A BILL

To establish the Abraham Lincoln Bicentennial Commission.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Abraham Lincoln Bi-
- 5 centennial Commission Act".
- 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
- 7 The Congress makes the following findings:
- 8 (1) Abraham Lincoln, the 16th President, was
- 9 one of the Nation's most prominent leaders, dem-

- onstrating true courage during the Civil War, one of the greatest crises in the Nation's history.
- 3 (2) Born of humble roots in Hardin County, 4 Kentucky, on February 12, 1809, Abraham Lincoln 5 rose to the Presidency through a legacy of honesty, 6 integrity, intelligence, and commitment to the 7 United States.
 - (3) With the belief that all men were created equal, Abraham Lincoln led the effort to free all slaves in the United States.
 - (4) Abraham Lincoln had a generous heart, with malice toward none and with charity for all.
 - (5) Abraham Lincoln gave the ultimate sacrifice for the country he loved, dying from an assassin's bullet on April 15, 1865.
 - (6) All Americans could benefit from studying the life of Abraham Lincoln, for his life is a model for accomplishing the "American Dream" through honesty, integrity, loyalty, and a lifetime of education.
 - (7) The Year 2009 will be the bicentennial anniversary of the birth of Abraham Lincoln, and a commission should be established to study and recommend to the Congress activities that are fitting

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1	and proper to celebrate that anniversary in a man-
2	ner that appropriately honors Abraham Lincoln.
3	SEC. 3. ESTABLISHMENT.
4	There is established a commission to be known as the
5	Abraham Lincoln Bicentennial Commission (in this Act
6	referred to as the "Commission").
7	SEC. 4. DUTIES.
8	The Commission shall have the following duties:
9	(1) To study activities that may be carried out
10	by the Federal Government to determine whether
11	they are fitting and proper to honor Abraham Lin-
12	coln on the occasion of the bicentennial anniversary
13	of his birth, including—
14	(A) the minting of an Abraham Lincoln bi-
15	centennial penny;
16	(B) the issuance of an Abraham Lincoln
17	bicentennial postage stamp;
18	(C) the convening of a joint meeting or
19	joint session of the Congress for ceremonies and
20	activities relating to Abraham Lincoln;
21	(D) a redesignation of the Lincoln Memo-
22	rial, or other activity with respect to the Memo-
23	rial; and
24	(E) the acquisition and preservation of ar-
25	tifacts associated with Abraham Lincoln.

- 1 (2) To recommend to the Congress the activi-2 ties that the Commission considers most fitting and 3 proper to honor Abraham Lincoln on such occasion, and the entity or entities in the Federal Government 5 that the Commission considers most appropriate to 6 carry out such activities. 7 SEC. 5. MEMBERSHIP. 8 (a) Number and Appointment.—The Commission shall be composed of 9 members appointed as follows: 10 (1) 3 members, each of whom shall be a quali-11 fied citizen described in subsection (b), appointed by the President. 12 13 (2) 2 members, each of whom shall be a quali-14 fied citizen described in subsection (b), appointed by 15 the President on the recommendation of the Gov-16 ernor of Illinois. 17 (3) 2 members, each of whom shall be Members 18 of the House of Representatives from the State of 19 Illinois, appointed by the Speaker of the House of
- 21 (4) 1 member, who shall be a Senator from the 22 State of Illinois, appointed by the Majority Leader 23 of the Senate.
- (5) 1 member, who shall be a Senator, appointed by the Majority Leader of the Senate.

Representatives.

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- 1 (b) QUALIFIED CITIZEN.—A qualified citizen de-
- 2 scribed in this subsection is a private citizen of the United
- 3 States with—
- 4 (1) a demonstrated dedication to educating oth-
- 5 ers about the importance of historical figures and
- 6 events; and
- 7 (2) substantial knowledge and appreciation of
- 8 Abraham Lincoln.
- 9 (c) Time of Appointment.—Each initial appoint-
- 10 ment of a member of the Commission shall be made before
- 11 the expiration of the 120-day period beginning on the date
- 12 of the enactment of this Act.
- 13 (d) Waiver of Limitation on Executive Sched-
- 14 ULE POSITIONS.—Appointments may be made under this
- 15 section without regard to section 5311(b) of title 5, United
- 16 States Code.
- (e) Continuation of Membership.—If a member
- 18 was appointed to the Commission as a Member of Con-
- 19 gress and the member ceases to be a Member of Congress,
- 20 that member may continue as a member for not longer
- 21 than the 30-day period beginning on the date that member
- 22 ceases to be a Member of Congress.
- 23 (f) Terms.—Each member shall be appointed for the
- 24 life of the Commission.

