A BILL

To authorize the Golden Spike/Crossroads of the West National Heritage Area.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. AUTHORIZATION OF STUDY.

4 (a) DEFINITIONS.—For the purposes of this section:

1	(1) Golden Spike Rail Study.—The term
2	"Golden Spike Rail Study" means the Golden Spike
3	Rail Feasibility Study, Reconnaissance Survey,
4	Ogden, Utah to Golden Spike National Historic
5	Site", National Park Service, 1993.
6	(2) Secretary.—The term "Secretary" means
7	the Secretary of the Interior.
8	(3) Study Area.—The term "Study Area"
9	means the Golden Spike/Crossroads of the West Na-
10	tional Heritage Area Study Area, the boundaries of
11	which are described in subsection (d).
12	(b) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall conduct a study
13	of the Study Area which includes analysis and documenta-
14	tion necessary to determine whether the Study Area—
15	(1) has an assemblage of natural, historic, and
16	cultural resources that together represent distinctive
16 17	cultural resources that together represent distinctive aspects of American heritage worthy of recognition,

1	(4) provides outstanding recreational and edu-
2	cational opportunities;
3	(5) contains resources important to the identified
4	theme or themes of the Study Area that retain a de-
5	gree of integrity capable of supporting interpretation;
6	(6) includes residents, business interests, non-
7	profit organizations, and local and State governments
8	who have demonstrated support for the concept of a
9	National Heritage Area; and
10	(7) has a potential management entity to work
11	in partnership with residents, business interests, non-
12	profit organizations, and local and State governments
13	to develop a National Heritage Area consistent with
14	continued local and State economic activity.
15	(c) CONSULTATION.—In conducting the study, the Sec-
16	retary shall—
17	(1) consult with the State Historic Preservation
18	Officer, State Historical Society, and other appro-
19	priate organizations; and
20	(2) use previously completed materials, including
21	the Golden Spike Rail Study.
22	(d) Boundaries of Study Area.—The Study Area
23	shall be comprised of sites relating to completion of the first
24	transcontinental railroad in the State of Utah, concen-

trating on those areas identified on the map included in
 the Golden Spike Rail Study.

3 (e) REPORT.—Not later than 3 fiscal years after funds
4 are first made available to carry out this section, the Sec5 retary shall submit to the Committee on Resources of the
6 House of Representatives and the Committee on Energy and
7 Natural Resources of the Senate a report on the findings
8 and conclusions of the study and recommendations based
9 upon those findings and conclusions.

10 (f) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There are 11 authorized to be appropriated to the Secretary such sums 12 as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of this sec-13 tion.

14 SEC. 2. CROSSROADS OF THE WEST HISTORIC DISTRICT.

15 (a) PURPOSES.—The purposes of this section are—

16 (1) to preserve and interpret, for the educational
17 and inspirational benefit of the public, the contribu18 tion to our national heritage of certain historic and
19 cultural lands and edifices of the Crossroads of the
20 West Historic District; and

21 (2) to enhance cultural and compatible economic
22 redevelopment within the District.

23 (b) DEFINITIONS.—For the purposes of this section:

1	(1) DISTRICT.—The term "District" means the
2	Crossroads of the West Historic District established by
3	subsection (c).
4	(2) Secretary.—The term "Secretary" means
5	the Secretary of the Interior.
6	(3) HISTORIC INFRASTRUCTURE.—The term
7	"historic infrastructure" means the District's historic
8	buildings and any other structure that the Secretary
9	determines to be eligible for listing on the National
10	Register of Historic Places.
11	(c) CROSSROADS OF THE WEST HISTORIC DIS-
12	TRICT.—
13	(1) Establishment.—There is established the
14	Crossroads of the West Historic District in the city of
15	Ogden, Utah.
16	(2) BOUNDARIES.—The boundaries of the Dis-
17	trict shall be the boundaries depicted on the map enti-
18	tled "Crossroads of the West Historic District", num-
19	bered OGGO-20,000, and dated March 22, 2000. The
20	map shall be on file and available for public inspec-
21	tion in the appropriate offices of the Department of
22	the Interior.
23	(d) Development Plan.—The Secretary may make
24	grants and enter into cooperative agreements with the State
25	of Ital load accomments and nonnefit entities under

25 of Utah, local governments, and nonprofit entities under

3	(1) preparation of a plan for the development of
4	historic, architectural, natural, cultural, and inter-
5	pretive resources within the District;
6	(2) implementation of projects approved by the
7	Secretary under the development plan described in
8	paragraph (1); and
9	(3) an analysis assessing measures that could be
10	taken to encourage economic development and revital-
11	ization within the District in a manner consistent
12	with the District's historic character.
13	(e) Restoration, Preservation, and Interpreta-
14	TION OF PROPERTIES.—
15	(1) Cooperative agreements.—The Secretary
16	may enter into cooperative agreements with the State
17	of Utah, local governments, and nonprofit entities
18	owning property within the District under which the
19	Secretary may—
20	(A) pay not more than 50 percent of the
21	cost of restoring, repairing, rehabilitating, and
22	improving historic infrastructure within the Dis-

23 *trict;*

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1	(B) provide technical assistance with re-
2	spect to the preservation and interpretation of
3	properties within the District; and
4	(C) mark and provide interpretation of
5	properties within the District.
6	(2) Non-Federal contributions.—When de-
7	termining the cost of restoring, repairing, rehabili-
8	tating, and improving historic infrastructure within
9	the District for the purposes of paragraph $(1)(A)$, the
10	Secretary may consider any donation of property,
11	services, or goods from a non-Federal source as a con-
12	tribution of funds from a non-Federal source.
13	(3) Provisions.—A cooperative agreement
14	under paragraph (1) shall provide that—

(A) the Secretary shall have the right of ac-15 cess at reasonable times to public portions of the 16 17 property for interpretive and other purposes;

18 (B) no change or alteration may be made in 19 the property except with the agreement of the property owner, the Secretary, and any Federal 20 21 agency that may have regulatory jurisdiction 22 over the property; and

(C) any construction grant made under this 23 24 section shall be subject to an agreement that 25 provides—

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1	(I) that conversion, use, or disposal of
2	the project so assisted for purposes contrary
3	to the purposes of this section shall result in
4	a right of the United States to compensa-
5	tion from the beneficiary of the grant; and
6	(II) for a schedule for such compensa-
7	tion based on the level of Federal investment
8	and the anticipated useful life of the project.
9	(4) Applications.—
10	(A) IN GENERAL.—A property owner that
11	desires to enter into a cooperative agreement
12	under paragraph (1) shall submit to the Sec-
13	retary an application describing how the project
14	proposed to be funded will further the purposes
15	of the management plan developed for the Dis-
16	trict.
17	(B) CONSIDERATION.—In making such
18	funds available under this subsection, the Sec-
19	retary shall give consideration to projects that
20	provide a greater leverage of Federal funds.
21	(f) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There are
22	authorized to be appropriated to the Secretary to carry out
23	this section not more than \$1,000,000 for any fiscal year
24	and not more than \$5,000,000 total.

Amend the title to read as follows: "A bill to direct the Secretary of the Interior to conduct a study of the Golden Spike/Crossroads of the West National Heritage Area Study Area and to establish the Crossroads of the West Historic District in the State of Utah.".

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
