Mr. OWENS introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Education and the Workforce

A BILL

To amend the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 to provide up-to-date school library media resources and well-trained, professionally certified school library media specialists for elementary schools and secondary schools, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Elementary and Sec-
5 ondary School Library Media Resources, Training, and
6 Advanced Technology Assistance Act”.

1 **SEC. 2. PURPOSE.**

2 The purposes of this Act are—

3 (1) to improve academic achievement of stu-
4 dents by providing students with increased access to
5 up-to-date school library materials, a well-equipped,
6 technologically advanced school library media center,
7 and well-trained, professionally certified school li-
8 brary media specialists;

9 (2) to support the acquisition of up-to-date
10 school library media resources for the use of stu-
11 dents, school library media specialists, and teachers
12 in elementary schools and secondary schools;

13 (3) to provide school library media specialists
14 with the tools and training opportunities necessary
15 for the specialists to facilitate the development and
16 enhancement of the information literacy, information
17 retrieval, and critical thinking skills of students; and

18 (4)(A) to ensure the effective coordination of
19 resources for library, technology, and professional
20 development activities for elementary schools and
21 secondary schools; and

22 (B) to ensure collaboration between school li-
23 brary media specialists, and elementary school and
24 secondary school teachers and administrators, in de-
25 veloping curriculum-based instructional activities for

1 students so that school library media specialists are
2 partners in the learning process of students.

3 **SEC. 3. SCHOOL LIBRARY MEDIA RESOURCES.**

4 Title III of the Elementary and Secondary Education
5 Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 6801 et seq.) is amended by add-
6 ing at the end the following:

7 **“PART F—ELEMENTARY AND SECONDARY**

8 **SCHOOL LIBRARY MEDIA RESOURCES**

9 **“Subpart 1—Library Media Resources**

10 **“SEC. 3701. STATE ALLOTMENTS.**

11 “The Secretary shall allot to each eligible State edu-
12 cational agency for a fiscal year an amount that bears the
13 same relation to the amount appropriated under section
14 3710 and not reserved under section 3709 for the fiscal
15 year as the amount the State educational agency received
16 under part A of title I for the preceding fiscal year bears
17 to the amount all State educational agencies received
18 under part A of title I for the preceding fiscal year.

19 **“SEC. 3702. STATE APPLICATIONS.**

20 “To be eligible to receive an allotment under section
21 3701 for a State for a fiscal year, the State educational
22 agency shall submit to the Secretary an application at
23 such time, in such manner, and containing such informa-
24 tion as the Secretary shall require. The application shall
25 contain a description of—

1 “(1) the manner in which the State educational
2 agency will use the needs assessment described in
3 section 3705 and poverty data to allocate funds
4 made available through the allotment to the local
5 educational agencies in the State with the greatest
6 need for school library media improvement;

7 “(2) the manner in which the State educational
8 agency will effectively coordinate all Federal and
9 State funds available for library, technology, and
10 professional development activities to assist local
11 educational agencies, elementary schools, and sec-
12 ondary schools in—

13 “(A) acquiring up-to-date school library
14 media resources in all formats, including books
15 and advanced technology such as Internet con-
16 nections;

17 “(B) providing training for school library
18 media specialists; and

19 “(C) facilitating resource-sharing among
20 schools and school library media centers;

21 “(3) the manner in which the State educational
22 agency will develop standards for the incorporation
23 of new technologies into the curricula of elementary
24 schools and secondary schools through school library
25 media programs to develop and enhance the infor-

1 mation literacy, information retrieval, and critical
2 thinking skills of students; and

3 “(4) the manner in which the State educational
4 agency will evaluate the quality and impact of activi-
5 ties carried out under this subpart by local edu-
6 cational agencies to make determinations regarding
7 the need of the agencies for technical assistance and
8 whether to continue funding the agencies under this
9 subpart.

10 **“SEC. 3703. STATE RESERVATION.**

11 “A State educational agency that receives an allot-
12 ment under section 3701 may reserve not more than 3
13 percent of the funds made available through the allotment
14 to provide technical assistance, disseminate information
15 about effective school library media programs, and pay ad-
16 ministrative costs, relating to this subpart.

17 **“SEC. 3704. LOCAL ALLOCATIONS.**

18 “(a) IN GENERAL.—A State educational agency that
19 receives an allotment under section 3701 for a fiscal year
20 shall use the funds made available through the allotment
21 and not reserved under section 3703 to make allocations
22 to local educational agencies.

23 “(b) AGENCIES.—The State educational agency shall
24 allocate the funds to the local educational agencies in the
25 State that have—

1 “(1) the greatest need for school library media
2 improvement according to the needs assessment de-
3 scribed in section 3705; and

4 “(2) the highest percentages of poverty, as
5 measured in accordance with section 1113(a)(5).

