AN ACT

To withhold voluntary proportional assistance for programs and projects of the International Atomic Energy Agency relating to the development and completion of the Bushehr nuclear power plant in Iran, and for other purposes.

1	Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2	tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled
3	SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
4	This Act may be cited as the "Iran Nuclear Prolifera-
5	tion Prevention Act of 1999".
6	SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
7	The Congress makes the following findings:
8	(1) Iran remains the world's leading sponsor of
9	international terrorism and is on the Department of
10	State's list of countries that provide support for acts
11	of international terrorism.
12	(2) Iran has repeatedly called for the destruc-
13	tion of Israel and Iran supports organizations, such
14	as Hizballah, Hamas, and the Palestine Islamic
15	Jihad, which are responsible for terrorist attacks
16	against Israel.
17	(3) Iranian officials have stated their intent to
18	complete at least three nuclear power plants by 2015
19	and are currently working to complete the Bushehn
20	nuclear power plant located on the Persian Gulf
21	coast.
22	(4) The United States has publicly opposed the
23	completion of reactors at the Bushehr nuclear power

plant because the transfer of civilian nuclear tech-

- nology and training could help to advance Iran's nuclear weapons program.
 - (5) In an April 1997 hearing before the Subcommittee on Near Eastern and South Asian Affairs
 of the Committee on Foreign Relations of the Senate, the former Director of the Central Intelligence
 Agency, James Woolsey, stated that through the operation of the nuclear power reactor at the Bushehr
 nuclear power plant, Iran will develop substantial expertise relevant to the development of nuclear weapons.
 - (6) Construction of the Bushehr nuclear power plant was halted following the 1979 revolution in Iran because the former West Germany refused to assist in the completion of the plant due to concerns that completion of the plant could provide Iran with expertise and technology which could advance Iran's nuclear weapons program.
 - (7) In January 1995 Iran signed a \$780,000,000 contract with the Russian Federation for Atomic Energy (MINATOM) to complete a VVER–1000 pressurized-light water reactor at the Bushehr nuclear power plant and in November 1998, Iran and Russia signed a protocol to expedite

- the construction of the nuclear reactor, setting a new timeframe of 52 months for its completion.
 - (8) In November 1998, Iran asked Russia to prepare a feasibility study to build three more nuclear reactors at the Bushehr site.
 - (9) Iran is building up its offensive military capacity in other areas as evidenced by its recent testing of engines for ballistic missiles capable of carrying 2,200 pound warheads more than 800 miles, within range of strategic targets in Israel.
 - (10) Iran ranks tenth among the 105 nations receiving assistance from the technical cooperation program of the International Atomic Energy Agency.
 - (11) Between 1995 and 1999, the International Atomic Energy Agency has provided and is expected to provide a total of \$1,550,000 through its Technical Assistance and Cooperation Fund for the Iranian nuclear power program, including reactors at the Bushehr nuclear power plant.
 - (12) In 1999 the International Atomic Energy Agency initiated a program to assist Iran in the area of uranium exploration. At the same time it is believed that Iran is seeking to acquire the requisite

- 1 technology to enrich uranium to weapons-grade lev-2 els.
- 3 (13) The United States provides annual contributions to the International Atomic Energy Agen-5 cy which total more than 25 percent of the annual 6 assessed budget of the Agency and the United 7 States also provides annual voluntary contributions 8 to the Technical Assistance and Cooperation Fund 9 of the Agency which total approximately 32 percent 10 (\$18,250,000 in 1999) of the annual budget of the program.
 - (14) The United States should not voluntarily provide funding for the completion of nuclear power reactors which could provide Iran with substantial expertise to advance its nuclear weapons program and potentially pose a threat to the United States or its allies.
 - (15) Iran has no need for nuclear energy because of its immense oil and natural gas reserves which are equivalent to 9.3 percent of the world's reserves and Iran has 73,000,000,000 cubic feet of natural gas, an amount second only to the natural gas reserves of Russia.

