuals with autism and autism
11	spectrum disorders.
12	(7) In 1998, the National Institutes of Health
13	announced a program of research on autism and au-
14	tism spectrum disorders. A sufficient level of fund-
15	ing should be made available for carrying out the
16	program.
17	SEC. 3. EXPANSION, INTENSIFICATION, AND COORDINA-
18	TION OF ACTIVITIES OF NATIONAL INSTI-
19	TUTES OF HEALTH WITH RESPECT TO RE-
20	SEARCH ON AUTISM.
21	Part B of title IV of the Public Health Service Act
22	(42 U.S.C. 284 et seq.) is amended by adding at the end
23	the following section:
24	"AUTISM
25	"Sec. 409C. (a) In General.—

1	"(1) Expansion of activities.—The Director
2	of NIH (in this section referred to as the 'Director')
3	shall expand, intensify, and coordinate the activities
4	of the National Institutes of Health with respect to
5	research on autism.
6	"(2) Administration of Program; collabo-
7	RATION AMONG AGENCIES.—The Director shall carry
8	out this section acting through the Director of the
9	National Institute of Mental Health and in collabo-
10	ration with the Director of the National Institute of
11	Child Health and Human Development, the Director
12	of the National Institute of Neurological Disorders
13	and Stroke, and the Director of the National Insti-
14	tute on Deafness and Other Communication Dis-
15	orders.
16	"(3) AUTISM COORDINATING COMMITTEE.—The
17	Director shall ensure that—
18	"(A) there is in operation at the National
19	Institutes of Health a committee to coordinate,
20	with respect to research on autism, the activi-
21	ties of the national research institutes specified
22	in paragraph (2); and
23	"(B) the coordinating committee is com-
24	posed of the directors of such national research
25	institutes and such other officials of the Na-

1	tional Institutes of Health as the Director de-
2	termines to be appropriate.
3	"(b) Centers of Excellence.—
4	"(1) In general.—The Director shall under
5	subsection (a)(1) make awards of grants and con-
6	tracts to public or nonprofit private entities to pay
7	all or part of the cost of planning, establishing, im-
8	proving, and providing basic operating support for
9	centers of excellence regarding research on autism.
10	"(2) Research, Training, and Information
11	AND EDUCATION.—Each center under paragraph (1)
12	shall conduct—
13	"(A) basic and clinical research into the
14	cause, diagnosis, early detection, prevention,
15	control, and treatment of autism, including re-
16	search in the fields of developmental
17	neurobiology, genetics, and
18	psychopharmacology;
19	"(B) training programs for physicians, sci-
20	entists, and other health and allied health pro-
21	fessionals; and
22	"(C) information and continuing education
23	programs for physicians and other health and
24	allied health professionals who provide care for
25	patients with autism.

"(3) Services for patients.—A center under paragraph (1) may expend amounts provided under such paragraph to carry out a program to make individuals aware of opportunities to participate as subjects in research conducted by the centers. The program may provide fees to such subjects. The program may, in accordance with such criteria as the Director may establish, provide to such subjects health care, referrals for health and other services, and such incidental services as will facilitate the participation of individuals as such subjects.

- "(4) STIPENDS FOR TRAINING OF HEALTH PRO-FESSIONALS.—A center under paragraph (1) may expend amounts provided under such paragraph to provide stipends for health professionals enrolled in training programs under paragraph (2)(B).
- "(5) Coordination of Centers; Reports.—
 The Director shall, as appropriate, provide for the coordination of information among centers under paragraph (1) and ensure regular communication between such centers, and may require the periodic preparation of reports on the activities of the centers and the submission of the reports to the Director and the coordinating committee under subsection (a)(3).

1 "(6) Organization of centers.—Each cen-2 ter under paragraph (1) shall use the facilities of a 3 single institution, or be formed from a consortium of 4 cooperating institutions, meeting such requirements 5 as may be prescribed by the Director.

"(7) Number of centers; duration of support.—The Director shall, subject to the extent of amounts made available in appropriations Acts, provide for the establishment of not less than five centers under paragraph (1). Support of such a center may be for a period not exceeding 5 years. Such period may be extended for one or more additional periods not exceeding 5 years if the operations of such center have been reviewed by an appropriate technical and scientific peer review group established by the Director and if such group has recommended to the Director that such period should be extended.

- 11 with respect to autism and through which the Director can
- 12 receive comments from the public regarding such pro-
- 13 grams and activities.
- 14 "(f) Autism Spectrum Disorders.—For purposes
- 15 of this section, the term 'autism' includes autism spectrum
- 16 disorders to the extent determined by the Director to be
- 17 appropriate.
- 18 ``(g) Funding.
- 19 "(1) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—
- For the purpose of carrying out this section, there
- are authorized to be appropriated \$40,000,000 for
- fiscal year 1999, and such sums as may be nec-
- essary for each of the fiscal years 2000 through
- 24 2003. Such authorizations of appropriations are in

addition to any other authorization of appropriations
that is available for such purpose.

"(2) ALLOCATIONS.—Of the amounts appropriated under paragraph (1) for a fiscal year, the Director shall make available not less than 75 percent for carrying out subsection (b), not less than 6 percent for carrying out subsection (c), and not less than 4 percent for carrying out subsection (d)."

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