6 **“SEC. 3705. LOCAL APPLICATION.**

7 “To be eligible to receive an allocation under section
8 3704 for a fiscal year, a local educational agency shall sub-
9 mit to the State educational agency an application at such
10 time, in such manner, and containing such information as
11 the State educational agency shall require. The application
12 shall contain—

13 “(1) a needs assessment relating to need for
14 school library media improvement, based on the age
15 and condition of school library media resources (in-
16 cluding book collections), access of school library
17 media centers to advanced technology, including
18 Internet connections, and the availability of well-
19 trained, professionally certified school library media
20 specialists, in schools served by the local educational
21 agency;

22 “(2) a description of the manner in which the
23 local educational agency will use the needs assess-
24 ment to assist schools with the greatest need for
25 school library media improvement;

1 “(3) a description of the manner in which the
2 local educational agency will use the funds provided
3 through the allocation to carry out the activities de-
4 scribed in section 3706;

5 “(4) a description of the manner in which the
6 local educational agency will develop and carry out
7 the activities described in section 3706 with the ex-
8 tensive participation of school library media special-
9 ists, elementary school and secondary school teach-
10 ers and administrators, and parents;

11 “(5) a description of the manner in which the
12 local educational agency will effectively coordinate—

13 “(A) funds provided under this subpart
14 with the Federal, State, and local funds re-
15 ceived by the agency for library, technology,
16 and professional development activities; and

17 “(B) activities carried out under this sub-
18 part with the Federal, State, and local library,
19 technology, and professional development activi-
20 ties carried out by the local educational agency;
21 and

22 “(6) a description of the manner in which the
23 local educational agency will collect and analyze data
24 on the quality and impact of activities carried out

1 under this subpart by schools served by the local
2 educational agency.

3 **“SEC. 3706. LOCAL ACTIVITIES.**

4 “A local educational agency that receives a local allo-
5 cation under section 3704 may use the funds made avail-
6 able through the allocation—

7 “(1) to acquire up-to-date school library media
8 resources, including books, for the use of students,
9 school library media specialists, and teachers in ele-
10 mentary schools and secondary schools;

11 “(2) to acquire and utilize advanced technology,
12 incorporated into the curricula of the schools, to de-
13 velop and enhance the information literacy, informa-
14 tion retrieval, and critical thinking skills of students;

15 “(3) to acquire and utilize advanced technology,
16 including Internet links, to facilitate resource-shar-
17 ing among schools and school library media centers,
18 and public and academic libraries, where possible;

19 “(4) to provide professional development oppor-
20 tunities for school library media specialists; and

21 “(5) to foster increased collaboration between
22 school library media specialists and elementary
23 school and secondary school teachers and adminis-
24 trators.

1 **“SEC. 3707. ACCOUNTABILITY AND CONTINUATION OF**
2 **FUNDS.**

3 “Each local educational agency that receives funding
4 under this subpart for a fiscal year shall be eligible to con-
5 tinue to receive the funding—

6 “(1) for each of the 2 following fiscal years; and

7 “(2) for each fiscal year subsequent to the 2
8 following fiscal years, if the local educational agency
9 demonstrates that the agency has increased—

10 “(A) the availability of, and the access of
11 students, school library media specialists, and
12 elementary and secondary teachers to, up-to-
13 date school library media resources, including
14 books and advanced technology, in elementary
15 schools and secondary schools served by the
16 local educational agency;

17 “(B) the number of well-trained, profes-
18 sionally certified school library media specialists
19 in those schools; and

20 “(C) collaboration between school library
21 media specialists and elementary school and
22 secondary school teachers and administrators
23 for those schools.

24 **“SEC. 3708. SUPPLEMENT NOT SUPPLANT.**

25 “Funds made available under this subpart shall be
26 used to supplement and not supplant other Federal, State,

1 and local funds expended to carry out activities relating
2 to library, technology, or professional development activi-
3 ties.

4 **“SEC. 3709. NATIONAL ACTIVITIES.**

5 “The Secretary shall reserve not more than 3 percent
6 of the amount appropriated under section 3710 for a fiscal
7 year—

8 “(1) for an annual, independent, national eval-
9 uation of the activities assisted under this subpart,
10 to be conducted not later than 3 years after the date
11 of enactment of this subpart; and

12 “(2) to broadly disseminate information to help
13 States, local educational agencies, school library
14 media specialists, and elementary and secondary
15 teachers and administrators learn about effective
16 school library media programs.

17 **“SEC. 3710. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.**

18 “There are authorized to be appropriated to carry out
19 this subpart \$250,000,000 for fiscal year 2000 and such
20 sums as may be necessary for each of fiscal years 2001
21 through 2004.

22 **“Subpart 2—School Library Access Program**

23 **“SEC. 3721. PROGRAM.**

24 “(a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary may make grants
25 to local educational agencies to provide students with ac-

1 cess to libraries in elementary schools and secondary
2 schools during non-school hours, including the hours be-
3 fore and after school, weekends, and summer vacation pe-
4 riods.

5 “(b) APPLICATIONS.—To be eligible to receive a
6 grant under subsection (a), a local educational agency
7 shall submit an application to the Secretary at such time,
8 in such manner, and containing such information as the
9 Secretary may require.

10 “(c) PRIORITY.—In making grants under subsection
11 (a), the Secretary shall give priority to local educational
12 agencies that demonstrate, in applications submitted
13 under subsection (b), that the agencies—

14 “(1) seek to provide activities that will increase
15 reading skills and student achievement;

16 “(2) have effectively coordinated services and
17 funding with entities involved in other Federal,
18 State, and local efforts, to provide programs and ac-
19 tivities for students during the non-school hours de-
20 scribed in subsection (a); and

21 “(3) have a high level of community support.

22 “(d) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There
23 are authorized to be appropriated to carry out this subpart

- 1 \$25,000,000 for fiscal year 2000 and such sums as may
- 2 be necessary for each of fiscal years 2001 through 2004.”.

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
