A BILL

To require the appointment of the Chief of the Forest Service by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. APPOINTMENT OF CHIEF OF THE FOREST**
4 **SERVICE.**

5 (a) **PRESIDENTIAL APPOINTMENT.**—The Depart-
6 ment of Agriculture Reorganization Act of 1994 is amend-
7 ed by inserting after section 247 (7 U.S.C. 6963), relating
8 to the reorganization of the Forest Service, the following
9 new section:

1 **“SEC. 248. APPOINTMENT OF CHIEF OF THE FOREST**
2 **SERVICE.**

3 “The Chief of the Forest Service, Department of Ag-
4 riculture, shall be appointed by the President, by and with
5 the advice and consent of the Senate. The Chief shall be
6 appointed from among persons who have substantial expe-
7 rience and demonstrated competence in forest land man-
8 agement and natural resources conservation.”.

9 (b) **EFFECT ON CURRENT CHIEF.**—The person serv-
10 ing as Chief of the Forest Service on the date of the enact-
11 ment of this Act may continue to serve in the position
12 pursuant to existing law until the earlier of the following:

13 (1) The end of the six-month period beginning
14 on the date of the enactment of this Act.

15 (2) The date on which the person is re-
16 appointed, or a replacement is first appointed, to the
17 position pursuant to section 248 of the Department
18 of Agriculture Reorganization Act of 1994, as added
19 by subsection (a).
