Mr. Forbes submitted the following concurrent resolution; which was referred to the Committee on Government Reform

CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

Expressing the sense of the Congress that a commemorative postage stamp should be issued to raise public awareness of the serious problem of driving while intoxicated.

- Whereas 3 in every 5 Americans will be involved in an alcohol-related car crash at some time in their lives, and 8 young people a day die in alcohol-related crashes;
- Whereas, in the past decade, 4 times as many Americans died in drunk driving car crashes as were killed in the Vietnam era;
- Whereas the economic costs of alcohol-related crashes are estimated to be \$45,000,000,000 yearly, with an additional \$70,500,000,000 lost in quality of life due to these crashes; and

Whereas drunk driving is the Nation's most frequently committed violent crime, and alcohol use represents the number 1 drug problem among young people: Now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the House of Representatives (the Senate concurring), That it is the sense of the Congress that—

(1) a postage stamp should be issued by the United States Postal Service to raise public awareness of the serious problem of driving while intoxicated; and

(2) the Citizens' Stamp Advisory Committee should recommend to the Postmaster General that