- 1 (g) Vacancies.—A vacancy in the Commission shall
- 2 be filled in the manner in which the original appointment
- 3 was made.
- 4 (h) Basic Pay.—Members shall serve without pay.
- 5 (i) Travel Expenses.—Each member shall receive
- 6 travel expenses, including per diem in lieu of subsistence,
- 7 in accordance with sections 5702 and 5703 of title 5,
- 8 United States Code.
- 9 (j) Quorum.—5 members of the Commission shall
- 10 constitute a quorum but a lesser number may hold hear-
- 11 ings.
- 12 (k) Chairperson.—The Chairperson shall be des-
- 13 ignated by the President from among the members of the
- 14 Commission appointed under section 5(a)(1). The term of
- 15 office of the Chairperson shall be for the life of the Com-
- 16 mission.
- 17 (l) Meetings.—The Commission shall meet at the
- 18 call of the Chairperson. Periodically, the Commission shall
- 19 hold its meeting in Springfield, Illinois.
- 20 SEC. 6. DIRECTOR AND STAFF.
- 21 (a) DIRECTOR.—The Commission may appoint and
- 22 fix the pay of a Director and any additional personnel as
- 23 the Commission considers appropriate.
- 24 (b) Applicability of Certain Civil Service
- 25 Laws.—The Director and staff of the Commission may

- 1 be appointed without regard to the provisions of title 5,
- 2 United States Code, governing appointments in the com-
- 3 petitive service, and may be paid without regard to the
- 4 provisions of chapter 51 and subchapter III of chapter 53
- 5 of that title relating to classification and General Schedule
- 6 pay rates.

7 SEC. 7. POWERS.

- 8 (a) Hearings and Sessions.—The Commission
- 9 may, for the purpose of carrying out this Act, hold hear-
- 10 ings, sit and act at times and places, take testimony, and
- 11 receive evidence as the Commission considers appropriate.
- 12 (b) Powers of Members and Agents.—Any mem-
- 13 ber or agent of the Commission may, if authorized by the
- 14 Commission, take any action which the Commission is au-
- 15 thorized to take by this section.
- 16 (c) Obtaining Official Data.—The Commission
- 17 may secure directly from any department or agency of the
- 18 United States information necessary to enable it to carry
- 19 out this Act. Upon request of the Chairperson of the Com-
- 20 mission, the head of that department or agency shall fur-
- 21 nish that information to the Commission.
- 22 (d) Gifts, Bequests, and Devises.—The Commis-
- 23 sion may accept, use, and dispose of gifts, bequests, or
- 24 devises of services or property, both real and personal, for
- 25 the purpose of aiding or facilitating the work of the Com-

- 1 mission. Gifts, bequests, or devises of money and proceeds
- 2 from sales of other property received as gifts, bequests,
- 3 or devises shall be deposited in the Treasury and shall be
- 4 available for disbursement upon order of the Commission.
- 5 For purposes of Federal income, estate, and gift taxes,
- 6 property accepted under this subsection shall be consid-
- 7 ered as a gift, bequest, or devise to the United States.
- 8 (e) Mails.—The Commission may use the United
- 9 States mails in the same manner and under the same con-
- 10 ditions as other departments and agencies of the United
- 11 States.
- 12 (f) Administrative Support Services.—Upon the
- 13 request of the Commission, the Administrator of General
- 14 Services shall provide to the Commission, on a reimburs-
- 15 able basis, the administrative support services necessary
- 16 for the Commission to carry out its responsibilities under
- 17 this Act.
- 18 SEC. 8. REPORTS.
- 19 (a) Interim Reports.—The Commission may sub-
- 20 mit to the Congress interim reports as the Commission
- 21 considers appropriate.
- 22 (b) Final Report.—The Commission shall transmit
- 23 a final report to the Congress not later than the expiration
- 24 of the 4-year period beginning on the date of the formation
- 25 of the Commission. The final report shall contain—

- 1 (1) a detailed statement of the findings and 2 conclusions of the Commission;
- 3 (2) the recommendations of the Commission;
- 4 and
- 5 (3) any other information the Commission con-
- 6 siders appropriate.

7 SEC. 9. TERMINATION.

- 8 The Commission shall terminate 120 days after sub-
- 9 mitting its final report pursuant to section 8.

10 SEC. 10. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

- There are authorized to be appropriated such sums
- 12 as may be necessary to carry out this Act.

13 SEC. 11. BUDGET ACT COMPLIANCE.

- 14 Any spending authority (as defined in subparagraphs
- 15 (A) and (C) of section 401(c)(2) of the Congressional
- 16 Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 651(c)(2)(A) and (C)))
- 17 under this Act shall be effective only to such extent and
- 18 in such amounts as are provided in appropriation Acts.

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
