A BILL

To establish the Rosie the Riveter/World War II Home Front National Historical Park in the State of California, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Rosie the Riveter/World
- 5 War II Home Front National Historical Park Establish-
- 6 ment Act of 2000".
- 7 SEC. 2. ROSIE THE RIVETER/WORLD WAR II HOME FRONT
- 8 NATIONAL HISTORICAL PARK.
- 9 (a) Establishment.—In order to preserve for the
- 10 benefit and inspiration of the people of the United States
- 11 as a national historical park certain sites, structures, and
- 12 areas located in Richmond, California, that are associated
- 13 with the industrial, governmental, and citizen efforts that
- 14 led to victory in World War II, there is established the Rosie
- 15 the Riveter/World War II Home Front National Historical
- 16 Park (in this Act referred to as the "park").
- 17 (b) Areas Included.—The boundaries of the park
- 18 shall be those generally depicted on the map entitled "Pro-
- 19 posed Boundary Map, Rosie the Riveter/World War II
- 20 Home Front National Historical Park" numbered 963/
- 21 80000 and dated May 2000. The map shall be on file and
- 22 available for public inspection in the appropriate offices of
- 23 the National Park Service.

1 SEC. 3. ADMINISTRATION OF THE NATIONAL HISTORICAL

2	PARK.
3	(a) In General.—
4	(1) General administration.—The Secretary
5	of the Interior (in this Act referred to as the "Sec-
6	retary") shall administer the park in accordance with
7	this Act and the provisions of law generally applica-
8	ble to units of the National Park System, including
9	the Act entitled "An Act to establish a National Park
10	Service, and for other purposes," approved August 35,
11	1916 (39 Stat. 535; 16 U.S.C. 1 through 4), and the
12	Act of August 21, 1935 (49 Stat. 666; 16 U.S.C. 461-
13	467).
14	(2) Specific Authorities.—The Secretary may
15	interpret the story of Rosie the Riveter and the World
16	War II home front, conduct and maintain oral his-
17	tories that relate to the World War II home front
18	theme, and provide technical assistance in the preser-
19	vation of historic properties that support this story.
20	(b) Cooperative Agreements.—
21	(1) General agreements.—The Secretary may
22	enter into cooperative agreements with the owners of
23	the World War II Child Development Centers, the
24	World War II worker housing, the Kaiser-Permanente
25	Field Hospital, and Fire Station 67A, pursuant to

which the Secretary may mark, interpret, improve,

1	restore, and provide technical assistance with respect
2	to the preservation and interpretation of such prop-
3	erties. Such agreements shall contain, but need not be
4	limited to, provisions under which the Secretary shall
5	have the right of access at reasonable times to public
6	portions of the property for interpretive and other
7	purposes, and that no changes or alterations shall be
8	made in the property except by mutual agreement.
9	(2) Limited agreements.—The Secretary may
10	consult and enter into cooperative agreements with
11	interested persons for interpretation and technical as-
12	sistance with the preservation of—
13	(A) the Ford Assembly Building;
14	(B) the intact dry docks/basin docks and
15	five historic structures at Richmond Shipyard
16	#3;
17	(C) the Shimada Peace Memorial Park;
18	(D) Westshore Park;
19	(E) the Rosie the Riveter Memorial;
20	(F) Sheridan Observation Point Park;
21	(G) the Bay Trail/Esplanade;
22	(H) Vincent Park; and
23	(I) the vessel S.S. RED OAK VICTORY,
24	and Whirley Cranes associated with shipbuilding
25	$in\ Richmond.$

