A BILL

To amend the Domestic Volunteer Service Act of 1973 to provide for the establishment of a National Youth Technology Corps Program, using VISTA volunteers who are highly proficient in computer technologies to recruit and organize youth to implement and maintain computer systems for public schools, community centers, public senior centers, and libraries and to teach students, teachers, senior citizens, and other persons how to use these technologies and systems. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "National Youth Tech-5 nology Corps Act".

6 SEC. 2. NATIONAL YOUTH TECHNOLOGY CORPS.

7 (a) ESTABLISHMENT OF PROGRAM.—The Domestic
8 Volunteer Service Act of 1973 is amended by inserting
9 after section 109 (42 U.S.C. 4959) the following new sec10 tion:

11 "SEC. 109A. NATIONAL YOUTH TECHNOLOGY CORPS.

"(a) ESTABLISHMENT.—As part of the Volunteers in
Service to America program established under this part,
the Director shall establish a National Youth Technology
Corps for the purpose of using volunteers serving under
this part who are highly proficient in computer and other
information technologies—

18 "(1) to recruit and organize youth—

19 "(A) to implement and maintain computer
20 systems for public schools, community centers,
21 public senior centers, libraries, and related enti22 ties; and

23 "(B) to teach students, teachers, senior
24 citizens, and other persons how to use computer
25 and other information technologies and systems;

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1	"(2) to promote the involvement of such youth
2	in community service through the provision of serv-
3	ices involving the use of technology;
4	((3) to promote entrepreneurship among, and
5	employment opportunities for, such youth in tech-
6	nology-related fields; and
7	"(4) to provide recognition, on an annual basis
8	and otherwise, to the youth and organizations affili-
9	ated with the program that demonstrate outstanding
10	efforts and achievements in accordance with the pro-
11	grams.
12	"(b) Assignment.—
13	"(1) IN GENERAL.—The Director shall assign
14	volunteers to projects and programs that meet the
15	antipoverty criteria of this part and that provide as-
16	sistance to persons who are unserved or underserved
17	by computer education programs.
18	"(2) Assignment priorities.—In the assign-
19	ment of volunteers, the Director shall give priority
20	consideration to—
21	"(A) programs and projects that assist in-
22	dividuals residing in unserved or underserved
23	areas with the highest concentrations of low in-
24	come individuals and families;

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1	"(B) projects and programs focusing on
2	providing computer training to high risk popu-
3	lations;
4	"(C) projects and programs operating in
5	areas with the highest concentration of individ-
6	uals and families living at or below the poverty
7	level;
8	"(D) projects and programs providing
9	computer training to parents of disadvantaged
10	children between the ages of 2 and 8, who may
11	be educationally at risk; and
12	"(E) Statewide programs and projects that
13	encourage the creation of new computer train-
14	ing efforts, encourage the coordination of intra-
15	State computer training efforts, and provide
16	technical assistance to local computer training
17	efforts.
18	"(c) Administration.—Programs and projects
19	under this section may be administered by—
20	"(1) public or private nonprofit agencies and
21	organizations;
22	"(2) community-based nonprofit organizations;
23	"(3) local and State education agencies;
24	"(4) local and State agencies administering
25	adult basic education programs;

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1	"(5) educational institutions;
2	"(6) libraries;
3	"(7) antipoverty organizations;
4	"(8) local, municipal, and State governmental
5	entities; and
6	"(9) eligible providers of employment and train-
7	ing activities under subtitle B of title I of the Work-
8	force Investment Act of 1998.
9	"(d) Equitable Distribution of Volunteers.—
10	The Director shall ensure an equitable distribution of vol-
11	unteers under this section in accordance with the equitable
12	distribution requirement of section 414 of this Act.
13	"(e) EXTENT OF PROGRAM.—The National Youth
14	Technology Corps shall consist of all volunteers serving
15	under part A who are working on projects and programs
16	of the type described in subsection (a).
17	"(f) Effect of Funding Reduction.—In any fis-
18	cal year in which the funding provided under part A is
19	reduced, the funding provided under this section shall be
20	proportionately reduced.".
21	(b) Clerical Amendment.—The table of contents
22	in section 1(b) of the Domestic Volunteer Service Act of
23	1973 is amended by inserting after the item relating to
24	section 109 the following new item:

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"Sec. 109A. National Youth Technology Corps.".
