A BILL

To authorize the Secretary of Labor to establish voluntary protection programs.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Models of Safety and
- 5 Health Excellence Act of 1999".
- 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS AND PURPOSES.
- 7 (a) FINDINGS.—The Congress finds that—
- 8 (1) since 1982 the Occupational Safety and
- 9 Health Administration has conducted voluntary pro-

- tection programs designed to recognize excellence in
 occupational safety and health;
 - (2) Such programs have fostered partnerships between employers, employees and the Occupational Safety and Health Administration to improve workplace safety and health through the implementation of effective safety and health programs;
 - (3) employers participating in such programs provide their employees with a level of protection that substantially exceeds the level of protection provided by compliance with the requirements of the Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970; and
 - (4) as a result of these efforts, employers participating in such programs have experienced injury and illness rates that are on average less than half of their respective industry averages, sparing thousands of America's working families needless workplace tragedies.
 - (b) Purposes.—The purposes of this Act are to—
 - (1) recognize the exemplary leadership of voluntary protection programs participants in improving occupational safety and health at workplaces;
 - (2) encourage other employers to adopt such approaches to protect their workers; and

- 1 (3) to codify such programs to ensure that the
- 2 Occupational Safety and Health Administration con-
- 3 tinues to develop them in the future.

4 SEC. 3. VOLUNTARY PROTECTION PROGRAMS.

- 5 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of Labor or the
- 6 Secretary's authorized representative shall establish and
- 7 carry out voluntary protection programs (in this section
- 8 referred to as "programs") to promote and recognize the
- 9 achievement of worksites that demonstrate excellence in
- 10 workplace health and safety. The Secretary may choose,
- 11 in limited situations, to alter the application requirements
- 12 in order to expand the scope of worksites participating in
- 13 the programs to include nonstandard worksites such as
- 14 short term construction sites and mobile worksites. The
- 15 Secretary shall encourage the participants in the programs
- 16 to share occupational safety and health expertise with
- 17 other employers. The Secretary shall also encourage the
- 18 participation of small business (as that term is defined
- 19 by the Administrator of the Small Business Administra-
- 20 tion) in the programs by implementing outreach and as-
- 21 sistance initiatives in cooperation with program partici-
- 22 pants and shall develop program requirements that ad-
- 23 dress the needs of small businesses. The Secretary may
- 24 provide for the development of equivalent programs in
- 25 State plan States.

1	(b) Program Requirements.—A program shall in-
2	clude the following:
3	(1) Application.—Applications for participa-
4	tion in the programs must be signed by the work-
5	site's management and to demonstrate sufficient em-
6	ployee support. Employers who volunteer under the
7	programs shall be required to submit an application
8	to the Secretary of Labor demonstrating that the
9	worksite, with respect to which the application is
10	made, meets such requirements as the Secretary
11	may require for participation in the program. Re-
12	quirements for excellence shall include demonstra-
13	tions of exemplary comprehensive programs to
14	assure—
15	(A) top level management leadership and
16	active and meaningful employee involvement;
17	(B) systematic assessment of hazards;
18	(C) comprehensive hazard prevention, miti-
19	gation, and control programs;
20	(D) employee safety and health training;
21	and
22	(E) safety and health program evaluation.
23	(2) Onsite evaluations.—There shall be on-
24	site evaluations of each permanent worksite by rep-
25	resentatives of the Secretary and others from the

- private and public sector as determined by the Secretary.
- 3 (3) Information.—Employers who are approved by the Secretary for participation in a program shall assure the Secretary that such information as is necessary to evaluate the employer's application and continued participation in the program is made available to the Secretary.
 - (4) Reevaluations.—Periodic reevaluations by the Secretary shall be required for continued participation in a program.

(c) Program Administration.—

- (1) EXEMPTIONS.—A worksite which has been selected to participate in a program shall, while participating in the program, be exempt from inspections or investigations under the Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970, except that the exemption shall not apply to inspections or investigations arising from employee complaints, fatalities, catastrophes, or significant toxic releases.
- (2) PROGRAM ACCEPTANCE AND CONTINUED PARTICIPATION.—Decisions regarding acceptance into the program and continued participation in the program will be based on the applicant's superior safety and health performance, as determined by the

- 1 Secretary or the Secretary's authorized representa-2 tives.
- 3 (3) Program Participation.—Decisions re-4 garding participation in a program are in the sole 5 discretion of the Secretary or an authorized rep-6 resentative of the Secretary.

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
