## **CONCURRENT RESOLUTION**

1 Resolved by the House of Representatives (the Senate

2 concurring),

# 1SECTION 1. AUTHORIZATION OF EVENT TO CELEBRATE2THE 200TH BIRTHDAY OF THE LIBRARY OF3CONGRESS.

4 The Library of Congress (in this resolution referred 5 to as the "sponsor") shall be permitted to sponsor a public event, the 200th birthday celebration of the Library of 6 7 Congress (in this resolution referred to as the "event"), on the Capitol Grounds on April 24, 2000, or on such 8 9 other date as the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the Committee on Rules and Administration of the 10 11 Senate may jointly designate.

### 12 SEC. 2. TERMS AND CONDITIONS.

(a) IN GENERAL.—The event shall be free of admisiii sion charge to the public and arranged not to interfere
with the needs of Congress, under conditions to be prescribed by the Architect of the Capitol and the Capitol
Police Board.

(b) EXPENSES AND LIABILITIES.—The sponsor shall
assume full responsibility for all expenses and liabilities
incident to all activities associated with the event.

### 21 SEC. 3. STRUCTURES AND EQUIPMENT.

(a) STRUCTURES AND EQUIPMENT.—Subject to the
approval of the Architect of the Capitol, the sponsor may
erect upon the Capitol Grounds such stage, sound amplification devices, and other related structures and equipment
as may be required for the event.

(b) ADDITIONAL ARRANGEMENTS.—The Architect of
 the Capitol and the Capitol Police Board are authorized
 to make any such additional arrangements as may be re quired to carry out the event, except that no arrangements
 may be made to limit access to any public road on the
 Capitol Grounds.

### 7 SEC. 4. ENFORCEMENT OF RESTRICTIONS.

8 The Capitol Police Board shall provide for enforce9 ment of the restrictions contained in section 4 of the Act
10 of July 31, 1946 (40 U.S.C. 193d; 60 Stat. 718), con11 cerning sales, advertisements, displays, and solicitations
12 on the Capitol Grounds, as well as other restrictions appli13 cable to the Capitol Grounds, with respect to the event.
