# A BILL

To authorize the President to award a gold medal on behalf of the Congress to General Henry H. Shelton and to provide for the production of bronze duplicates of such medal for sale to the public.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

#### SECTION 1. FINDINGS.

- (1) General Henry H. Shelton, Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, the principal military adviser to the President, the National Security Council, and the Secretary of Defense, has displayed an extraordinary degree of leadership, competence, and professionalism fulfilling his statutory responsibilities throughout Operation Allied Force.
  - (2) The leadership, competence, and professionalism of General Shelton and his subordinates, officers, and noncommissioned officers have instilled great confidence and pride in the Armed Forces of the United States.
  - (3) General Shelton and his subordinates brilliantly planned and coordinated at the national level the most successful air campaign in the history of war fighting.
  - (4) General Shelton's leadership, foresight, and determination were directly responsible for ensuring that proper military force was applied to bring about decisive military victory without a single allied combat casualty.
- (5) The superb coordination among North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) forces and the unique and exceptional command arrangements

- which produced the highly effective chain of command within NATO are directly attributed to the military competence and extraordinary leadership of
- 4 General Shelton.

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- 5 (6) As the principal military advisor to the 6 President of the United States, the National Secu-7 rity Council, and the Secretary of Defense, General 8 Shelton's clear and farsighted assessments, judg-9 ments, recommendations, and determination were in-10 valuable and instrumental in the unprecedented mili-11 tary victory against the forces of Slobodan Milosevic.
  - (7) General Shelton's distinction as a "soldier's soldier" and his previous service, including command of the Special Operations Command, the 18th Airborne Corps at Fort Bragg, North Carolina, helicopter forces in Operation Desert Storm, and special forces Green Berets in Vietnam, serve as an inspiration to the Congress and the people of the United States, a grateful Nation.

#### 20 SEC. 2. CONGRESSIONAL GOLD MEDAL.

21 (a) Presentation Authorized.—The President is 22 authorized to present, on behalf of the Congress, to Gen-23 eral Henry H. Shelton a gold medal of appropriate design 24 in recognition of his exemplary performance as a military 25 leader in coordinating the planning, strategy, and execu-

- 1 tion of the United States and NATO combat action and
- 2 his invaluable contributions to the United States and to
- 3 the successful return to peace in the Balkans as Chairman
- 4 of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.
- 5 (b) Design and Striking.—For purposes of the
- 6 presentation referred to in subsection (a), the Secretary
- 7 of the Treasury (hereafter referred to in this Act as the
- 8 "Secretary") shall strike a gold medal with suitable em-
- 9 blems, devices, and inscriptions to be determined by the
- 10 Secretary.

#### 11 SEC. 3. DUPLICATE MEDALS.

- 12 The Secretary may strike bronze duplicates of the
- 13 gold medal struck pursuant to section 2, under such regu-
- 14 lations as the Secretary may prescribe, and may sell such
- 15 bronze duplicates at a price sufficient to cover the cost
- 16 thereof, including labor, materials, dies, use of machinery,
- 17 and overhead expenses, and the cost of the gold medal.
- 18 SEC. 4. NATIONAL MEDALS.
- Medals struck pursuant to this Act are national med-
- 20 als for purposes of chapter 51 of title 31, United States
- 21 Code.

- 3 (a) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There is
- 4 authorized to be appropriated not to exceed \$30,000 to

- 6 (b) Proceeds of Sales.—Amounts received from
- 7 sales of duplicate bronze medals under section 3 shall be
- 8 credited to the appropriation made pursuant to the au-
- 9 thorization provided in subsection (a).

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