1	SEC. 3. WITHHOLDING OF VOLUNTARY CONTRIBUTIONS TO
2	THE INTERNATIONAL ATOMIC ENERGY AGEN-
3	CY FOR PROGRAMS AND PROJECTS IN IRAN.
4	Section 307 of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961
5	(22 U.S.C. 2227) is amended by adding at the end the
6	following:
7	"(d) Notwithstanding subsection (c), the limitations
8	of subsection (a) shall apply to programs and projects of
9	the International Atomic Energy Agency in Iran, unless
10	the Secretary of State makes a determination in writing
11	to the Committee on International Relations of the House
12	of Representatives and the Committee on Foreign Rela-
13	tions of the Senate that such programs and projects are
14	consistent with United States nuclear nonproliferation and
15	safety goals, will not provide Iran with training or exper-
16	tise relevant to the development of nuclear weapons, and
17	are not being used as a cover for the acquisition of sen-
18	sitive nuclear technology. A determination made by the
19	Secretary of State under the preceding sentence shall be
20	effective for the 1-year period beginning on the date of

21 the determination.".

1	SEC. 4. ANNUAL REVIEW BY SECRETARY OF STATE OF PRO-
2	GRAMS AND PROJECTS OF THE INTER-
3	NATIONAL ATOMIC ENERGY AGENCY; UNITED
4	STATES OPPOSITION TO PROGRAMS AND
5	PROJECTS OF THE AGENCY IN IRAN.
6	(a) Annual Review.—
7	(1) In general.—The Secretary of State shall
8	undertake a comprehensive annual review of all pro-
9	grams and projects of the International Atomic En-
0	ergy Agency in the countries described in section
1	307(a) of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 (22
2	U.S.C. 2227(a)) and shall determine if such pro-
3	grams and projects are consistent with United
4	States nuclear nonproliferation and safety goals.
5	(2) Report.—Not later than 1 year after the
6	date of the enactment of this Act and on an annual
7	basis thereafter for 5 years, the Secretary shall pre-
8	pare and submit to the Congress a report containing
9	the results of the review under paragraph (1).
20	(b) Opposition to Certain Programs and
21	PROJECTS OF INTERNATIONAL ATOMIC ENERGY AGEN-
22	CY.—The Secretary of State shall direct the United States
23	representative to the International Atomic Energy Agency
24	to oppose programs of the Agency that are determined by

25 the Secretary under the review conducted under sub-

- 1 section (a)(1) to be inconsistent with nuclear nonprolifera-
- 2 tion and safety goals of the United States.

3 SEC. 5. REPORTING REQUIREMENTS.

- 4 (a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 180 days after the
- 5 date of the enactment of this Act and on an annual basis
- 6 thereafter for 5 years, the Secretary of State, in consulta-
- 7 tion with the United States representative to the Inter-
- 8 national Atomic Energy Agency, shall prepare and submit
- 9 to the Congress a report that—
- 10 (1) describes the total amount of annual assist-
- ance to Iran from the International Atomic Energy
- 12 Agency, a list of Iranian officials in leadership posi-
- tions at the Agency, the expected timeframe for the
- 14 completion of the nuclear power reactors at the
- Bushehr nuclear power plant, and a summary of the
- 16 nuclear materials and technology transferred to Iran
- from the Agency in the preceding year which could
- assist in the development of Iran's nuclear weapons
- 19 program; and
- 20 (2) contains a description of all programs and
- 21 projects of the International Atomic Energy Agency
- in each country described in section 307(a) of the
- 23 Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 (22 U.S.C. 2227(a))
- and any inconsistencies between the technical co-
- operation and assistance programs and projects of

- the Agency and United States nuclear nonprolifera-
- 2 tion and safety goals in these countries.
- 3 (b) Additional Requirement.—The report re-
- 4 quired to be submitted under subsection (a) shall be sub-
- 5 mitted in an unclassified form, to the extent appropriate,
- 6 but may include a classified annex.

7 SEC. 6. SENSE OF THE CONGRESS.

- 8 It is the sense of the Congress that the United States
- 9 Government should pursue internal reforms at the Inter-
- 10 national Atomic Energy Agency that will ensure that all
- 11 programs and projects funded under the Technical Co-
- 12 operation and Assistance Fund of the Agency are compat-
- 13 ible with United States nuclear nonproliferation policy and
- 14 international nuclear nonproliferation norms.
