Authorizing the use of the Capitol grounds for the Greater Washington Soap Box Derby.

Mr. HOYER (for himself, Mrs. MORELLA, Mr. WYNN, and Mr. MORAN of Virginia) submitted the following concurrent resolution; which was referred to the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure

CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

Authorizing the use of the Capitol grounds for the Greater Washington Soap Box Derby.

1 *Resolved by the House of Representatives (the Senate*
2 *concurring),*

3 **SECTION 1. AUTHORIZATION OF SOAP BOX DERBY RACES**

4 **ON CAPITOL GROUNDS.**

5 The Greater Washington Soap Box Derby Associa-
6 tion (hereinafter in this resolution referred to as the “As-
7 sociation”) shall be permitted to sponsor a public event,
8 soap box derby races, on the Capitol grounds on July 10,
9 1999, or on such other date as the Speaker of the House

1 of Representatives and the President pro tempore of the
2 Senate may jointly designate.

3 **SEC. 2. CONDITIONS.**

4 The event to be carried out under this resolution shall
5 be free of admission charge to the public and arranged
6 not to interfere with the needs of Congress, under condi-
7 tions to be prescribed by the Architect of the Capitol and
8 the Capitol Police Board; except that the Association shall
9 assume full responsibility for all expenses and liabilities
10 incident to all activities associated with the event.

11 **SEC. 3. STRUCTURES AND EQUIPMENT.**

12 For the purposes of this resolution, the Association
13 is authorized to erect upon the Capitol grounds, subject
14 to the approval of the Architect of the Capitol, such stage,
15 sound amplification devices, and other related structures
16 and equipment as may be required for the event to be car-
17 ried out under this resolution.

18 **SEC. 4. ADDITIONAL ARRANGEMENTS.**

19 The Architect of the Capitol and the Capitol Police
20 Board are authorized to make any such additional ar-
21 rangements that may be required to carry out the event
22 under this resolution.

23 **SEC. 5. APPLICABILITY OF PROHIBITIONS.**

24 Nothing in this resolution may be construed to waive
25 the applicability of the prohibitions established by section

1 4 of the Act of July 31, 1946 (40 U.S.C. 193d; 60 Stat.
2 718), concerning sales, displays, and solicitations on the
3 Capitol grounds.
