# 106TH CONGRESS 1ST SESSION H.R. 1348

To establish a moratorium on the Foreign Visitors Program at the Department of Energy nuclear laboratories and to require the establishment of a counterintelligence program at each of those laboratories.

# A BILL

- To establish a moratorium on the Foreign Visitors Program at the Department of Energy nuclear laboratories and to require the establishment of a counterintelligence program at each of those laboratories.
  - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
  - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

#### **3** SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Department of Energy
- 5 Foreign Visitors Program Moratorium Act of 1999".

# 6 SEC. 2. MORATORIUM ON FOREIGN VISITORS PROGRAM.

- 7 (a) MORATORIUM.—Until otherwise provided by law,
- 8 the Secretary of Energy may not admit to any facility of

a national laboratory any individual who is a citizen of
 a nation that is named on the current Department of En ergy sensitive countries list.

4 (b) WAIVER AUTHORITY.—(1) The Secretary of En5 ergy may waive the prohibition in subsection (a) on a case6 by-case basis with respect to specific individuals whose ad7 mission to a national laboratory is determined by the Sec8 retary to be necessary for the national security of the
9 United States.

10 (2) Before any such waiver takes effect, the Secretary shall submit to the Committee on Armed Services of the 11 12 Senate and Committee on Armed Services of the House 13 of Representatives a report in writing providing notice of the proposed waiver. The report shall identify each indi-14 15 vidual for whom such a waiver is proposed and, with respect to each such individual, provide a detailed justifica-16 17 tion for the waiver and the Secretary's certification that the admission of that individual to a national laboratory 18 19 is necessary for the national security of the United States. 20(3)(A) A waiver under paragraph (1) may not take 21 effect until a period of 10 days of continuous session of 22 Congress has expired after the date of the submission of 23 the report under paragraph (2) providing notice of that waiver. 24

25 (B) For purposes of subparagraph (B)—

(i) the continuity of a session of Congress is
 broken only by an adjournment of the Congress sine
 die; and

4 (ii) there shall be excluded from the computa5 tion of the 10-day period specified in that subpara6 graph Saturdays, Sundays, legal public holidays, and
7 any day on which either House of Congress in not
8 in session because of adjournment of more than
9 three days to a day certain.

10 (4) The authority of the Secretary under paragraph11 (1) may not be delegated.

#### 12 SEC. 3. COUNTERINTELLIGENCE PROGRAM.

13 (a) ESTABLISHMENT AT EACH LABORATORY.—The Secretary of Energy shall establish a counterintelligence 14 15 program at each of the national laboratories. The counterintelligence program at each such laboratory shall have a 16 17 full-time staff assigned to counterintelligence functions at that laboratory, including such personnel from other agen-18 19 cies as may be approved by the Secretary. The counter-20 intelligence program at each such laboratories shall be 21 under the direction of, and shall report to, the Director 22 of the Office of Counterintelligence of the Department of 23 Energy.

24 (b) INVESTIGATION OF PAST SECURITY25 BREACHES.—The Secretary shall require that the coun-

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terintelligence program at each laboratory include a spe cific plan to investigate any breaches of security discovered
 after the date of the enactment of this Act that occurred
 at that laboratory before the establishment of that pro gram at that laboratory.

6 (c) REQUIRED BACKGROUND CHECKS ON ALL FOR-7 EIGN VISITORS.—Before an individual who is a citizen of 8 a foreign nation is allowed to enter a national laboratory, 9 the Secretary shall require that a security clearance inves-10 tigation (known as a "background check") be carried out 11 on that individual.

#### 12 SEC. 4. REPORT TO CONGRESS.

13 The Secretary of Energy shall submit to the Committee on Armed Services of the Senate and Committee 14 15 on Armed Services of the House of Representatives a report on the status of counterintelligence activities at each 16 17 of the national laboratories. The report shall be submitted not earlier than the end of the six-month period beginning 18 on the date of the enactment of this Act and shall include 19 the recommendation of the Secretary as to whether section 20 21 2 of this Act should be repealed.

## 22 SEC. 5. DEFINITIONS.

- 23 For purposes of this Act:
- 24 (1) The term "national laboratory" means any25 of the following:

1	(A) The Lawrence Livermore National
2	Laboratory, Livermore, California.
3	(B) The Los Alamos National Laboratory,
4	Los Alamos, New Mexico.
5	(C) The Sandia National Laboratories, Al-
6	buquerque, New Mexico.
7	(2) The term "sensitive countries list" means
8	the list prescribed by the Secretary of Energy known
9	as the Department of Energy List of Sensitive
10	Countries.

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