- (c) Education Center.—The Secretary may estab-1 lish a World War II Home Front Education Center in the Ford Assembly Building. Such center shall include a pro-3 gram that allows for distance learning and linkages to other representative sites across the country, for the purpose of educating the public as to the significance of the site and the World War II Home Front. 8 (d) Use of Federal Funds.— 9 (1) Non-federal matching.—(A) As a condi-10 tion of expending any funds appropriated to the Sec-11 retary for the purposes of the cooperative agreements 12 under subsection (b)(2), the Secretary shall require 13 that such expenditure must be matched by expendi-14 ture of an equal amount of funds, goods, services, or 15 in-kind contributions providedbynon-Federal 16 sources. 17 (B) With the approval of the Secretary, any do-
 - (B) With the approval of the Secretary, any donation of property, services, or goods from a non-Federal source may be considered as a contribution of funds from a non-Federal source for purposes of this paragraph.
 - (2) Cooperative agreement.—Any payment made by the Secretary pursuant to a cooperative agreement under this section shall be subject to an agreement that conversion, use, or disposal of the

1	project so assisted for purposes contrary to the pur-
2	poses of this Act, as determined by the Secretary,
3	shall entitle the United States to reimbursement of the
4	greater of—
5	(A) all funds paid by the Secretary to such
6	project; or
7	(B) the proportion of the increased value of
8	the project attributable to such payments, deter-
9	mined at the time of such conversion, use, or dis-
10	posal.
11	(e) Acquisition.—
12	(1) Ford assembly building.—The Secretary
13	may acquire a leasehold interest in the Ford Assembly
14	Building for the purposes of operating a World War
15	II Home Front Education Center.
16	(2) Other facilities.—The Secretary may ac-
17	quire, from willing sellers, lands or interests in the
18	World War II day care centers, the World War II
19	worker housing, the Kaiser-Permanente Field Hos-
20	pital, and Fire Station 67, through donation, pur-
21	chase with donated or appropriated funds, transfer
22	from any other Federal Agency, or exchange.
23	(3) Artifacts.—The Secretary may acquire
24	and provide for the curation of historic artifacts that

relate to the park.

1 (f) Donations.—The Secretary may accept and use 2 donations of funds, property, and services to carry out this 3 Act.

(g) General Management Plan.—

- (1) In General.—Not later than 3 complete fiscal years after the date funds are made available, the Secretary shall prepare, in consultation with the city of Richmond, California, and transmit to the Committee on Resources of the House of Representatives and the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources of the Senate a general management plan for the park in accordance with the provisions of section 12(b) of the Act of August 18, 1970 (16 U.S.C. 1a–7(b)), popularly known as the National Park System General Authorities Act, and other applicable law.
- (2) PRESERVATION OF SETTING.—The general management plan shall include a plan to preserve the historic setting of the Rosie the Riveter/World War II Home Front National Historical Park, which shall be jointly developed and approved by the city of Richmond.
- (3) ADDITIONAL SITES.—The general management plan shall include a determination of whether there are additional representative sites in Richmond that should be added to the park or sites in the rest

1 of the United States that relate to the industrial, gov-2 ernmental, and citizen efforts during World War II that should be linked to and interpreted at the park. 3 Such determination shall consider any information or findings developed in the National Park Service study 5 6 of the World War II Home Front under section 4. SEC. 4. WORLD WAR II HOME FRONT STUDY. 8 The Secretary shall conduct a theme study of the World War II home front to determine whether other sites in the United States meet the criteria for potential inclusion in 10 the National Park System in accordance with Section 8 of Public Law 91–383 (16 U.S.C. 1a–5). SEC. 5. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS. 14 (a) In General.— 15 (1) Oral Histories, preservation, and vis-16 ITOR SERVICES.—There are authorized to be appro-17 priated such sums as may be necessary to conduct 18 oral histories and to carry out the preservation, inter-19 pretation, education, and other essential visitor serv-20 ices provided for by this Act. 21 (2) Artifacts.—There are authorized to be ap-22 propriated \$1,000,000 for the acquisition and

curation of historical artifacts related to the park.

- 1 (b) Property Acquisition.—There are authorized to
- 2 be appropriated such sums as are necessary to acquire the
- 3 properties listed in section 3(e)(2).
- 4 (c) Limitation on Use of Funds for S.S. RED
- 5 OAK VICTORY.—None of the funds authorized to be ap-
- 6 propriated by this section may be used for the operation,
- 7 maintenance, or preservation of the vessel S.S. RED OAK
- 8 VICTORY.
