3 SECTION 1. FINDINGS.

- 4 The Congress finds that:
- 5 (1) The Environmental Protection Agency has
- 6 included propane under the Risk Management Pro-
- 7 gram (RMP).

1	(2) Propane is not toxic, yet the RMP is in-	
2	tended to reduce risks associated with toxic chemical	
3	accidents.	
4	(3) Propane is listed in section 241 of the	
5	Clean Air Act and section 301 of the Energy Policy	
6	Act of 1992 as a clean alternative fuel.	
7	(4) Including propane in the RMP will degrade	
8	air quality of stifling development of propane as an	
9	alternative fuel and causing propane users to switch	
10	to less environmentally desirable fuels.	
11	(5) Facilities storing propane are already regu-	
12	lated in all 50 States by Safety Standard 58, Lique-	
13	fied Petroleum Gas Code, published by the National	
14	Fire Protection Association (NFPA).	
15	(6) The inclusion of propane in the RMP dupli-	
16	cates the extensive safety infrastructure in all 50	
17	states through building and fire codes.	
18	SEC. 2. AMENDMENT OF CLEAN AIR ACT.	
19	Section $112(r)(3)$ of the Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C.	
20	7412(r)(3)) is amended by inserting the following before	
21	the next-to-last sentence thereof: "Liquefied petroleum	
22	gas shall not be included on any such list.".	

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
